Japan Missioner Lists Visit To Rochester Kin

Rochester relatives of the Rev. Francis S. Sercu, of the Congregation of the Immaculate Heart of Mary are awaiting the arrival in Rochester on Sept. 8 of the missionary enroute to Japan after a year's absence.

Father Sercu is a nephew of the Superior General of the Scholastic Fathers, Very Rev. Francis Sercu, C.I.C.M. who visited Rochester in July 1958 on a tour of the mission houses of the Immaculate Heart Fathers.

THE NEPHEW left Brussels on August 29 via KLM Airlines and is visiting in New York City, Philadelphia and Missionhurst in Arlington, Va. He will also stop in Albany.

The younger Father Sercu who will be in St. Joseph's Rectory while here will attend a family reunion at the White House, Webster County Park, Sept. 9 from 4 to 9 p.m.

Father Sercu will leave Rochester on Sept. 15 to visit Buffalo relatives and prior to leaving the West Coast will visit relatives in California. This is his first trip to the U.S.A.

When he left Japan in October, 1958 he traveled home to Ardooze, West Flanders, Belgium to visit his parents via the Orient where he also visited his sister Dame Maria Joza of the Canonesses of St. Augustine in the Philippine Islands and his paternal Aunt, Sister Gertrude, Prioress of the Carmelite Monastery in Phnom-Penh, Cambodia, Indo China.

Father Sercu, one of 12 children, 10 of whom are living was ordained in October 1948 and worked in the missions until 1958. Two of his sisters are in Carmelite monasteries in Belgium. In 1954 a sister was professed as a Canoness of St. Augustine and sent to the Philippines and a brother entered a Trappist monastery in Belgium.

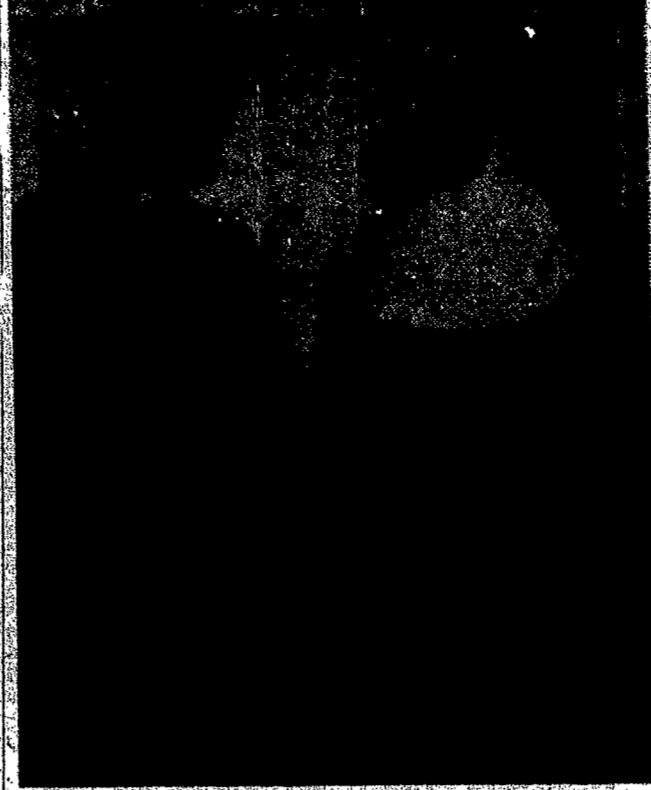
To Receive Communion

Sister Armanda Marks 65 Years

Corning—A Mass of Thanksgiving was said Tuesday morning, Aug. 26, in St. Patrick's Church to mark the 65th anniversary of Sister Armanda as a Sister of St. Joseph.

The Mass was appropriate in that the Rev. William Cannan, pastor of St. Patrick's, celebrated the Mass. He was an 8th grade student of Sister Armanda just 20 years ago at the School of the Immaculate Conception in Rochester.

Sister Armanda, who will be 64 years old in November, received the habit of the Order from the first bishop of the Rochester Diocese, Bishop McQuaid, on August 25, 1916.

She was born in Auburn where she attended St. Mary's Parochial School and a few years of high school. She has taught all of the 65 years in which she has been a nun, in Rochester, Elmira, Webster, Corning and Oswego for 30 years.

SISTER ARMANDA has been in Corning five years. She retired from teaching three years ago and has since been in residence here. She has a sister, Mrs. Victor Holland of Albany.

At the time she received the habit of the Sisters of St. Joseph, the Order was small. Of the three other sisters who received their habit at the time, one other, Sister Ottilie, is now living at the St. Bridget Convent in Rochester. Mother Agnes was Mother Superior of the Order at the time they were received.
