Father Paul of the Cross, O.S.S.O., the former William Murray of Sacred Heart parish, Rochester, has returned from a two-year stay in Rome where he studied for and received his doctorate in philosophy at the Angelicum University.

Father Paul entered the Trappist Order at Our Lady of Loretto in 1948. He was ordained on Nov. 3, 1954, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jeremiah J. Murray, the Trappist priest assigned to Nazareth Hall and Adams Institute, Rochester, and St. Michael's College, Toronto.

Father Heindl Army Chaplain 'Real Pastor'

With the 98th ("Troquois") Division, Fort Dix, New Jersey, the highly decorated chaplain-pastor of three small parishes near Albany, N. Y., depicts the future of many Army Reserve soldiers to realize the services a chaplain could render during the weekly two-hour Reserve meetings.

Father (Major) Elmer W. Heindl, 98th Division Chaplain, discussed chaplain services while with his unit on two-week active duty training. He is pastor of St. Bernard's Church, St. John's, St. Isaac Jogues, Fleming, and St. Hillary's, Genoa.

The priest said that the Chaplain tries to be a real pastor to Reserve soldiers by conducting interviews during the weekly meetings, giving lectures on character and moral subjects, discussing problems, and making himself available to the men.

the Presidential Unit Citation gained by the 37th Division for three months of unbroken interrupted combat fighting in the South Pacific.

Father Heindl and nine other 98th Division chaplains are using this time to observe methods of training chaplains. The 98th was converted last May from a combat infantry to a training division.

Reds Force Papal Post To Close

Hong Kong (NO) — The Apostolic Delegation in northern Vietnam, the Holy See's last listening post in a communist-controlled country, has been closed.

Red-expelled Father Terence O'Driscoll, S.S.C., secretary to Archbishop John Dooley, S.S.C., Apostolic Delegate in Hanoi, revealed on arriving at his free-world outpost that the Delegate was flown out of communist-controlled Vietnam for medical treatment three weeks before he himself was ousted.

THE IRISH-COLUMBIAN priest, said that Archbishop Dooley was seriously ill, and as no competent medical treatment could be obtained in the Red capital at Hanoi, he was flown out on a stretcher to Phnompenh, the capital of neighboring Cambodia.

Father O'Driscoll said that three weeks later, he himself was summoned by the police and informed he was being expelled from northern Vietnam for engaging in "subversive activities."

He closed up the Apostolic Delegation, he said, and was escorted by two armed guards to the village of Nan Quan on the northern border and turned over to Chinese communist guards. The Chinese, in turn, took him across southern China to the Hong Kong border.

Thousands Seek Escape From China

Hong Kong (NO) — A Russian Bishop of the Catholic Byzantine Rite estimated here that there are still 10,000 White Russians in various parts of China waiting to escape to the free world.

Bishop Andrew Kalkoff, M.I.C., as chaplain to migrant Russians, arrived at this figure after completing a fact-finding visit among the "several thousand Russian refugees in Hong Kong."

During his stay he also investigated the special problems of those seeking visas for South America or Australia — those with domestic difficulties and those in poor health.

The 43-year-old Bishop praised the efforts of the Hong Kong governmental and volunteer refugee organizations as well as the cooperation of the Australian people that had made it possible for thousands of Russian refugees to emigrate to that continent.

Student Tuition Fee Hiked At DeSales High

Geneva — De Sales High School students will pay \$100 tuition in the next school year. The amount is double the fee charged last year.

Announcement of the boost in tuition cost was made recently in the Sunday church bulletin. Increased costs are given as reason for the \$50 hike.

The fee is \$100 less than other Catholic High Schools charge in the area. School authorities say no student will be prevented from attending because of inability to pay. PARENTS WILL be notified by letter this week of the change in tuition charges. DeSales High School enrollment is expected to be about 320 this year. Students have been required to pay a \$50 tuition fee for the last three years. Prior to that time they paid about \$30. The amount has been gradually increased to lessen the financial burden for the parishes. Payments are arranged for the convenience of the families.
