'My Door Is Always Open'

Cincinnati — (NC) — "He could give lessons to Dale Carnegie!" That was a newspaperman's comment on Giacomo Cardinal Lercaro after watching the colorful Archbishop of Bologna in action.

Widely known for his leadership in the liturgical movement and in social reform, the dynamic prelate will draw from his experiences in both of these areas when he speaks in the U.S. this summer.

His principal address will be given at the North American Liturgical Week, to be held August 23 to 26 at the University of Notre Dame. He has agreed to speak on "Liturgy and Social Action."

He also is scheduled to make a brief visit to Cincinnati and to several other cities.

Everywhere he goes he can expect to be quizzed about his program for reform of the brotherhood of religious who make frequent sorties into the marketplace to bring the Christian message to the masses.

In the heart of the communist camp, members of the brotherhood fight for a chance to get a hearing for the Gospel, even at Red-sponsored rallies.

Franciscans, Dominicans, Servites, and members of other religious congregations, they challenge communist leaders to public debate, play back recordings of communist speeches at embarrassing moments, stage counter-rallies at local festivals.

The Cardinal himself has been known to drop into village restaurants, haunts of communists and other anticlericals, to chat with whoever happens to be there.

According to biographer Georges Huber, "in a few moments he has made respectful acquaintances, if not friends" (Georges Huber's book, "My Door Is Always Open," is to be published soon in an English translation by Fides Publishers, Notre Dame.)

When the Polish communists arrested Stefan Cardinal Wyszynski, who received the red hat at the same time as Cardinal Lercaro, the Bologna Archbishop staged a protest rally in front of St. Petrus Church, directly opposite the headquarters of the communist Mayor.

And after the Hungarian massacre, Cardinal Lercaro ordered the tolling of church bells in his diocese every night — in an area, notes biographer Huber, where only a few short years before, communists had murdered 53 priests.

One of the moving spirits of the liturgical movement, Cardinal Lercaro organized a whole series of exhibits in 1955 to promote liturgical art.

In an address at the First National Congress of Sacred Architecture at Bologna, he criticized the "strange attitude which would immobilize and crystallize the expressions of the liturgical spirit." Such an attitude, he declared, is "a denial of the supreme truth about

and planning a dictionary of the liturgy.

In 1947 Pope Pius XII named him Archbishop of Ravenna, and in 1952 the Holy Father transferred him to Bologna. Archbishop Lercaro became a Cardinal in the same year.

He is well known for the little collection of wait-students, workers, apprentices, household workers — who reside with him. These boys, he says, keep him up to date and in touch with "youth and life."

The Cardinal's special interest in young people is reflected in the annual Children's Carnival he inaugurated, and in the crib-building contest he sponsored.

He has said that "our main effort must be with the children and the young people." If the youngsters follow their elders into Communism, he said, "all the next generation will be lost to the Church."

But his concern for young people doesn't make him unaware of the needs of their elders. He is credited, for example, with inaugurating the "Street Railwayman's Easter," a counterpart of the "Traffic Cop's Epiphany." His object was to give the people a chance to express their gratitude to street railway workers at Easter as they traditionally express it to traffic patrolmen at Epiphany.

The busy Cardinal has organized the building of 30 new churches in 10 years, has planned a housing project for poor newlyweds, has given a day of recollection for members of Parliament, and conducted a retreat for 60 bishops.

Devoted to the Blessed Virgin, he issues a special message to his people on each of her major feasts. And every year he leads a pilgrimage to Lourdes. His episcopate is under the patronage of Mary, and his motto as Bishop is that of St. Bernard, Mater Mea, Fiducia Mea. (My Mother, My Confidence.)

Although the Cardinal himself puts the work of divine worship at the head of all his interests, it is his aggressive anti-communist tactics that have perhaps won his most attention.

When he was first appointed pastor of Immaculate Conception Church in Genoa, back in the 1930s, his first work there was to stir up the liturgical life of the people through lively participation in divine worship. He also turned his attention immediately to works of charity and Catholic Action.

His works of charity at Genoa got him into trouble, for he protected in his own house Jews and other persons who were targets of Nazi or fascist wrath. For a time the future Cardinal had to hide outside of Genoa, while the Germans hunted him. He used the time for composing a book on mental prayer.

Prelate Raps Exploiting Of Mexicans

San Antonio — (NC) — The United States program under which Mexican workers — braceros — are brought into this country as farm laborers has been labeled a "national disgrace... the American badge of infamy."

The description came from Archbishop Robert E. Lucey of San Antonio, who appealed here for an end to the bracero and migratory labor programs before a Texas veterans organization, the American GI Forum.

The prelate, who has often commented on the problems connected with the bracero program, said:

"The bracero program in American agriculture is a national disgrace. It is the American badge of infamy."

"The truth is that we do not need 500,000 alien workers to harvest our crops of food and fiber. The presence in our country of this immense pool of imported labor causes unemployment among American citizens and depresses wages to incredibly low levels."

"Only a savage would pay that wage in American agriculture," he added.

Bathing Beauty Shows Scored As Sinful

New Orleans — (RNS) — Archbishop Joseph F. Rummel of New Orleans scored beauty contests as violating "correct standards of Christian virtue" and expressed his unqualified opposition to them.

In a public statement prompted by the current Miss America and Miss Universe contests, the prelate said: "From all accounts and descriptions, beauty contests certainly come within the classification of demonstrations which violate correct standards of Christian virtue and give occasion to thoughts, imagination, desires and even actions which are contrary to the ideals to which Christ refers to beautifully in the beatitudes. 'Blessed are the clean of heart, for they shall see God.'"

Last year, Archbishop Edwin V. Byrne of Santa Fe, N.M., warned Catholic girls of his See that those taking part in beauty contests would be excommunicated.
