**Protestants To Study
Curbing Of Movie Sex**
Hollywood (NC) — Protestant leaders are studying what to do about too much sex in movies, and about the industry's production code which they say is "running wild."
George A. Helmreich, director of the West Coast branch of the National Council of Churches broadcasting and film commission, said Protestants are opposed to a system of banning certain films, "but very definitely something should be done."
Helmreich said the industry's overemphasis on sex has been especially noticeable recently. "Many films have been stressing sex when it was entirely unnecessary, obviously in the hope of building up box-office appeal," he charged.
"THE SITUATION has been getting worse during the last six months," he said.
As for Hollywood's production code, the industry's own set of rules on what is acceptable in movies, Helmreich asserted:
"Either it has broken down or it is not being applied. In any event, the code seems to be running wild."

**Post Office
Pushes Drive
Against Smut**
Washington (NC) — Prosecutions of mail order smut distributors are currently "at an all time high," the U.S. Post Office Department has announced.
Arrests for distributing obscene material through the mails have increased 75 percent during fiscal 1936 over the previous fiscal year, the department disclosed.
"THE POST OFFICE'S monthly report on fraud and mailability cases said these facts indicate that the department is making great strides" toward its announced intention to "purge the mails of obscene and pornographic matter."
This report, covering cases during July, stated that a Northridge, Pa., man, George "Doc" Miller, 40, was charged with the distribution of obscene material. He had been found guilty in Detroit Federal Court on two counts charging him with use of the mails to give information where obscene material would be obtained.
The man, Burton Steiger, 32, had entered a plea of no contest with the court, the Post Office said. He is due to be sentenced shortly.
