Gloomy Labor Day

Labor Day, 1959 will be perhaps "the gloomiest Labor Day in many years" according to principal editors of the September 5 Sign, national Catholic magazine.

Rev. Ralph Gorman, C.P., in his signed editorial, says this note of sadness will be the result of disclosures of the McClellan Committee and the failure of Mr. John U. Public to distinguish between "the thousands of good union leaders and millions of honest rank-and-file," and the Teamsters with Dave Beck and Jimmy Hoffa who "have become types of the union leader."

Elsewhere another editor, commenting on the docked steel strike, places "labor at the crossroads."

"Many social analysts," The Sign writes, "are tagging this strike as the end of an era in industrial relations, the result of an all-out effort of industry to bring to a halt the pattern of labor gains that began with the Wagner Act."

Noting in management's attitude a "hardening" which "has been building up for some time," the Sign editorial predicts:

"We may well be moving in the direction of class warfare. The effect of this current test of strength may be a period of labor unrest and turmoil such as we had in the thirties. . . . Tragically, if such class warfare comes, the first victims will not be the racketeering and corrupt unions. They will be those unions which have hitherto been held up as models of labor statesmanship."

Father Gorman, commenting on the "new low" which business has reached in the public eye, declares: "Unions will have to do three things if they want to recoup their losses."

"The first is to become more receptive to legislation regulating union affairs. . . . The second step is for unions to make sure that their constitutions assure democratic procedures. . . . The third and most important step is for union workers to participate in union affairs."

"Too often," Father Gorman asserts, "members shift all responsibility to a few leaders whose interests are not always identical with those of the union."

Warsaw Daily Raps Vatican

Warsaw (AP) — (RNS) — Glos Pracy, Communist daily published here, accused the Vatican of "numerous anti-Polish steps" and maintaining a climate "unfavorable to Polish national interests."

An article in the paper, broadcast by the Warsaw Radio, charged that "these" actions against Poland had been carried out by "an anti-Polish German clique in the Vatican."

It cited as an example the fact that the cardinal's rank traditionally connected with the diocese of Wroclaw (formerly the German diocese of Breslau) had been given to the West German Bishop of Berlin, Cardinal Döpfner.

Milwaukee — (RNS) — Monsignor (Ma) Gen. Terence P. Finnegan, Air Force Chief of Chaplains, said here that Catholic, Jewish and Episcopalian chaplains are needed to serve in a number of new chapels valued at \$20 million, that the Air Force is building over a three year period.

Monsignor Finnegan said the Air Force now has 3,113 chaplains of all faiths. "By October," he said, "we expect to be up to strength in Protestant chaplains—except for Episcopalian. We are short of Jewish and Catholic chaplains."
