Nazareth's Largest Class To Begin Studies, First Indian Girl Registers

Largest Freshman class in the history of Nazareth College will report for the orientation program next week. One hundred ten resident Freshmen will be welcomed Sunday afternoon, Sept. 13 by the faculty and their Junior "Big Sisters."

Included in the class is Mary Blackcloud, a Sioux Indian, whose home is in South Dakota. She is a graduate of the Mount Mary High School, Xarleton, South Dakota. Mary is the first American Indian to attend Nazareth College.

Monday morning off-campus students will join the residents for the formal program, which is scheduled at 9 a.m.

A WELCOME from Sister Rose Angela, dean of the college, and from student association officers will open the program. Opportunity will be provided for the incoming Freshmen to meet their faculty counselors, their Big Sisters, and members of the faculty.

Various social events have been planned by the Junior Class, including a marshmallow roast on Monday evening, a Big and Little Sister Banquet on Saturday and a tour of the city for the out-of-town students.

An original and attractive Orientation Booklet, "Your Hall of Ivy" has been sent to each Freshman by the Junior Class during the summer to acquaint the incoming student with the traditions and customs of Nazareth and to provide answers to most of the questions which Freshmen raise.

- 1. If possible, the recipient must be a daughter of a member of the Catholic Daughters of America.
- 2. During high school, and as long as she continues to receive the grant, she must give evidence of personal integrity and a high regard for spiritual and moral values.
- 3. She must demonstrate qualities of leadership and scholastic ability. To satisfy the latter requirement, she must have stood in the upper one-third of her class during the previous academic year.
- 4. She must demonstrate a need for financial assistance for her college training.
- 5. She must be a resident of the Diocese of Rochester.

New York State CDA Forms Scholarship Fund

Through the auspices of the New York State Court of the Catholic Daughters of America, a Scholarship Fund has been established to help deserving young women obtain a Catholic college education. The C.D.A. Scholarships will be three per year at Nazareth College, totaling \$600.

The recipient will receive the sum of \$200 during her freshman, sophomore, and junior years of college. To initiate the scholarships, in September 1959 one student will be selected from the junior class, one from the sophomore class, and one from the Freshman class entering Nazareth College.

The scholarships may not be held at any time by members of the Senior Class. The C.D.A. Scholarship Fund will be administered by the Superintendent of Schools.
