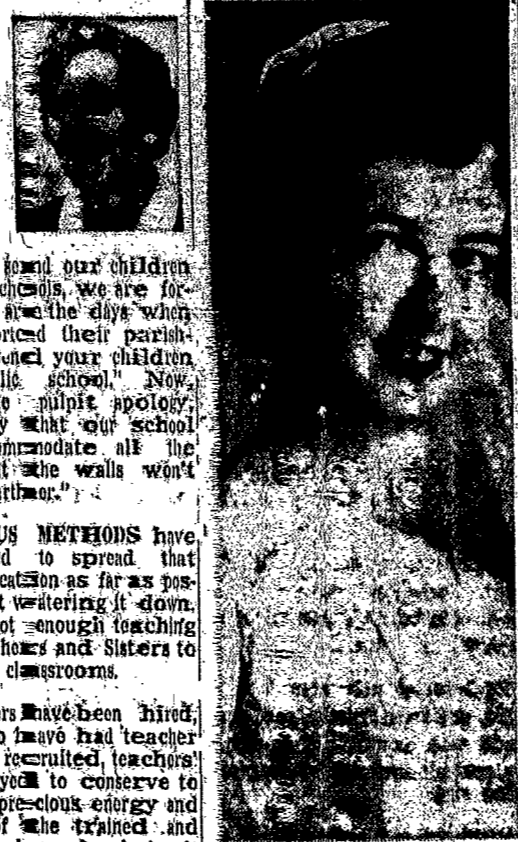
Personally, I doubt if anything will ever "edge out love" a potential interest-rouser.

As parents, we have only to look out for a few of those 46,490,000. Through our responsibilities are less numerous, they are more poignant in that they are personal.

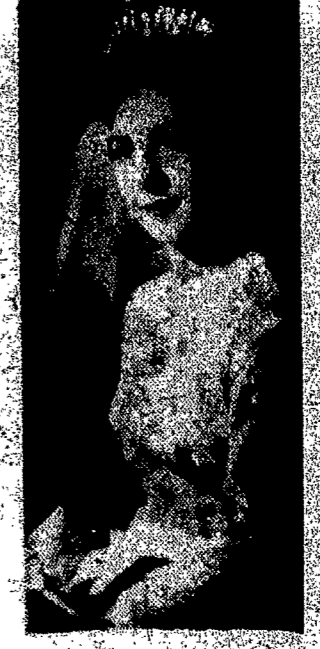
