### Students 'Parlez-Vous' For French Teachers

Sister-students of French in the summer session of Catherine McAuley Junior College saw a demonstration of the teaching of French to elementary pupils last week. Sister Mary Celeste, instructor of the course, taught sixteen of her French pupils from St. Louis School, Pittsford, demonstrating their ability to pray, converse, and do arithmetic problems in French. They entertained the sisters with French songs and dances and scenes from Mother Goose plays they had presented for the public during the year. SISTER MARY CELESTE described the program as it is operating at St. Louis School, St. Thomas School under Sister Mary Caritas, and at Saint Patrick's School, Elmira, under Sister Mary Gratia.

The students meet three times a week and classes are conducted entirely in French. Assignments include the listening to children's French records and various conversational activities.

Students from third grade through eighth are taking part in the program. Approximately fifty are registered in each of the three pilot schools and comparable expansion is planned for the fall since the response on the part of both pupils and parents has been enthusiastic.

Children eligible for confirmation are those who have reached 10 years of age by that date. Adults to be confirmed will be those who have been received into the church this year, or any other adults who have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation, Father O'Malley said.

Bishop Casey will be guest of honor at a dinner with the clergy at the rectory immediately following the ceremony. He will give the sermon for the occasion.

REGISTRATION FOR the confirmation class will take place late in August, and classes will then begin in preparation for the event.
