

Romania Persecution Described At Meeting

Cleveland (RNS) — The plight of the Roman Catholic Byzantine Rite Church in Romania was dramatically emphasized at the 11th national convention here of the Association of Romanian Catholics of America.

Addressing the delegates at Cleveland urged prayers for the persecuted Church and for members of the Eastern Orthodox Churches which broke away from Rome in the schism of 1054.

One of the liturgy's concelebrants was Father Peter Moga, pastor of the Holy Spirit Church in Dearborn, Mich., a former of six bishops in the Eastern Orthodox Church.

The meeting was held at the Hotel Commodore, New York City, from July 29 to August 3.

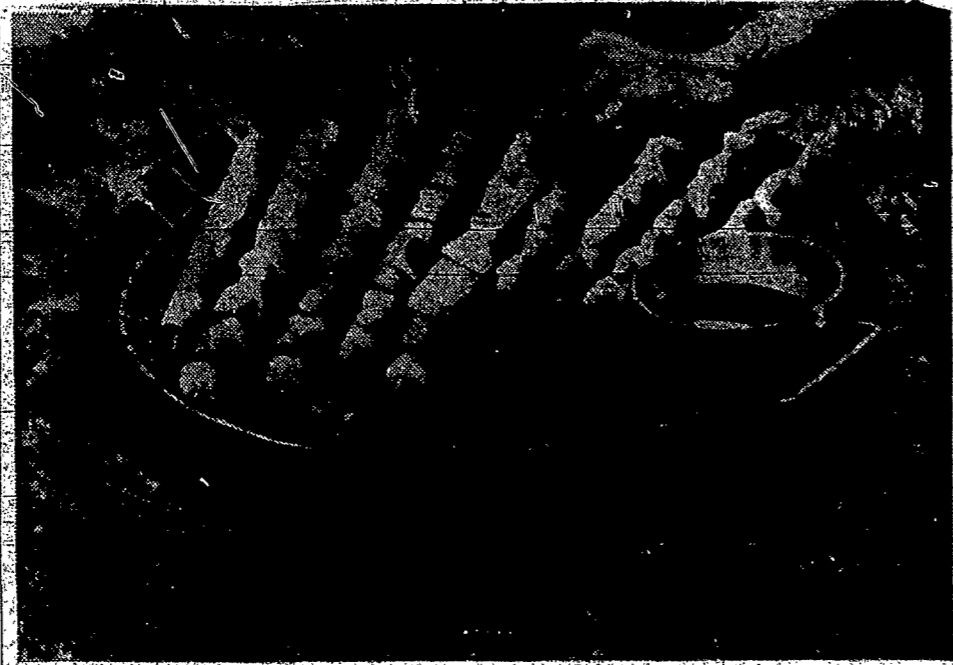

OUTDOOR COOKING AT ITS BEST

At Home With Trudy McNall

When It's Kebab-Becue Time

It's summer time, and the living is easy. Sort of makes you feel just plain lazy . . . but I wonder if it really does. As soon as the weather forecast is blue skies and warm weather, you're "on the go" . . . vacations and motor trips . . . and when you're in this spirit, you want to eat adventurously, too.

No easier said than done when you've got the simple makings for a really different, delicious barbecue dish. This KEBAB-BECUE is a distant cousin to the original "shish kebab" which in Turkish, means meat roasted on a stick over an open charcoal fire. It sounds sort of exotic, but it's oh-so-simple to prepare and this recipe has a new twist.

YOU TAKE THAT peculiar favorite . . . the plain old hamburger or hot dog if you wish to call it such . . . and make a skewerful of good eating by alternating with chunks of canned pineapple. Then they're basted with a savory sauce and allowed to broil. I think the whole family will applaud these crazy kebabs. These quantities will serve 3 or 4 people . . . and if you need more, it's easy as pie to expand the recipe.

KEBAB-BECUES

1 No. 2 can pineapple chunks
1 pound frankfurters
1 T. Vinegar
3 T. Soy Sauce
1 clove garlic, mashed or 1/4 t. garlic powder

Drain pineapple chunks, reserving syrup. Cut frankfurters into bite-sized chunks. Thread alternate chunks of pineapple and frankfurters on long skewers, starting and ending with pineapple. Combine reserved syrup, vinegar, soy sauce and garlic in bowl. Brush skewers liberally with sauce. Broil on grill, about

4 inches from heat, about 15 minutes, basting often with sauce. Serve 3 to 4.

You can make these Kebabs on rainy days, too, by using the broiler of your stove.

HOW TO BUY FRANKFURTERS (frankfurts, frankfurters, weiners) are sold in packages or by the pound. Flavors and ingredients vary. It is important to buy by brand to get the quality desired. Allow 1 or 2 per person. Keep frankfurters in the original package or wrap loosely in waxed paper. Keep in the refrigerator. Use within 3 or 4 days to enjoy the fine flavor. Today's "hot dog" takes its place among America's finest meats for it's a combination of tender-juicy meats and wonderful spices and seasonings, encased, then smoked to a tantalizing turn over hickory or other hardwood.

IF YOU WISH to serve them hot, simmer them in water just below the boiling point. Do not pierce skins; tongs are best for turning. Frankfurters are delicious broiled. Brush each frankfurter with melted butter, or salad oil. Broil about 2 or 3 inches from heat allowing about 3 or 4 minutes per side. To pan broil frankfurters, melt 1 T. shortening in skillet, and saute 1 pound frankfurters turning occasionally until just brown.

Some of the other team mates you might think of are: baked beans, pickle or hot dog relish, mustard, ketchup, pineapple, apple sauce, barbecue sauce, Spanish rice or macaroni with cheese topped with slices of frankfurters. You can think of dozens of ways of serving frankfurters.

IF YOU'RE having a charcoal fire for your picnic remember that fires should always be reduced to glowing coals, with white ash caps, before the cooking begins. It takes about an hour for the coals to get the proper glow and, once heated, they should be spread out to extend beyond the food. Be sure to get your fire going before the gang arrives, and have sabbles on hand—carrot sticks, olives, pickles, chips and goodies . . . to take the edge off of appetites, or you'll be pressured into cooking too soon.

PROPER TOOLS are essential to building a good meal. You'll need a sprinkler-topped bottle full of water to drip over the coals should fat cause flaming. Long handled forks and tongs should be used to manipulate hot foods so you won't burn yourself. If you line the bottom of your grill with several layers of heavy duty aluminum foil to catch the drippings and contain the ashes, cleaning up will be easier. The foil will speed up the cooking process a little, too.

Don't salt meat until it's fairly done or it may toughen. Save time and effort by cooking such vegetables as potatoes and corn on the cob deep in the glowing coals. Butter the potatoes, puncture and wrap each spud in foil before burying. Husks should be removed from corn before each ear is popped into foil with a bit of butter and salt.

Whether you are barbecuing or kebabeating, the sound is fun. The secret of your success, for example stuff with a strip of cheese, wrap a broil of bacon around and broil or bake until bacon is crisp and frankfurter is hot.

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Scrolls Said Aid To Bible Knowledge

Miami (NC) — An increased understanding of the Bible will result from the translation of the Dead Sea Scrolls, according to a Scripture scholar who recently returned from a year's study of the ancient documents in Jerusalem.

AN EXPERT in Semitic and scriptural studies, Father Raymond Brown, S.S., was granted a research fellowship by the American School of Oriental Research in Jerusalem. He speaks four languages and reads 10 more.

In an interview here, Father Brown declared that study of the Dead Sea Scrolls will increase our understanding of the Old Testament by giving us "a better picture and history of the Hebrew text" of that part of the Bible.

"Up to the discovery of the Dead Sea Scrolls," he explained, "the oldest Hebrew text of the Old Testament was from the 10th century A.D. Here we have the text of the Old Testament as it was in the third to the first centuries B.C."

"For New Testament background," he added, "the scrolls give us a large body of theological literature that is roughly contemporary with Christ's time. It is important because up to this discovery there was little Jewish literature of this period."

Heads Theatines
Rome (NC) — Father Julian Adrover, a 69-year-old Spaniard from the island of Majorca, has been elected Superior General of the Congregation of Claret Regular (Theatine Fathers).
