Washington — (RNS) — Five out of six awards granted to school guards for life-saving acts of bravery were won here by pupils of Catholic parochial schools. The Lifesaver Medals, awarded annually by the American Automobile Association, were presented by Mrs. Dwight D. Eisenhower. They are the AAA's highest award.

U.S. Urged To Step Up Refugee Aid

Washington — (NC) — The two-day White House Conference on Refugees ended here with agreement among the 200 delegates from all parts of the nation that white youth has been done in the past decade, much more must be done to aid the millions of homeless in the world.

In his message which opened the conference, President Eisenhower asserted: "Much has been done, but the refugee problem remains acute and chronic, and it will remain so long as the world suffers from political unrest and aggression, and as long as there are refugees, we cannot ignore them."

The message which was read by Gerald D. Morgan, White House Deputy Assistant, stressed that the World Refugee Year, which starts July 1 under sponsorship of the United Nations and the U.S. support, may be able to accomplish much in the field of humanity, as the International Geophysical Year did in the field of science.

At the concluding session of the conference, Mgr. Edward E. Swanson, executive director of Catholic Relief Services-National Catholic Welfare Conference, sponsored a resolution which called upon the United States to contribute more money to resettle the homeless and also urged Congress to approve legislation which would enable more of them to come to the United States.

North Easton, Mass. — (NC) — A prominent liturgist decried by participation in Mass as "simply a return to the proper way of celebrating the Holy Sacrifice."

Father Shawn G. Sheehan, president of the National Liturgical Conference, spoke at a workshop of congregational participation sponsored by St. Ignace College here. Guest of honor at the workshop was Bishop James J. Connelly of Fall River.

Although contemporary needs and trends have influenced the present liturgical development, said Father Sheehan, the basic reason for participation was stated in the instruction issued by the Holy See last September when it said, "The Mass by its nature calls for participation by all who are present."

The reverse side depicts an American jet plane, speeding its passengers through the skies. The medal was inspired by the Rev. Aloysius H. Gillet, pastor of Our Lady of Loretto church in Hempstead.
