A trip to Livingston County, one of the most picturesque in the Diocese of Rochester, makes a wonderful Sunday afternoon jaunt for the whole family.

Within its boundaries are the popular resort center, Conesus Lake, and the pure cool waters of Hemlock Lake, from which the city of Rochester draws much of its water supply.

In the northern section of the county, which was founded in 1821, is the historical town of Avon, a stop-over point in early days for travelers to the west and once famous for its medicinal springs.

The Avon Inn, on the town's Main Street, was built in 1820. Once a private home, today it uses its simple grandeur to remind the traveler and diner of days gone by.

A few miles to the south is Pittard and the nearby Abbey of Our Lady of the Genesee where Trappist monks still

and pray in vowing silence. Stop and buy a loaf of the now-famous "Monk's Bread."

Now, to the east is Conesus Lake with its many cottages, sail and motor boats and beaches. Pause for a few minutes at McPherson's Point on the east shore to see the summer chapel, St. Margaret's, where lakewalkers attend Sunday Mass.

Further east are the lovely pine hills surrounding Hemlock Lake and the breath-taking view to be had from St. Michael's Mission House on the west shore.

The foundation of the Divine Word Fathers is set high above the lake and visitors are invited to see the impressive shrines, some of them underground, depicting moments in Our Lord's life.

You'll enjoy the serene peace of this hillside, saying the Stations of the Cross in their new outdoor setting — and leave a little something to help the missionaries in their work. — R. S.

Supersonic Wind Tunnel

Washington (NC) — A project to develop an inexpensive supersonic wind tunnel for teaching purposes has been started at the Catholic University of America School of Engineering, it has been announced here.

The National Science Foundation will finance the project with a grant in the amount of \$14,200. Studies will be carried on under the direction of Dr. Gabriel D. Boehler of the Department of Aeronautical Engineering.

Mt. Morris Native Father Larkin Heads Rapid-Growing Parish

Mt. Morris — The subject of a feature article in the "Arlington-Outlook" a suburban Jacksonville, Florida newspaper, was Christ the King Church and its pastor and founder, the Rev. Wm. Thomas Larkin, a former Mt. Morris resident.

The article stated that Christ the King was "one of Florida's fastest growing parishes." It occupies an attractive modern five-building plant and numbers some 3,000 parishioners even after another parish has been formed from its original boundaries.

ACCORDING to the "Outlook" Christ the King parish was formed in the fall of 1954 when Father Larkin welcomed his original flock of 260 persons in a small wooden building on the Jacksonville University campus.

Today Father Larkin's parish has a modern school building, church edifice and convent at Painted Post.
