Tamale Pie
Food with a Flair

I know you homemakers are always looking for new ideas... new food combinations and new ways of preparing familiar dishes. That's why I think you'll like this recipe for Tamale Pie, a one-dish meal for family or company dinners.

What's new about Tamale Pie? From south of the border comes this recipe idea. It's a Mexican specialty that combines chili-seasoned beef with a corn meal topping. The recipe has been modernized and the entire meal-in-a-dish can be made in less than an hour.

During the last 20 minutes of baking period, there's time to toss a salad or mixed greens and set the table. Stylish plastic coated paper plates in the new Cook's Four pattern are both pleasant and convenient to use. Ice Cream and a beverage complete the meal.

- TAMALE PIE
1 T. salad oil
1 medium green pepper, diced
1 large onion, minced
2 pounds ground beef
2 t. Accent
2 t. salt
1/2 t. pepper
1 can (1 pound) tomatoes
1 T. chili power
1 c. evaporated milk
1 package (12 oz.) corn muffin mix
1/2 c. grated sharp cheese

Heat oil, add onion and green pepper and saute until onion is tender but not brown. (The casserole shown in the photo is a new 3 quart aluminum casserole that may be used both on top of range and in oven.) Sprinkle beef with Accent, salt and pepper; brown in casserole, breaking up meat with a fork. Add tomatoes and chili powder. Let simmer while preparing the topping. Add evaporated milk to dry muffin mix. Stir to blend.

REMOVE CASSEROLE from heat; pour corn muffin mixture over top. Sprinkle with grated cheese. Bake at 400 degrees for about 20 minutes or until top is crusty and golden brown. 6 to 8 servings. Incidentally have you discovered the new plastic coated plates? They are ideal for serving hot foods.

COOL, COOL, COOL... Would snow seem attractive on a hot July day? Then collage cheese, as near a thing to it can be made, so store in the coldest part of the refrigerator. Keep covered to prevent off flavors and odors and make sure to use within about five days. Cottage cheese consumption has gone up nearly 80 percent in the past 10 years according to a recent USDA survey.

Just in time for hot summer days would be this wonderful new chifon pie recipe which combines frozen fruit juice, evaporated milk and fruit jelly for the freshest, frostiest summer dessert ever.

PINEAPPLE-ORANGE CHIFFON PIE

- 1-9 inch baked pie shell
1 c. evaporated milk
1 pkg. orange jelly
1/2 c. sugar
Dash salt
3/4 c. boiling water
1 six oz. can frozen pineapple orange juice
Chill small mixer bowl and beaters. Chill evaporated milk in ice cube tray until crystals begin to form. Combine jelly, sugar, salt and boiling water in a bowl; stir until dissolved. Add frozen fruit juice concentrate; stir until melted. Chill until thickened but not set. In the chilled bowl, whip evaporated milk until stiff and holds a peak. Fold in gelatin mixture gently but thoroughly. Chill 10 minutes. Turn into baked pie shell and chill 3 hours before serving.

Real Cool Salad Features shellfishes the basic ingredient

Scallops... Warm weather of a seafood salad. New Bedford Scallop Salad: Cut two pounds of sea scallops into bite-size pieces and combine with one cup diced celery, one cup diced cucumber and one-fourth cup stuffed olives. Add one-half cup French dressing; chill several hours. Add one cup mayonnaise, salt and lemon juice to taste. Makes 6 servings. Note: To cook scallops for salad simmer in water seasoned with salt and lemon juice for 10 minutes. Chill before making salad.

Irish Inaugurate New President

Dublin — (RNS) — Civic and cultural leaders from all parts of the country as well as representatives of every religious body witnessed the solemn inauguration here of Eamon de Valera as President of Ireland.

THE CEREMONY in the cream and gold choral St. Patrick's Hall of historic Dublin Castle—once the prime symbol of British power in Ireland—saw the 75-year-old former schoolmaster who became a leader of the Easter insurrection of 1916 and was saved from a death sentence only because he was born in America, become the First Citizen of Ireland.

Among those witnessing the ceremony was Sean Lemass the new Prime Minister who was one of President de Valera's foremost companions in arms in the subsequent war against the British waged by the Irish Republican Army which finally culminated in the establishment of the Irish Republic.

The first President of Ireland was Dr. Douglas Hyde, former president of the Gaelic League and a renowned authority on the Irish language and literature, who died several years ago. He was a Protestant.

The new President is a devout Catholic. During his long term as Prime Minister, he could be seen virtually every morning at Mass in his parish church of the Blackrock suburb where he resided. Now handicapped by poor eyesight which makes it necessary for him to memorize his speeches and bars him from facing three-fourths of the U.S. including his love for higher and Cuba, and is one of the mathematicians, he relaxes principally at home.

Congo Bishop Consecrated

Luluabourg — (RNS) — The Holy See of St. Clement's Roman Catholic Cathedral here was crowded with worshippers who came to witness the official consecration of a new African native bishop.

He was Bishop Joseph Nkoko, 43-year-old son of a missionary school teacher, who was named by Pope John XXIII in May to the Titular See of Lucio and made Vicar Apostolic of Lucio, a newly created jurisdiction comprising one half of the Vicariate Apostolic of Luluabourg.

The date of the consecration was chosen by the priests of the Belgian Congo in memory of the first Negro priest of the area. He was Father Charles Mbuya, who died in 1943, and would have observed the 28th anniversary of his ordination on July 1 had he lived.

Villanova Head New Provincial

Philadelphia — (RNS) — The Very Rev. James A. Donnell, O.S.A., president of Villanova University, has been elected provincial of the Province of St. Thomas of the Augustinian Fathers, to succeed the Very Rev. Henry E. Greenlee, O.S.A.

Praised For Vocation Aid

Pittsburgh — (RNS) — Archbishop John F. Dearden of Detroit told 1,700 members of Serra International at its 17th annual convention here that what gives distinction to Serra today is his devotion to the cause of dioceses which may cost the Church many priests, the archbishop reminded the Serrans of their duty to promote the right appraisal of the priest, for "the priesthood is an extension in time of Christ in his Church."

Reds Don't Want Marxism In Schools

Moscow — (RNS) — The Moscow Radio, in its foreign language broadcasts, sharply attacked Richard Cardinal Cushing, Archbishop of Boston, for proposing that Communism be taught in American high schools and colleges so as to expose its "intrinsic evil."

Appearing on a recent program filmed for presentation over a Boston TV station, the cardinal declared that he knew of no other way to arouse people from apathy and indifference over Communism.

The Moscow station accused Cardinal Cushing of starting a crusade against Communism. It said the views expressed by him were "typical of the majority of the American clergy" who were

praised of the priest, for "the priesthood is an extension in time of Christ in his Church."

Archbishop Dearden stressed two qualities which typify those who aspire to the priesthood: one, a special and devoted reverence for the Mass, and the other, a tender and filial love for the Blessed Mother.

Archbishop Albert G. Meyer of Chicago also addressed the Serrans, business and professional men devoted to fostering vocations in the priesthood. He is their episcopal adviser.

Recalling remarks once made by the late Emmanuel Cardinal Suhard of Paris, he urged the laity to know their priests, understand them, stay close to them, pray for them and give them the support of the Church.

He advised the Serrans that the laity has a task to perform which the clergy is not called upon to do — the sanctification of the temporal order.

The private said that no matter how many good books would be published, no matter how holy or devoted priests and religious would be in their own lives, there would still be no Christian life in the temporal order until laymen took it there.

Thirty-five archbishops and bishops from North, Central and South America and the Philippines attended the convention. Delegates elected Dr. Frank R. Hanrahan of Cleveland president of the Serrans, succeeding J. Ray Jordan of Houston, Tex.
