

## Priest Jubilarian Counts 18 Thousand Masses

Utica—(NC)—An unusual record of 50 years of Masses was revealed by Father Joseph F. Ellis, retired priest of the Syracuse diocese, as he celebrated his Golden Jubilee Mass in St. Agnes Church here.

Father Ellis told his fellow priests that from his first Mass in 1909, he has kept a record of the dates and intentions of each Mass he has offered, including his Jubilee Mass. Father Ellis' record shows 18,643 Masses.

Bishop Walter A. Foley of Syracuse presided at the Jubilee Mass.

## At Home With Trudy McNall

### Good Flavor Get-Together



Right now, if you have a tomato, you are in luck. Tomatoes are in season and they are in season when they are in season. According to a recent study by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, happily for New Yorkers, the season for tomatoes approaches and it is when tomatoes are in season that they are at their low in price and peak in quality.

HAVE YOU ever eaten a tomato right off the vine? While it's still warm from the sun? Treat your stomach to a tomato. There are dozens of ways to enjoy fresh, ripe tomatoes now. In salads, as a relish, steamed, stewed.

For those of you who want to fix a well-rounded meal with as little effort as possible, this suggestion will be really handy. The next time you bake fish sticks, by this variation, bake hollowed-out tomatoes at the same time, then fill with buttered fresh peas and serve them all from the same platter. This delicious meal can be ready in only half an hour from the time you start to heat the oven.

Here's the schedule. When you come in from shopping, from the garden or the office, turn on the oven to 350 degrees. Wash 4 luscious tomatoes and scoop out the centers. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and place them on a baking sheet. Arrange a package of frozen fish sticks on the same sheet.

THESE ARE ready to cook right from the package, so there's no mark sheet but the sheet in the oven and bake for 15 to 20 minutes. While the fish and tomatoes are baking you can cook the peas, add seasonings to taste and a little butter. If you happen to have some fresh mint, add a little of that for a different taste. When the baking time is up, spoon peas into the tomatoes. Arrange the fish sticks and tomatoes on a platter, add lemon wedges for garnish.

Fish sticks (the latest of the fish freezing industry's contributions to the fast tempo of today's living) are breaded and prefried sticks of cod, haddock, ocean perch, halibut, salmon or swordfish, about 3 to 4 inches long, which resemble large-cut French fried potatoes.

Because fish sticks, oven heated on a cookie sheet or platter, eliminate the scouring of greasy frying pans, because they are so uniform in size and because there is no waste—they are gaining in popularity not only for dinner but for lunch and as cocktail party nibbles.

You probably have some wonderful ideas for serving them but here are a few suggestions: Savory Sautéed Fish Sticks: Before placing the sticks in the oven to brown, sprinkle with one of the different salts on the market such as onion, apple or celery salt.

CHEESE-FISH STICKS: Sprinkle sticks with grated Parmesan cheese.

HERB-BAKE FISH STICKS: Sprinkle with one of these mixtures: Thyme, marjoram, and oregano; parsley, celery flakes and poultry seasoning.

SAVORY FISH STICKS: Spread sticks with prepared mustard.

Let's consider tomatoes a little more. Remember that for best color, flavor, texture and food value they should ripen at room temperature or a little below, between 60 and 75 degrees. For vitamin value, ripen tomatoes in good light, but not where it is hot or in direct sunlight. Thus the habit of placing tomatoes on the window sill,

In direct sunlight ripen is not advisable, because at temperatures above 85 degrees F. tomatoes turn yellow and red. Unripe tomatoes, if refrigerated, become pale, watery, soft and lose the vitamin rapidly.

Without Love . . . Nothing!

Too many babies were dying. A newly built foundling home suddenly made this discovery. The equipment which permitted the home to be built had not spared any expense. All equipment was the finest. The doctors were the best. The nurses were well trained. The entire staff functioned smoothly. But the infant mortality rate kept climbing.

Alarmed by this condition the staff had many meetings. Investigation followed. The cause of death could not be determined. Then one young doctor had a theory.

Because of the inefficiency of the facilities only a few nurses were employed to care for the babies. There were approximately ten nurses for every hundred babies. That meant that each baby had one-tenth of a mother. The nurses were affluent. But there was little time for mothering. The babies were being cared for on a production line basis.

Women were hired just to mother the children. Each child was given a couple of hours of individual attention every day. The bottle was not stuck into the baby's mouth as the nurse moved, along to put nine other bottles in nine other mouths but the baby was held in the arms of a woman during the feeding. They were no longer diapered with the precision of an automatic packaging machine but these "mothers" took time to give each baby individual attention. . . . A little affection and a loving pat on that part of the human anatomy built best for receiving a pat.

Results amazed all. Immediately the mortality rate dropped. The children were healthier. Disease resistance increased. And all because these babies who will ever remain individuals began to be treated as individuals.

The need for love is as universal as the need to breathe. This is true for children. It is true for you and me. And each must give in proportion as he is able, and according to the others' needs. We must remember this in our association with others. After all, that is why the greatest commandment tells us, "Love the Lord God above all things and love your neighbor as yourself for the love of God."

## Initiation Riot

### Priest Absolves Student Victims

Leon, Nicaragua—(NC)—"I am a priest! Let me pass!"

With these words, Father Mark Hurley of San Francisco passed through a platoon of soldiers firing on a group of students to give absolution to the dying and to help care for the wounded.

The U.S. priest was traveling as a chaplain on a ship and was visiting Leon to see his colonial churches.

"No one expected such serious occurrences. The students did not attack the troops," said Father Hurley.

The youths were staging their customary comic parade with the permission of the authorities at the beginning of the school year to "initiate" the new students at the National University here.

## Priest Absolves Student Victims

The youths were religious militants and Catholics around their necks. Those who were still conscious immediately assented to the act of contrition.

Father Hurley, who is principal of the Marin Catholic High School at San Rafael, Calif., stated that he saw no evidence that the National Guard troops had been subjected to violence by the students.

After aiding the youths who fell first in the vicinity of Leon's Central Park, Father Hurley administered absolution to 32 wounded taken to neighboring houses.

One of the students who led him by the arm from house to house approached the wounded saying: "Here is the Father."
