Ordained At Mt. Saviour

Five years of service in Sacred Heart Cathedral parish, Rochester, was celebrated this week by the Committee of Christian Home and Family, sponsored by the Cathedral Rosary Guild.

The Rev. Benedict Tighe, O.S.B. was ordained a Benedictine Priest by Bishop Kearney in a ceremony held last Saturday morning in Our Lady Queen of Peace Chapel at Mount Saviour Monastery near Elmira.

The fourth Priest to be ordained at the Monastery, Tighe celebrated his first Mass in the Chapel the following day.

Bishop Kearney was celebrant of the Mass and was assisted by Very Rev. Msgr. Edward McAniff, secretary to the Bishop and Rev. John S. Hayes, pastor of St. Patrick's church. The Very Rev. Damasus Winzen, O.S.B., prior of the Monastery was Archdeacon and presented the candidate for ordination.

THE CEREMONY was attended by over 200 including Father Tighe's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Tighe of Somerville, Mass. A luncheon and reception was held at the Monastery following the ordination. Father Benedict spent one year at the Novitiate at St. Benoit du Lac in Quebec then pursued his theological studies at the International Benedictine College in Rome.

He is scheduled to return to Rome for further studies in the fall.

Formed to serve new mothers of the parish, workers visit the homes every three months from the time the child is three months old until he reaches his third birthday.

ON EACH visit, the mother receives a pamphlet containing practical hints to help her teach her child the rudiments of the Catholic Faith and the proper development of his character. In five years, 1185 babies have been registered by the committee and 250 have completed the year period. About 280 have moved from the parish and one-half of these have received complete sets of folders. Of the 1185 registered, about 200 families have had a second, third or fourth child. In all, 5,329 visits have been made to Sacred Heart Homes.

THIS WEEK, the Cathedral Parish Bulletin paid special tribute to Mrs. Maurice Gorman, chairman, and the ladies of the committee "for their devoted and loyal cooperation and their generosity in giving many hours of their time to make this program of Catholic Action a success."

Catholic Action Summer School Set in Buffalo

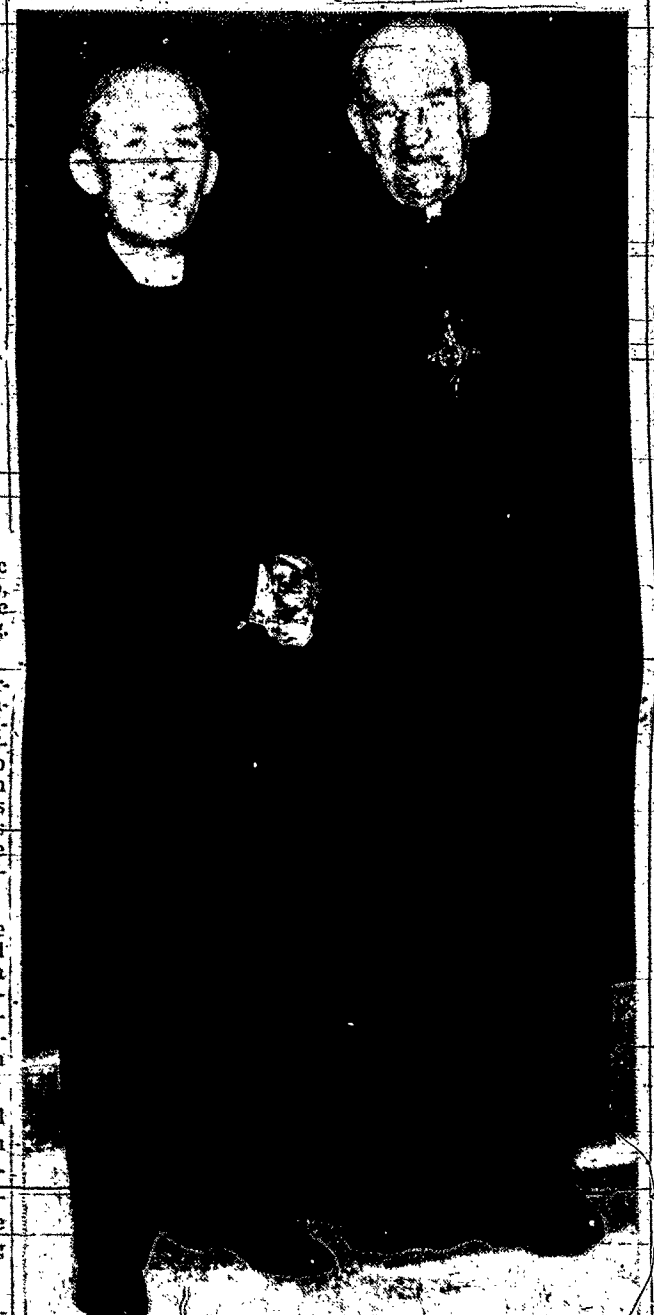
Summer School of Catholic Action will return to Buffalo, New York for sessions at the latter Hilton Hotel on Aug. 10.

Mercy To Millions Refugees Needs Cited

New York — (RNS) — Representatives of some 40 religious and other non-governmental groups which are members of the American Council of Voluntary Agencies for Foreign Service joined here in launching the World Refugee Year in this country.

Protestant, Roman Catholic and Jewish leaders were among more than 700 persons attending a luncheon which marked the council's 16th anniversary of successful co-operation in behalf of millions of refugees.

Msgr. Edward E. Swanstrom of New York told the guests that the council "represents a pluralism of American society — a pluralism that is ethnic, regional and cultural." He is

executive director of Catholic Relief Services-National Catholic Welfare Conference, and the Council's chairman.

Dean Francis B. Sayre, Jr., of Washington Cathedral (Episcopal) lauded refugees as assets to countries receiving them. "They represent the best of their countrymen for they risked hardships and even death to live as free men," Dean Sayre is chairman of the U.S. Committee for Refugees, organized to promote the World Refugee Year.

Delivering the keynote address, Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey (D.-Minn.) called for a "why appeal that would be personal rather than organizational." "Let us be sensitive to the needs and wants of people — it takes individuals to help individuals," he said.

Moses A. Levitt, the council's honorary chairman and executive vice-chairman of the American-Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, presided at the luncheon.

"The success of the Year," he said, "depends on how much voluntary groups together with governments of the free world will do in behalf of the help-less victims of war, revolutions and persecutions in every corner of the globe, for a future of freedom, independence and security."

Msgr. Swanstrom noted that aid channeled through overseas outlets of the council's member agencies to "European, Asian and African refugees since 1946 averaged annually \$125 million. Citing the distribution of a quarter-billion pounds of U.S. surplus dairy products and grains, during the period, he said, "In Hong Kong, Calcutta and Pusan, children are alive today only because they are supplied with regular amounts of this life-saving food."
