New Windows To Be Blessed At Monastery

Rev. Damasus Winsen, O.S.B., prior, will bless the new stained glass windows in Our Lady Queen of Peace Chapel at Mount Saviour Monastery on Sunday, Aug. 9, following vespers at 4:30 p.m.

The new windows are the gift of Miss Mary Mann of Elmira in memory of Gertrude Holleran.

NORMAN DALY, Professor of Art at Cornell University was chosen to design the windows. Daly has achieved both national and international success in his field.

He has exhibited at the Carnegie and the Chicago Art Institute, at the Whitney and the Metropolitan Art Museums, and at the Corcoran Gallery. He spent some time lecturing in France and Italy for the Parsons School of Design. His one man exhibits in New York City received outstanding reviews.

Professor Daly's design was executed by Lyman Gibbs, well-known glass craftsman of Elmira.

THE GENERAL theme of the whole series of windows is the mystery of time. Four sets of windows develop this theme focusing in turn on day, week, year and lifetime of a monk.

The glass, imported from England, France, and Germany, is placed in the frames in large pieces and is not cut in the traditional mosaic pattern.

Monks are planning tours of the Chapel during Dedication Day on Aug. 16, as well as this Sunday. They will explain many of the specific symbols of Professor Daly's designs. The public is welcome at any time.

Dr. and Mrs. John T. McKiernan of Geneseo, accompanied by their nine children will spend the next year in Ireland. Dr. McKiernan, who has taught at Geneseo State for ten years and served as head of the Department of English and Foreign Languages, was awarded a Hill Foundation Fellowship for study in the Emerald Isle.

HE IS IN Ireland at present leading a group of American college graduates on a drama tour which was planned previous to his winning the fellowship.

Mrs. McKiernan and the children will fly to join Dr. McKiernan in Dublin on Aug. 22. In Ireland, the younger children will attend local schools and Deirdre, who has just completed her sophomore year at Nazareth College in Dublin.

WHEN THE McKiernans return from Ireland, Dr. McKiernan will assume new duties as head of the English Department at the College of St. Thomas, St. Paul, Minn.

He will also have charge of the college's Gaelic Collection, reputedly the second best in the country, and a TV program sponsored by the English Department.

Rochester Native, Jesuit Climbs Highest Peak In Philippines

The mountain climbing exploits of Mr. Thomas Fitzpatrick S.J., Jesuit Philippine missionary and Rochester native, were featured in the latest edition of Philippine Studies, a quarterly published in the Islands.

In company with four other Jesuits, Mr. Fitzpatrick scaled the heights of 10,000 ft. Mount Apo, the highest peak in the Philippines. The climb commemorated the 100th Anniversary of the unsuccessful first attempt to conquer Apo in 1858.

THREE OF THE peaks which make up Apo's summit were "christened" by the Jesuit ventures. Two of the three were named after the two men who made the first successful ascent in 1880: Jesuit Father Giebert and Governor Rajaf, governor of the Province of Davao.

The third was named Xavier.

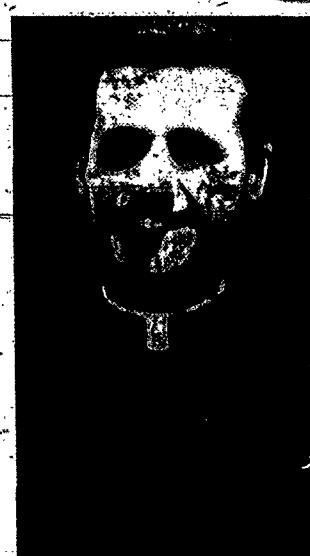

Father O'Meara is the last member of the founding administrative staff to be transferred. He will take up teaching duties in the sociology department of Assumption University in Windsor, Ont., in the fall.

As first dean of the college, Father O'Meara helped open the college to the first freshman class in September, 1951.
