### Elmira Sister To Be Honored

A reception in honor of Sister M. Adelbert, S.S.J. (Sister Wojcieszka) will be held in St. Casimir's school on Sunday afternoon from 2 until 4.

Sister Adelbert is a former principal of St. Casimir's school and was stationed there from 1931 until 1951 when she retired.

The Alumni of St. Casimir's school who were taught by Sister Adelbert are planning the reception as a gesture of appreciation to this outstanding teacher for her great, untiring interest and devotion to the cause of Catholic education.

Invitations have been sent out to nearly 600 former pupils with a former pupil from each of the classes taught by Sister in charge of arrangements.

Born in Schlesia, Poland, Sister Adelbert came to this country with a group of young girls at the invitation of Bishop McQuaid and entered the convent of the Sisters of St. Joseph on Jay Street, receiving the habit on August 25, 1894.

Sister's first assignment was at St. Mary's school in Dansville where she taught until transferred to Rochester to pioneer the opening of St. Stanislaus school in 1897. Remaining there until 1931, she was then stationed at St. Casimir's school in Elmira from 1931 to 1951.

### So You Think It's Hot? Local Jesuit Missioner Reports On India Heat

"The temperature is as hot as it has ever been to my knowing" is reported by Rev. Michael F. Kavanaugh, S.J., native Rochesterian, from his mission post in Bihar, India.

Father Kavanaugh was extending his thanks to all who assisted him in a mission benefit party here.

"Yesterday it was 114 and we still look for more," he says. "In the morning I stay in my room, but in the evening, doors and windows closed and it really is not too bad."

"But going out for five minutes," the latter states, "and
