and thus "contribute nothing to the unity of the human family."

In another, the Pope declared that justice should never lead any one to submit to the guidance of those who, whenever they have control of the state, have no scruples "in depriving the souls of their citizens of those things which are the soul's highest goods—We mean the Christian faith, Christian hope and the Christian commandments."

"In addition," the Pope went on, "that which men of the present age and civilization esteem above all else—true liberty, the true and proper dignity of the human person—these men either weaken or entirely suppress; and thus they endeavor to overthrow the very foundations of social and Christian culture."

"Those, therefore, who have a real desire to preserve the Christian name, must entirely shun, as a very grave obligation in conscience, those false teachings which our predecessors, and especially Pius XI and Pius XII, of happy memory, condemned and which we again condemn."

Speaking of the persecution of the Church in Communist countries, the Pope, apparently making special mention of China, spoke of "the many venerable brethren in the episcopate and the beloved priests and faithful who have either been driven into exile, or are held under restraint or in prisons, simply because they have refused to abandon the office of bishop or priest, committed to them, and cut themselves off from the Catholic faith."

Pope John said it was a matter of encouragement that in some places interclass relationships and discussions are "turning out less bitter and less difficult." He said it was encouraging to observe, in regard to wage earners particularly, "the steps recently taken to render more human the conditions under which they are employed by factory workers and those in other fields of labor."

However, the Pope stated, "there still remains a long way to go. Since there continue to exist too many differences in material possessions, there are too many causes of animosity."

Pornography Said Threat To Children

Moodus, Conn. — (NC) — Pornography sent through the mails, constitutes a "sickening threat" to the nation's children, postmasters from throughout Connecticut were told here.

Mrs. Cecil M. Harden, special assistant to the Postmaster General, made the statement in an address at the state convention of the National Association of Postmasters.

REFERRING TO thousands of letters received by the Post Office Department from parents, Mrs. Harden said: "You have only to hear the words of thousands to know how bad the situation really is. I have seen samples of this vicious, vile stuff, and they are so sickening that they are beyond belief."

She said that reports from postal inspectors show that "time after time in investigations of armed robbery, extortion, embezzlement and forgery, it is learned that those responsible for the crimes were early collectors of obscene pictures and films."

The Post Office Department is waging an intensive war against peddlers of pornography, Mrs. Harden said, but must have help from the public if this effort is to have maximum effect.

Moscow — (RNS) — Curious Moscovites who had never before seen a church wedding were among witnesses at the marriage of a New Jersey couple in the Church of St. Louis of France here.

The women among them stared in open admiration at the bride, Mary Louise McMahon, 22, of Tenally, N.J., wearing a sweeping dress of white satin and lace, walked down the aisle to be joined in wedlock to Dennis O'Connor, 26, of Maplewood, N.J., before the flower-decked, candlelit altar of the only Catholic church in the Russian capital.

There were murmurs of surprise when the Russians heard the American bride and groom repeat the marriage vows in Russian after the pastor, Polish-born Father Vitold Bronitsky.

Germany's Luebke

I Am A Man Of Work

Berlin — (NC) — For the first time in modern history Germany has a Catholic chief of state.

Dr. Heinrich Luebke of the Christian Democratic party was elected President of the Federal Republic of Germany here by members of the West German Parliament and representatives of its 11 states.

For the first time, too, the two highest German posts are filled by Catholics since Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, the nation's political leader, continues in office.

Despite the tradition that the two posts should not both be held by members of the same religion, Dr. Luebke has the full confidence of the nation's Protestants. This was stated in June by Lutheran Bishop Otto Dibelius.

Dr. Luebke was chosen President by a vote of 526 to 380 for the Social Democratic candidate, Prof. Carlo Schmid, and 99 for Dr. Max Becker of the conservative Free Democrats.

A former Minister of Food and Agriculture, Dr. Luebke succeeds President Theodor Heuss, a Protestant and former member of the Free Democrats.

The new President, who is 64, is the second chief of state for that industrial district of Western Germany since the population, he had to face difficult problems during the post-war period of need and shortage. He spent 20 months in jail.

President Luebke was born in Enkhausen in Westphalia on Oct. 14, 1894.

Highly respected, but not so widely known as a number of other German political figures, President Luebke has said of himself: "I am not a man of publicity... who likes footlights. I am a man of work."

After studies at the Universities of Bonn, Berlin and Münster, he became particularly interested in agricultural problems and in 1926 helped to found the German Farmers' Association and served as its chairman until 1933. He was elected to the Prussian state parliament in 1931. When the Nazis came to power in 1933 he was forced to give up all his posts.

After the war he took an active part in the newly founded Christian Democratic party of Germany (CDU). He became Minister of Agriculture in the government of North Rhine-Westphalia state in 1947. Responsible for the food supply, he said.

Since 1953 Dr. Luebke has been the Federal Republic's Secretary of Agriculture in Bonn.

As a cabinet member, he often took the opportunity to speak to Catholic organizations, addressing Catholic youths recently, he said.

"If such a catastrophe had arisen 1,000 years ago, the people of that time would have buried alive or hanged the man who was responsible. If you would like to do it this way please do it at once so that I do not need deliver a speech to you first." After this introduction the workers listened to the minister's words and afterwards went back to their jobs.

He has announced he will retire after the next national elections which will take place in September, 1961.

Boston — (RNS) — Thieves broke into Regis College here and stole about half of the famous stamp collection of Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York.

The loss, chiefly United States issues, was estimated "in five figures" by Sister Mary Fidelma, curator, a member of the Sisters of St. Joseph who operate the woman's college. Other officials put the value at \$25,000 to \$50,000 or higher.
