## Local Kolping Group To Attend N.Y. Conclave

At the breakfast last Sunday which followed a German High Mass at St. Joseph's Church, Leo P. Saum, senior of the Catholic Kolping Society, announced details of the national convention in New York City.

It also was learned from international headquarters in Cologne, Germany, that the general director of the worldwide Kolping organization, Rt. Rev. Dr. Bernard Hilder, will participate in the convention.

Very Rev. Thomas J. Fallon, C.S.S.R., Præses of the local branch will head convention delegation of approximately 30 members. Most of the delegates will go by train and occupy special coaches together with delegates from Buffalo.

HIGHLIGHTS OF the convention over the Labor Day weekend include a parade to the Pontifical Mass in St. Patrick's Cathedral with His Eminence Francis Cardinal Spellman presiding at the throne, a gala banquet in the Waldorf Astoria and a moonlight cruise on the Hudson. Convention headquarters is at the Belmont - Plaza Hotel.

One of the main discussions at the convention will be plans for a gathering of the 2,758 branches of the Kolping Society from all over the world in connection with the International Eucharistic Congress in Munich, Germany, in 1960.

Plans are made for special flights from the various branches. Rochester is chartering a special plane to leave for Germany in the middle of July 1960 and to return at the end of August.

Besides participation in the Eucharistic Congress a special Kolping Day and pilgrimage to the grave of the founder, Adolf Kolping, in the Church of the Minorities in Cologne, are planned.

PARTICIPATION in the chartered flight is limited to members of this society, but the Kolping Society would be happy to increase its number of members and welcome people interested in the flight to Germany in 1960 to sign up.
