"The temperature is as hot as it has ever been to my knowing" is reported by Rev. Michael F. Kavanaugh, S.J., native Rochesterian, from his mission post in Bihar, India.

Father Kavanaugh was extending his thanks to all who assisted him in a mission benefit party here.

"Yesterday it was 114 and we can still look for more," he was writing in early May. "After ten in the morning I stay in anti-four in the evening, doors and windows closed and it really is not too bad."

"But going out for five minutes," the letter states, "and coming back, my clothes are permeated with heat so they feel as if they were freshly ironed and the heat of the iron is still there."

SOMEHOW or other normal work goes on even under the acetylene sun of May. We had a group of church workers meeting last night to discuss means of raising funds for St. Jude's Society for Burial Assistance.

"A first class funeral here costs \$11.25. Most people here would be completely caught off guard at that sudden expense. This figure, of course, includes everything, box, carpenter, black-cloth, nails, pins, etc. It is always hand made."

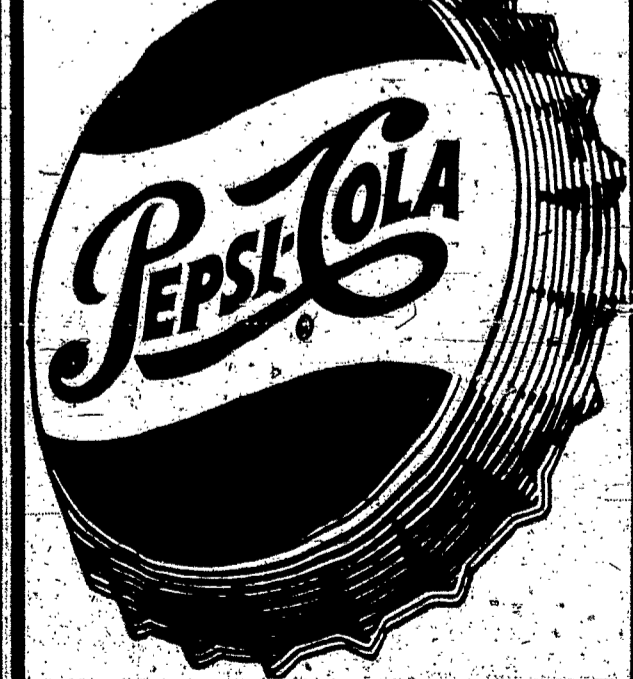
