

Cardinal Raps Court OK For Sunday Business

Boston—(RNS)—Richard Cardinal Cushing, Archbishop of Boston, issued a strongly worded statement attacking a recent federal court decision in which Massachusetts laws regulating Sunday business were declared unconstitutional.

Expressing "serious alarm about the attitude toward Sunday which is generally prevalent today," the Boston prelate urged his parishioners to help restore Sunday to its "proper status" as a day of prayer and rest.

CARDINAL CUSHING'S statement was prompted by a U.S. District Court 2 to 1 ruling in May that it was legal for a Springfield Jewish kosher market to do business on Sunday, state Blue laws notwithstanding. Attorney General Edward J. McCormack, Jr., has issued a motion for a retrial of the controversial opinion.

The court decision branded Massachusetts Sunday legislation unconstitutional on three counts: restricting religious liberty, depriving a store owner of property without due process of law, and constituting a denial of the equal protection of the laws forbidden by the 14th amendment.

"It is extremely disturbing," Cardinal Cushing said, "to be confronted with this new trend of thought according to which Sunday is to henceforth be recognized only as a day on which people may, if they choose, seek respite from their ordinary labors, and on which they may engage in whatever activities may be pleasurable or profitable to themselves."

"Do we want Sunday to become the kind of day that it is in Soviet Russia, where days of rest are appointed by governmental decree and religious activities are officially excluded from all programs of social planning?" he asked.

"It is in this direction that we are heading," he continued, "once we disassociate Sunday from the remnant of religious significance which it still retains among ourselves. Once we allow business as usual on Sunday, it is but a short step to the complete secularization of the day that was once known as the Lord's Day."

Cardinal Cushing reminded Catholics that there are Church laws relating to the sanctification of Sunday which they are bound to observe. "It is not enough simply to attend Mass on Sunday," he said. "For Catholics, Sunday is neither a day for 'business as usual' nor a civic holiday, to be given over in its entirety to recreation and amusement. Sunday is the 'Lord's Day.'"

"Only by keeping the day sacred to God," he added, "can we assure for future generations the benefits which have been gained in the past through the association of prayer and rest."

Korea Daily Paper Again Suppressed

Seoul—(NC)—Seoul's Catholic-owned daily, *Kyonghyang Shinmun*, whose closing by the Korean government in April brought on a storm of protests, has been shut down again only seven hours after a court order said it could resume publication.

THE COURT of Appeals here ruled that the newspaper, Korea's second largest, could reopen pending a decision on its case by the country's Supreme Court.

Then, after an emergency two-hour cabinet meeting, the Korean government suspended *Kyonghyang Shinmun's* publishing license. The daily's staff was notified of the suspension while preparing what would have been the paper's first edition in nearly two months.

Kyonghyang Shinmun, which is managed by the Seoul apostolic vicariate, was originally shut down by the government on charges that it was undermining democracy and the country's security. The government also accused it of deviating from its "loyal religious position and the ideals of Catholicism."

The shrine of St. Olaf of Norway is located on the grounds of St. James Church here. A spokesman for the parish stated that a majority of the people within the 300 square-mile area comprising the parish are of Scandinavian descent.

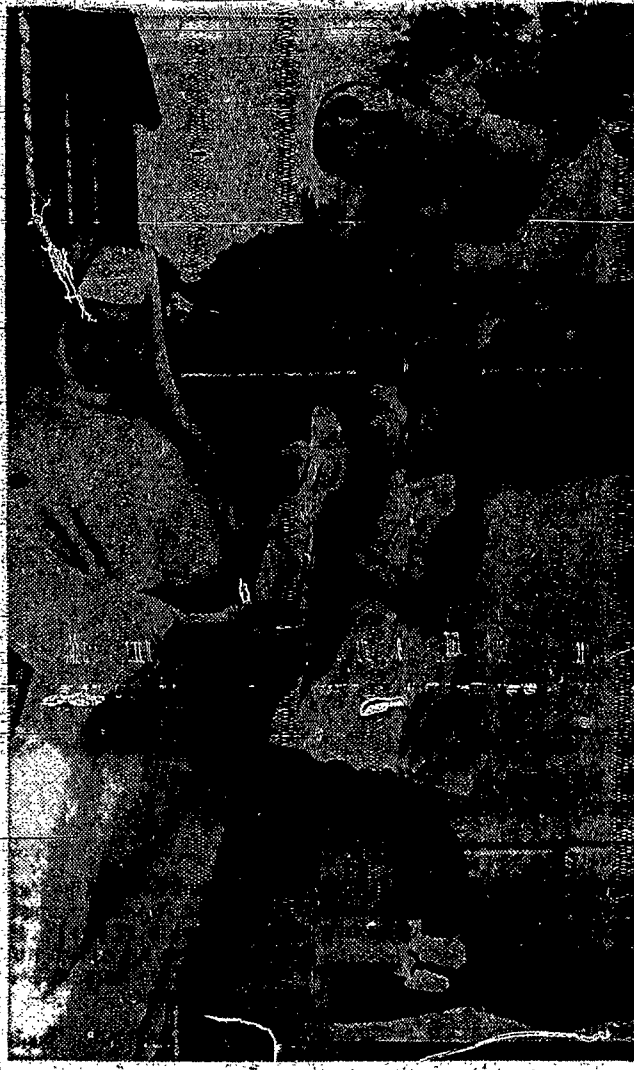
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The doctor spent endless hours in helping design and plan facilities for the new clinic. It will treat some 500 children annually, double its previous capacity.

Economic and social problems cannot be solved simply by having governments impose certain policies as is done in the Chinese Communism system. The more use of technical methods as in India, Puerto Rico, Japan, are not miraculous remedies. They are no remedies at all.

Human nature rebels when tampered with. It is disastrous when fertility is systematically discouraged. Human beings want to be allowed to have a spontaneous free response to an intelligent and moral solution.

A sense of responsibility to God, to the family, to the nation must be observed. Not to do so is to continue to have no effect except to be injurious to human nature itself.

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Pope Names Doctor To Top Lay Post

Rome—(RNS)—Dr. Agostino Maitarelli, 47-year-old professor of genetics in the University of Rome, has been named by Pope John XXIII as president of Italian Catholic Action, the top Catholic lay office in the country.

He replaces Dr. Luigi Gedda, also a physician, who has held the post since 1952, and has for years been regarded as one of Italy's foremost Catholic laymen.

POPE JOHN announced the change of leadership in a letter to Giuseppe Cardinal Siri, Archbishop of Genoa, who is chairman of the Episcopal Commission of Italian Catholic Action.

The Pontiff did not give any reason for his action. However, it was generally believed here to be a desire to reduce the political role which Catholic Action has played in Italy and to accentuate instead its basically spiritual program.
