Perversion, Book Topic

PEOPLE—(NC)—Publishers of objectionable paperback books have switched from "textbooks on crime" to works promoting sexual perversion, the director of the National Office for Decent Literature said here.

Msgr. Thomas Fitzgerald of Chicago declared that "gangster books where the hero is brutalized" are published less frequently today as a result of protests.

However, the change is not a cause for unequalled rejoicing, he said, since certain paperback publishers "are getting more and more into the field of perversion."

Msgr. Fitzgerald spoke at a meeting of area Knights of Columbus, held to alert them to the increasing problem of indecent literature.

He said about five pocket-book publishers dominate the monthly NODL list of publications disapproved for youth. On the other hand, he said, some of the best in literature is being published in paperback editions, and the publishers of these works should be encouraged.

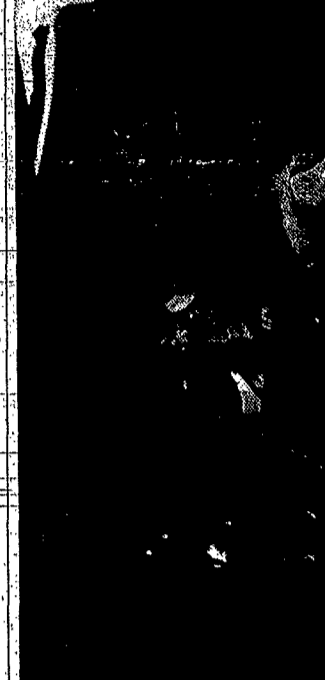
Msgr. Fitzgerald also discussed the rapid growth in the number of so-called "men's magazines" which exploit sex. "It's allowed because we are a liberally thinking people," he said. "We are influenced by newspapers, and newspapers are opposed to any form of censorship."

Today, he declared, more newspapers are coming to "admit the problem" of obscene literature. "But they have no solution," he added.

Msgr. Fitzgerald pointed out that publisher Bennett Cerf conceded in a recent television interview that some paperback books are not fit for general consumption.

"The agent that it was wrong, but he defended it as right," he said. "The American Civil Liberties Union has a similar attitude, he declared, adding, 'they say that if they must choose between complete freedom and censorship, they will take freedom.'"

Msgr. Fitzgerald emphasized that the NODL's concern is not with reading material for adults. "Our concern is with the material children can get," he said. "And a certain percentage of this material, if read regularly by anyone, will cause moral sin. It destroys ideals, leads to scoffing at law and order, the sanctity of marriage, and love of country."
