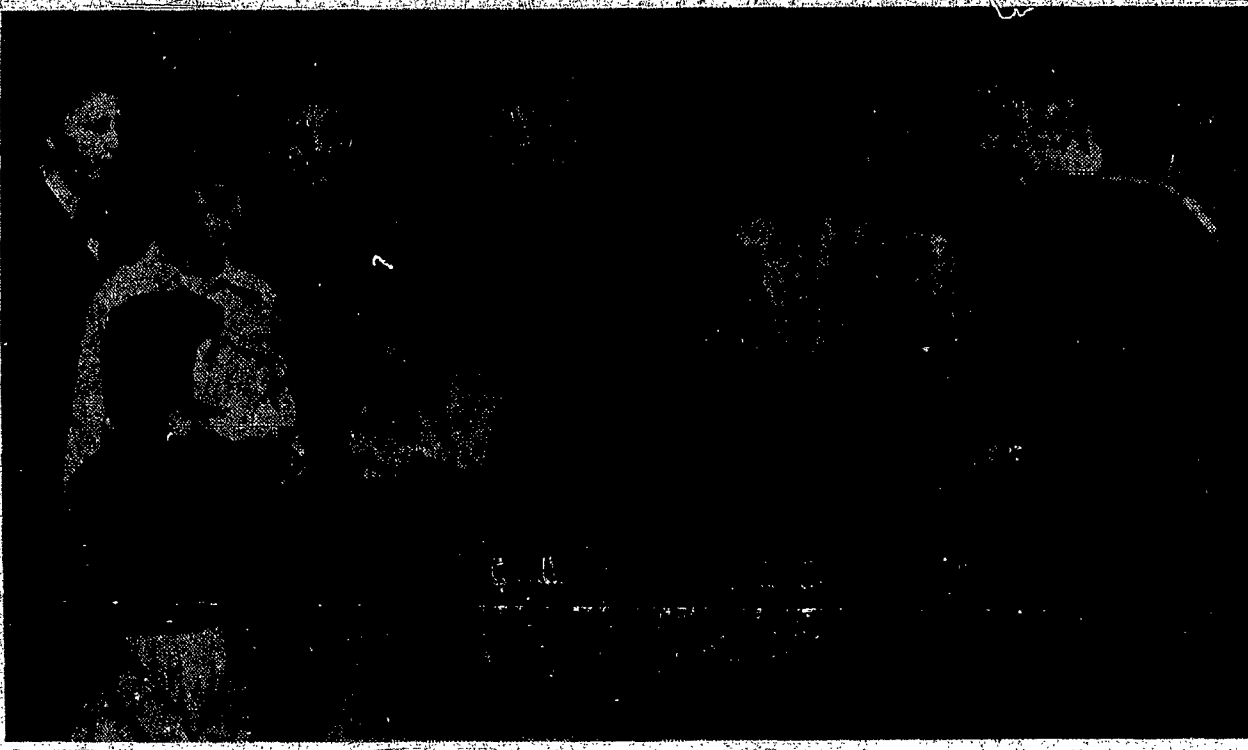

On the frontispiece the reader is reminded that "Daily meditation is light for the will, consolation for the heart, a source of peace and happiness during this life, and a help to ward eternal salvation." "These meditations are short and vary from day to day so that the student may more easily be faithful to them and each morning offer to God the day which is beginning. "Thanks to these short meditations, the young girl accustoms herself to pray for others and not to forget the great truths which ought to guide her life toward peace, happiness, success, and sanctity. "Moreover these meditations made with piety and love will be a great protection to the student and a source of grace. They will assist her also to comprehend more deeply the value of living in the state of grace. "Lastly, fidelity to these short exercises will permit her to strengthen her will and, above all, to familiarize herself with that wonderful means of salvation the perfect act of contrition. The author closes the introduction by asking that the student promise herself two things: 1. I shall make my short meditation each morning; 2. Each day I shall be faithful to my Rosary and to my evening prayers. "EACH DAY'S exercises open with the Morning Offering and an act of contrition. The book must be privately printed, for although it bears the imprimatur of the ecclesiastical authorities of Quebec and is in its fourth edition, no publisher is listed. Once more the confining reins of the Catholic Church come under fire. This time, it is the refusal of certain bishops to allow girls within their spiritual jurisdiction to participate in bathing suit contests. The "mean old men" who "don't understand" "a lady's world" are screamed at from within and without their own dioceses. Fortunately for their flocks, these "mean old men" understand all too well today's world, know the dangers inherent in such exhibitions. "It's a talent hunt!" simultaneously declare promoters, seeing big profits endangered. "This is not just a beauty contest. To win, a young lady must have talent. Understand that!" GRANTED, Miss 36-24-36 should be able to sing and/or dance — but she has to prove her talent (and her measurements) in a bathing suit via a publicly judged contest. Realizing that this competition could be the occasion of serious sin, the Bishop (the "mean old man") forbids the Catholic girl to display herself publicly in the manner required. Depending on the nature of the contest, the Bishop is forced by his conscience and the responsibility of his holy office to announce a terrible threat to anyone who defies the judgment.

SOMETIMES, one of the "coolish maidens" sells out, gambles her most precious heritage against the chance of a silly crown on her head, applause from a leering crowd, and the "opportunity" to enter more fully into an environment where there will be even greater temptations. When this happens, her Church can only pray for a return to sanity of this feminine Esau who has sold her birthright for a mess of pottage — or a chance at that mess. In this sorry state, the term "Holy Mother Church" seems to this observer a "misnomer." I'd rather think that it is "Holy Father Church" speaking. At our house and at yours, minor but similar situations have arisen. Things go along: time-wasting, meaningless activities are indulged in by youngsters — especially good, not really bad. Mother talks and reprimands against "ever-clearing" a r. r. Comes THE TIME. That's when Father proves himself the Head of the House with a firm, authoritative pronouncement, not of "What's What, but of That's That — and no foolin'."
