

Government Funds Given For Research

Washington—(RNS)—Surgeon General Leroy E. Burney of the U.S. Public Health Service announced grants to several church-related universities and hospitals to help build and equip additional health research facilities.

The grants include \$216,642 to Catholic University of America to assist the construction and equipment of a new biology building; \$300,000 to Georgetown University (Catholic) for a science and basic research building; and \$5,778 to the University of San Francisco (Catholic) for additional equipment for chemistry and biology research laboratories previously given a construction grant.

Other institutions getting assistance were: Presbyterian-St. Luke's Hospital, Chicago, \$24,780 for more equipment to supplement an earlier building grant for a medical science research center; Beth Israel Hospital (Jewish), New York \$184,865 for renovation and expansion of research laboratories; and Maimonides Hospital (Jewish), Brooklyn, N.Y., \$38,500 to equip a medical science research building.

POAU Raps Protestant NY Seminary

Washington—RNS—Union Theological Seminary in New York was criticized here by the National Association of Evangelicals for accepting federal aid in support of graduate study in theology. The NAE warned that acceptance of such grants represents a serious new violation of Church-State separation.

The Rev. Donald H. Gill, NAE associate secretary for public affairs, said that if the present trend continues "the United States will find itself involved in a form of church establishment."

Another criticism of the seminary's action came from Dr. Glenn L. Archer, Executive Director of Protestants and other Americans United for separation of Church and State (POAU). He asked: "What has happened to separation of Church and State in a country where the training of clergymen is now to be financed from tax funds?"

Union Seminary has applied and received support from the U.S. Office of Education for a program to train college teachers of religion. Five fellowships have been awarded to Protestant ministers who are seeking the degree of Doctor of Theology (Th.D.) with the intention of becoming college teachers. The grants are being made under Title Four of the National Defense Education Act of 1958, designed to encourage preparation of college teachers to meet the growing shortage of teachers on American campuses.

Lutheran Guest Of Cardinal

Munich—(NC)—A Danish Lutheran bishop and his wife were the house guests of Joseph Cardinal Wendel, Archbishop of Munich and Freising, during the biennial meeting of German Protestants here.

Lutheran Bishop D. Froder Beyer of Hadersleben and Mrs. Beyer stayed at the archbishop's palace here during the five-day "Kirchentag."

Priests Ordered To Take Rest

Hildesheim—(NC)—Bishop Heinrich Maria Janssen of Hildesheim has ordered all priests of his diocese to observe September as a "rest month."

"Shortage of priests and growing tasks are endangering the health of our priests; therefore, we must make new attempts to get some rest for them," the Bishop stated.

Alhambra Votes Aid For Retarded

Detroit—(NC)—Delegates to the 28th biennial Order of Alhambra convention here voted to raise \$30,000 a year to support a program for teaching and religious training of exceptional children.

The action was taken after the delegates heard an address by Father William Jenks, C.S.S.R., of Washington, D.C., who is associate secretary for special education of the National Catholic Educational Association.

"THERE ARE ONLY 16 dioceses in the United States that have a planned program for the religious instruction of Catholic handicapped children," Father Jenks said. "The leakage in the Faith in this area is very, very serious."

(Holy Childhood School on Andrews St., Rochester, provides special classes for such children.)

Father Jenks explained that his work in the NCEA calls for training nuns, brothers and lay teachers throughout the country to teach them religion.

Congress Studies Aid To Refugees

Washington—(RNS)—Sen. Thomas C. Hennings (D-Mo.) has introduced a world refugee relief act which greatly expands the American program for aiding "homeless people."

In a bill drawn up in consultation with the U.S. Committee on Refugees, headed by Dean Francis B. Sayre, Jr., of the National Cathedral (Episcopal) here, Sen. Hennings calls for a broad new program which would combine the facilities of the government, "United Nations" and church and social organizations.

THE HENNING'S bill would greatly increase the number of refugees admitted annually to the United States, and would give an added American push to refugees trying to move from one country to another abroad.

Twenty thousand refugees beyond those authorized by existing quotas and 5,000 physically handicapped refugees would be admitted annually to the United States under the measure.

The bill also would resume the refugee-orphan program under which orphaned refugees can be adopted by American parents. This program ended June 30, 1959, and the Hennings bill would revive it, and also give it an "open-end" status.

Franciscans Push Radio TV Work

Dayton—(RNS)—Delegates to the 40th annual meeting of the Franciscan Educational Conference were reminded that motion pictures, radio and television are gifts of God that must be used in God's service.

"Their aim should be to spread truth and to perfect human life and morals," the Rev. Donald Wiest, O.F.M., of Marathon, Wis., said in a paper prepared for delivery to the meeting at nearby St. Leonard College.

Father Donald referred to the guiding principles set forth by the late Pope Pius XII.

"Viewers and listeners are in duty bound to be careful in the selection of programs broadcast," he said. "Another duty incumbent upon them is to make their wishes and justifiable criticisms known to the directors of radio and television programs, and to encourage reputable, wholesome programs."
