Notre Dame—(RNS)—Three Roman Catholic nuns were awarded degrees of Doctor of Philosophy in Sacred Doctrine by St. Mary's School of Sacred Theology here.

Founded in 1944, the school has pioneered in the field of scientific training in sacred doctrine for women. It anticipated the request of the late Pope Pius XII that a sound theological training be provided for religious or lay women dedicated to the various fields of the Church's apostolate.

Postmaster Gratified

Public Supports Bid To Check Smut In Mails

Washington—(RNS)—Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield, warning the nation's letter carriers that they are the unwilling agents for delivery of more than 1,000,000 pieces of pornographic mail a year to the nation's children, said he is "deeply gratified" by the support his "clean-up drive is receiving from religious and civic organizations.

Addressing the 35th annual convention of the National Rural Letter Carriers Association here, the Postmaster General said, "This vicious business—the mailing of filth to children—is a challenge to every decent-minded American citizen."

Mr. Summerfield said the Department has made some progress in stopping the mailing of pornography—thanks to the broad public support being mobilized behind the enforcement drive. "Civic and religious organizations, deeply shocked by the concentration of this racket on children, have mobilized their members for programs to help meet the challenge," he declared.

"I think you will agree that this is a good start," he told the R.F.D. carriers "but I can not emphasize too greatly the need to conduct this war to the finish."

He said "persistent, intelligent, and intensive action" will be needed on a nation-wide scale for a long time to come. The volume of business done by peddlers of smut has tripled since the end of World War II, Mr. Summerfield said, doubling in the last five years alone.

He warned that unless the racket is brought under control, more and more children will be influenced by it, sex crimes will increase still more rapidly, and "over-all we can expect a breakdown in moral strength and order and decency in this country."

"This monstrous crime has not to be stopped," he stressed, emphasizing the importance of public opinion. Mr. Summerfield charged that "in certain large cities the courts have set a pattern of soft rulings which established virtual sanctuaries for these racketeers."

Construction Advances On New Wing For School

Corning—Work is advancing at the site of the new wing of St. Mary's School with construction for footings started according to Eugene C. Manning, president of the Manning Corporation.

Excavation for the building is still under way by E. R. Wolcott of Big Flats, to whom this portion of the work was subcontracted by the Manning firm. A few of the footings forms have been put in, Manning said.

HIS COMPANY is also constructing a new floor in the gymnasium. This is located in the newly remodeled building. It was discovered that the wood floor in the gymnasium would have to be replaced, and this work is being done by the Manning company, instead of by W. E. Granger & Sons of Elmira, the general contractor for the remodeling work.

The Manning contract calls for the new wing to be completed in August, 1960. However, the A & T Wrecking Company of Elmira did not complete its razing of the old building on time, and rain during the excavation work has also held back progress on the job. As a result, work is now delayed two to three weeks, it was pointed out.

Lutheran Group Calls Pontiff 'Anti-Christ'

Saginaw—(NC)—The Lutheran Synod of Wisconsin approved a statement that the pope is "the very anti-Christ" of the Bible.

Delegates to the 35th biennial convention of the synod, which has about 330,000 members in some 850 churches, accepted a statement labeling the pope "an adversary of Christ, who opposes and exalteth himself above all that is called God and that is worshipped, so that he as God sitteth in the temple of God." The statement charged that the Pope has assumed divine authority and alleged that he "does not want to be judged" and puts his own authority ahead of the decisions of councils and the entire church.

Crowds Attend Montreal Rite

Montreal—(RNS)—Thousands of pilgrims, including the ill and infirm, flocked to the world-famous St. Joseph's Oratory atop historic Mt. Royal, to observe the 114th anniversary of the birth of Brother Andre, the shrine's founder.

The pilgrimage is an annual event during which hundreds of faithful have been cured of various ailments. Numerous churches and wheelchairs have been left behind by pilgrims at the minor basilica.

Brother Andre, born Alfred Besette, died in 1937 at the age of 51. He had become known as the "Miracle Man" to millions who had been edified by his life of charity and prayer. Introduction of his beatification cause has been studied by the Sacred Congregation of Rites at the Vatican.

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
