## Last Rites Held For Mrs. Downs

Waverly — Requiem High Mass was celebrated by the Rev. Charles L. McCarthy, assistant pastor, in St. James Church, Waverly, for Mrs. Michael (Gibbs) Downs, 87, widow of Michael Downs, of 123 Providence Street, Waverly, who died July 6 at her home.

Born in Athens township, Pa., and a resident of this area all her life, Mrs. Downs was a member of the Altar and Rosary Society of St. James Church, Waverly. She was active in the Democratic party for over forty years and, at the time of her death, was the oldest Democratic committeewoman of Ontario County.

SHE IS survived by a daughter, Miss Loretta Downs, a son, Edward, both at home; three nieces, Mrs. L. T. Kimball of Elmira, Mrs. Bernard Hough of Watkins Glen, and Mrs. J. J. Moore of Sayre. For two nephews, John E. Haas of Sayre and Daniel J. Haas of Waverly.

Funeral services were held at the Russell Funeral Home in Waverly. Memorial services were also conducted by the Autumn Leaf Lodge, No. 10, and the Waverly Chapter of the Women of the Moose.

Burial was in St. James cemetery.

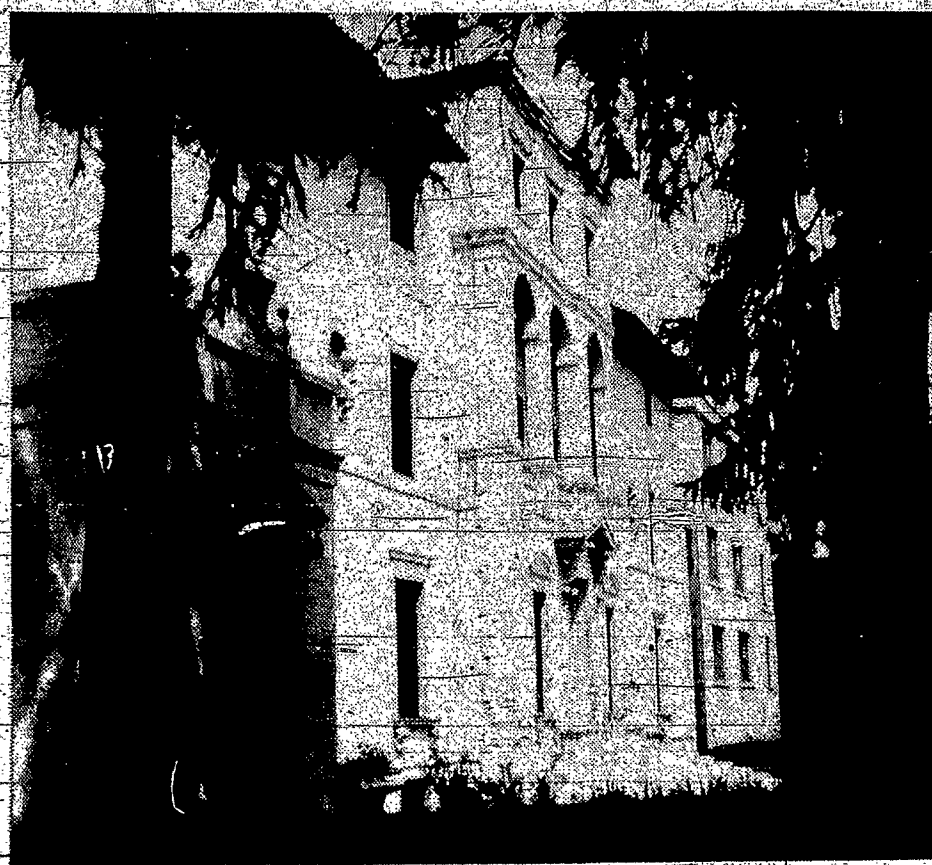
"Ontario" comes from the Iroquois word meaning "beautiful lake," and although it does not touch its namesake, Ontario County includes three very beautiful lakes—Canandaigua, Honeoye and Canadice.

The city of Canandaigua, which because of its central location was once thought of for the state capital, is located at the northern tip of the lake. Besides being a popular resort city, it is the "cradle" of the Sisters of St. Joseph of the Rochester Diocese.

On the outer wall of St. Mary's School, Canandaigua, a bronze plaque reads: "St. Mary's School, Canandaigua, was opened on Saltonstall St. by Mother Agnes Spencer and Sisters Francis Joseph Ivory, Theodosia Hagemann and Petronilla Roscoe, from Carondelet, Mo. Their services were secured by Rev. Edmund O'Connor, Pastor, and Bishop John Timon. They came Dec. 23, 1854, and established here the first home of their Order in New York State."

At the north end of Honeoye Lake is the town of Honeoye with its beautiful new church, St. Mary's, to be dedicated this Sunday by Bishop Kearney. Quickly outgrowing its mission status, St. Mary's is crowded on Sundays during the summer with tourist and lake-dwellers.

In the easternmost part of Ontario County is the city of Geneva and Immaculate Heart of Mary Seminary, under the direction of the Capuchin Fathers, built like a Roman villa, the beautiful seminary building offers a splendid view of Seneca Lake. Its spacious lawns and gardens will soon be open to visitors when plans for a series of shrines replacing statues of pagan gods are complete.

## Carmelites Plan U.S. Aylesford

Dowd Grove, Ill. — (RNS) — The center for the Order of the Third Order will be dedicated here on October 11 by Bishop Martin D. McNamara of Joliet, Ill.

To be known as Aylesford, the National Scapular center also will house the offices of Mary magazine, published bi-monthly by the Carmelite Fathers. Members of the Third Order and Scapular Confraternity will act as hosts here on four Open House days, July 16-19.

THE NAME Aylesford was chosen because it was at the now world famous monastery of St. Simon Stock at Aylesford, England, some 20 miles from London, that the Virgin Mary is believed to have given the Saint the Brown Scapular and the promise: "Whoever dies wearing the Scapular shall not suffer eternal fire." It shall be a sign of salvation, a protection in danger and a pledge of peace.

The promise was made July 16, 1251. Relics of St. Simon, who died in Bordeaux, France, remained in that town for more than 600 years but were brought to England in 1951.

## Keating Urges Soviet Study

Sensor Kenneth B. Keating of Rochester told Congress this week he believes all schools should teach Communist doctrine to expose "the Soviet plan for world domination."

His proposal seconded a suggestion made previously by Cardinal Cushing of Boston.

Catholic high schools and colleges in social studies classes regularly treat basic Communist tenets which are in sharp contradiction to Church teaching on private ownership of property, limits of government, rights and the relationship between capital and labor.

Senator Keating would have similar courses introduced in all schools, public or private.

Anti-Jew Rule To Be Appealed

New York — (RNS) — A State Supreme Court decision barring the Arabian American Oil Company from asking job applicants about their religion will be appealed by the State Commission Against Discrimination, the agency's chairman announced here.

Commissioner Elmer A. Carter said the case will be taken to a higher court. Mr. Carter had exempted the company from complying with state law prohibiting such questions, claiming this was in the best interests of U.S. foreign policy because Aramco employees are often sent to Saudi Arabia — a country which restricts the entry of Jews.

## Owego Boy Scouts At Camp Barton

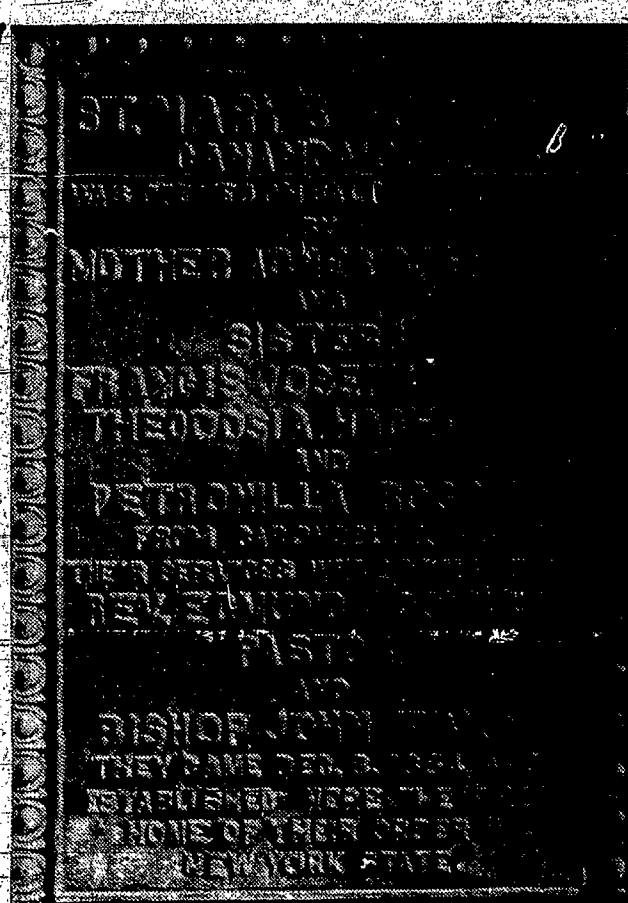
