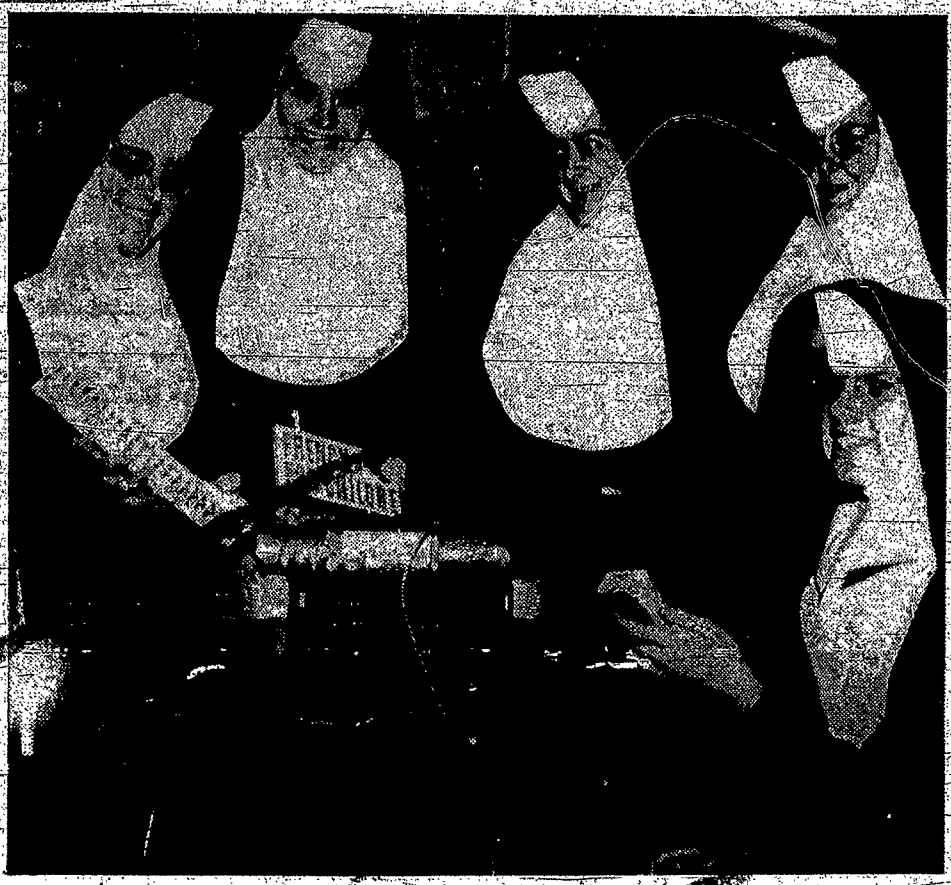

Students 'Parlez-Vous' For French Teachers

Sister students of French in the summer session of Catherine McAuley Junior College saw a demonstration of the teaching of French to elementary pupils last week. Sister Mary Celeste, instructor of the course, taught sixteen of her French pupils from St. Louis School, Pittsford, demonstrating their ability to pray, converse, and do arithmetic problems in French. They entertained the sisters with French songs and dances and scenes from Mother Goose plays they had presented for the public during the year. Cinderella, Snow White, Little Red Riding Hood, and The Three Bears.

Philosophers Needed More Than Scientists

Davenport — (NC) — American Catholic colleges and universities, according to Bishop John J. Wright of Pittsburgh, probably turn out their share of graduates who, though not "professional intellectuals," are nourished by such intellectual fare as good books, good conversation and good music.

BISHOP WRIGHT said in an interview here that he welcomed the debate on Catholicism and the intellectual life which began in Catholic circles several years ago. "The debate speeded the end of the anti-intellectualism in the air that time and help force underground," he said.

However, said the Bishop, he never shared the contention that Catholic colleges and universities, or our schools on any level, had proved notably deficient in turning out people appreciative of the intellectual life.

"I never went along with the thesis of 'some' who seemed to feel that our schools had let us down by a failure to produce competent intellectuals," Bishop Wright declared that Catholic schools produce Catholic poets, philosophers and editors than that they produce scientists.

"I'm not sure I know what is meant by the term 'Catholic scientist,'" he said. "I know what is meant by a 'Catholic intellectual.' It means a man whose thoughts and values are colored by his Catholicism as mathematics could never be.

"Poetry and philosophy are concerned with values rather than with formulas, with thoughts rather than things, and there is where the battle for human and divine civilization is ultimately won."

On the education of priests and nuns, Bishop Wright said it is the "obligation of the church" to see to it that Latin and Greek studies and the liberal arts curriculum are made inescapable in the lives of gifted children in our schools.

Cure Of Ars Feast Changed

Vallonia City — (NC) — Pope John XXIII has transferred observance of the feast of St. John Vianney, the Cure d'Ars, to August 8 this year. The feast is ordinarily celebrated on August 5, but that date falls on a Sunday this year. This year is the centenary of the death of the Cure d'Ars, the patron of parish priests, and the Pope has been encouraging solemn celebrations in his honor.

Jesuits Plan Belgium Univ.

Antwerp — (RNS) — Plans for a Roman Catholic university in Antwerp, to be operated by the Jesuits, advanced here with the announcement that a law and political science faculty will be organized in October. The school, to be launched as a university institute, will later be developed into a full-fledged university. The institute will be an autonomous division of the University of Notre Dame de la Paix at Namur.

Laity Meet Set In Cuba

Havana — (NC) — The Bishops of Cuba will convene a first Congress of the Lay Apostolate in November, intended to extend Catholic spirituality and participation in all phases of national life.

The announcement proceeded by a few hours a television address by Fidel Castro during Cuba's recent government crisis. Bishop Diaz y Cia said the lay apostolate congress will also be a gathering of the faithful at the Shrine of Our Lady of Charity, in Cobre, near Santiago.
