### Maine School Bus Battle Heads For State Legislature

Portland—(NY)—The next scene in Maine's drama about tax-supported bus rides for children attending private schools probably will be set in the state legislature, but when it will take place is a big question.

**Appeals for quick** legislative action have come from many quarters in the wake of the state Supreme Court's decision that tax funds cannot be used to transport children enrolled in private schools in the absence of permissive legislation from state lawmakers.

The court's 4-to-2 decision did not, however, state that a properly worded enabling act from the legislature would meet constitutional requirements.

**Bishop Daniel J. Feeney** of Portland said he hoped the legislature would act before the fall school term. The prelate's statement was his first in the three-penitential issue which was initiated by parents of parochial school children in August.

**OPINIONS SIMILAR** to those of the Bishop were given by virtually all supporters of bus rides, including Portland Municipal Court Judge Sidney Wernick, who acted as special counsel for August in the legal proceedings.

Judge Wernick said he would advocate a special session of the legislature in September, but first would call a meeting of representatives from committees affected by the decision, to map strategy.

The state legislature is ending one of its longest terms—21 weeks so far—this month. The lawmakers are not scheduled to meet again until 1961.

**Enabling legislation**, such as mentioned by the court, might go through the assembly as a rider on another bill or efforts might be made to get the unanimous consent necessary to introduce an act in the legislature now. Chances of either event happening are rated as slim by Judge Wernick.

### 181 Scouts To Receive Ad Altare Dei Honor

The Ad Altare Dei Awards will be presented Friday, June 12 at Corpus Christi Church at 8 p.m.

St. Rev. Msgr. John P. Maney, administrator, will make the presentation to 181 Boy Scouts and Explorers. This is the largest group ever to receive the award in the Rochester Diocese.

The Ad Altare Dei Award is a recognition that the Church gives to the Scout or Explorer for advancement in the spiritual content of the program. The award does not in any way take the place of any Scout awards but adds Scouting by helping the Scout live the Oath and Law. The award is made on the authority of the Bishop of each Diocese through the local Catholic Committee on Scouting and is presented annually.

**THERE ARE** three separate and distinct steps necessary to attain this honor. After each step, the candidate must present himself to his pastor or Scout chaplain for an examination. If he passes, the priest will sign the endorsement of each step along with the candidate's parents.

After all three steps are accomplished, the Scout or Explorer must then appear before the Diocesan Chaplain on Scouting and his committee of priests. If the candidate successfully passes this interview, he is then eligible to receive the Ad Altare Dei Award.

Chairman for this year's presentation is Richard Theile, assisted by Norman Huether, Herbert Zimmer, Perry Finks, Dennis Merritt, Louis Callafi, William Ester, Cosmo Ippolito, John Lembach and Paul S. Vonbacho.

### Track Star Prefers Vocation To Olympics

Oradell, N.J. — (CRNS) — John Halligan, 18-year-old Catholic high school star who recently shattered the world inter-scholastic record and equaled the all-around world mark of 9.3 seconds, is giving up a brilliant track career to enter an order of the Christian Brothers of Ireland.

John, a senior at Bergen (N.J.) Catholic High School, center St. Mary's Novitzki Park, N.J., on July 1, once entered, he will no longer be permitted to compete in athletics. "Track is a special interest of my whole life," the brown-haired athlete said.

"I've been thinking about becoming a Brother for the last three years, but I didn't decide until recently."

Besides giving up scholarship offers from colleges and universities throughout the country, John also will be turning down an opportunity to qualify for next year's United States Olympic team.

Asked about this he said: "It's something I'll have to live up to. A man must do what he fights for himself."

John lives in a modest eight-room home in Oradell which he shares with his aunt, uncle and 14-year-old sister, John's mother died when he was seven and Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Wynnoff adopted the two youngsters and brought them up with their own three children.

By equating the word mark at the Englewood Memorial meet, John joins such illustrious champions as Mel Patton, Dave Sims and Bobby Morrow. The listed interscholastic world record of 9.4 was set in 1955 by one of the nation's greatest track stars, Jesse Owens.

What makes John's feat all the more outstanding is the fact that he had broken a bone in his right foot while playing basketball in the high school yard this winter. As a result, he was out of indoor competition for three weeks.

John had been running for Bergen Catholic for the past four years and is the New Jersey State Catholic High School and Bergen County 100 and 200 yard champion.
