SIMPLE TO MAKE DELICIOUS OATMEAL COOKIES

CHOCOLATE CHIP OATMEAL COOKIES: 1/2 c. shortening, 1/2 c. white sugar, 1/2 c. brown sugar, 2 eggs, 1/2 c. milk, 1/2 c. flour, 1 t. baking soda, 1 c. salted oats, 2 c. rolled oats, 1 c. chopped nuts, 1 c. chocolate or lemon bits, 1 t. vanilla. Cream shortening and sugar, beat in eggs, milk and vanilla. Sift flour, soda and salt and stir into first mixture. Blend in oats, nuts and bits. Drop by spoonfuls onto lightly greased cookie sheet. Bake at 375 degrees about 10 to 12 minutes. Yield: 4 dozen.

Looking Back

Early Newsmen Recalled By Courier's 'Grandpa'

When Vince Hannon, newly elected grand knight, was congratulated by this department on his election, he was reminded of his activities as a carrier for Elmer Grapenstater of this newspaper, Vince was a young fellow in St. Mary's and in Brighton and also in the school crusades.

This reminiscence set off "grandpa" here on another attempt to recapture events of early days on this newspaper and on the Rochester Echo.

Handling the Catholic news in this city back in the 20s and 30s was done mostly by ear. No definite pattern was available. Handling for the old Echo, this writer naturally called on publishers where the paper had better circulation and in St. Michael's parish a young fellow was noted taking care of bowling scores and showing promise in sports writing.

AN AQUINAS STUDENT he was prevailed upon to put together a sports column each week. This was later also published in the Courier Journal. The young sports writer joined the old Journal-American and advanced to night city editor of the American and assistant city editor of the Journal.

He came with the Courier Journal after the Hearst paper closed and was with us twice. He is William A. Lang, now president of Rochester Transit Corporation.

When helping the Echo, Bill was ever active in promoting sports. Edward L. Hanna, Chief U.S. Probation Officer in Buffalo and a former "set a year" staff man on the Echo asked a short time ago in a letter: "Dare we go back as far as the days when you were in the Central Building with the antique desk and the old typewriter?"

Also, probably you and Bill Lang could tell the folks you organized the Catholic Baseball League during the "Catholic days" to prove you were ahead of the times in preventing what is now known as "Juvenile Delinquency." Or, as what a social worker might call "group work."

SPORTS WRITING was only the beginning for Bill Lang. He handled all kinds of stories and was sent to Florida once on an important assignment by the Hearst paper. Bylines were frequent on that story.

He has a penchant for puns. One of his headlines which he wrote when Communism began to threaten the church in Europe was: "White Bishop, Sets Red, Feels Blue." Of course, it wasn't printed.

Another young man who helped in out in the early Echo days was Emmet M. O'Brien, now head of Gamble's news bureau in Albany. As a student at Aquinas, Emmett covered local amateur plays.

As long as newspapermen are being mentioned, Paul W. Pinckney was our Auburn correspondent for a time before coming to Rochester and now heading the sports department of the Democrat and Chronicle.

A note was received by this writer after a recent column from Harold A. Nichols, radio and television writer for the D. and C. Harold was our radio correspondent in other years and has consistently lent interest and support to the diocesan newspaper.

Also recalled is the active cooperation with the Catholic press given down through the years by Arthur P. Farren. At that time a student at Aquinas Institute wrote stories for the old Rochester Echo, later did the same for the Courier Journal. Now he handles parish promotion for Foley Associates and is a welcome visitor to this editorial office.
