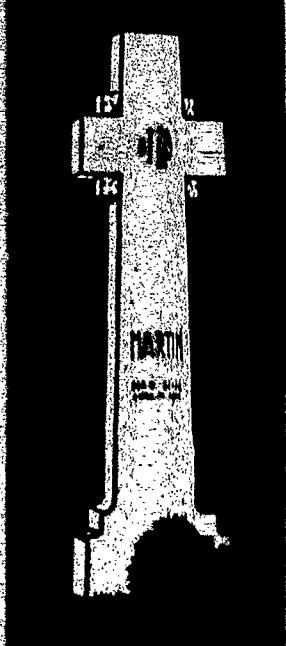


### Protestants Plan Meet At Assisi

Assisi, (NC) — Fourteen Protestant theologians will meet with 14 Catholic theologians in Assisi next month at a round-table conference of Christian unity.

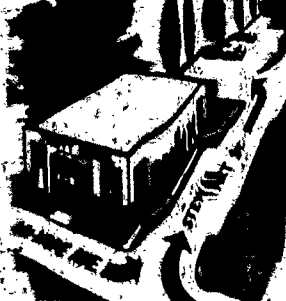
The meeting, the first of its kind in Italy, in recent times will begin on October 29 and is expected to last at least three days.

### Nemesis For Nematodes

#### Priest's Aim -- Rid Pakistan Of Pests

Dacca, — (NC) — An American-born priest is setting up a laboratory here to conduct government-sponsored research on plant pests which are destroying vital crops in Pakistan.

Father Richard Timm, C.S.C., is said to be east Pakistan's only specialist on nematodes, parasites that plague crop plants. Crops of rice, jute, sugar beets and maize in various parts of East Pakistan have been wiped out in the past because of the activity of nematodes (pinworms).

FATHER TIMM, a member of the Congregation of the Holy Cross, received two research grants from the Pakistan government. The first is from the Pakistan Food and Agricultural Council. The second is from the Pakistan Central Jute Committee.

Both research projects will be carried out at the Catholic-owned Notre Dame College here. The laboratory the priest is preparing is attached to the college. It will house the analytical part of the research.

### U.S. Artist Visits Cardinal Stepinac

New York — (RNS) — Aloysius Cardinal Stepinac, confined by the Yugoslav Communist government to his native village of Krasic, was reported here as being in "good spirits and fairly good health."

IVAN MESTROVIC, sculptor on the faculty of the University of Notre Dame, said upon returning from a visit to his native Yugoslavia that he had spent about four hours talking to the prelate. He said he found the cardinal in the middle of very good shape, mentally and otherwise, and added that "all intelligent Communists know he is innocent."

The cardinal has been confined to Krasic since 1951. That was the year when he was released from prison after serving five years of a 15-year term for alleged wartime collaboration with the Nazis. Cardinal Stepinac remains in Krasic under constant surveillance, and may not exercise any of his episcopal functions.

### Korea Diocese Gains 6 Thousand

Chuncheon — (NC) — Bishop Thomas Quinlan, S.S.C., Vicar Apostolic of Chuncheon, said here that during the past year the number of Catholics in this Korea Vicariate rose from 24,281 to 30,712, an increase of 6,431.

During the same period 5,470 adult converts were baptized, and 1,289 infants were baptized.

#### Requiem Held

Vogel, Jr.; five sisters, Beatrice Vogel, Mrs. Raymond Weller, Mrs. Theresa Gray of Buffalo, Mrs. Robert Johnson and Mrs. Arthur Spall; a brother, Oliver Vogel of New York City; five grandchildren and a very large number of nieces and nephews.

### Reds Seek Election Victory

#### San Marino

San Marino — (NC) — At dawn on September 3, cannons on the rocky heights overlooking this pin-point republic awakened its citizens to the 30th anniversary of its founding.

Even while the tricenarian celebrations were taking place, a vigorous election campaign threatened the peace of the republic, which struggled for centuries against the possibility of being swallowed up by the tide of surrounding Italy.

COMMUNISTS HAVE launched a violent attack against San Marino's pro-Western government, charging it with police brutality.

But the people marched in solemn religious procession past the domes of election posters that have been plastered on walls throughout the city for weeks. The marchers carried in a silver basket the relics of St. Marinus, legendary founder of the city-state which grew into the republic. At the rear of the procession walked the Captain Regent, elected ruler of the republic.

ST. MARINUS, according to legend, was a slave who fled here in the fourth century in search of a haven from a violent anti-Christian persecution. He found that haven, and stone to work and led the inhabitants to form a corporation of free men governed by a patriarchal system.

The elections, slated for September 13, are for the 90-seat legislature, which is known as the Grand and General Council. They will be the first free elections since the socialist Communist government resigned under pressure in 1957. At all four elections during the previous 13 years the extreme left wing parties won.

This time the election is expected to take a different turn. Observers estimate that 25 of the legislature's 90 seats will be taken by pro-Western anti-Communist candidates.
