

**Mitchell Tells Unions**

**U.S. Farm Workers Most Depressed**

San Francisco — (NC) — Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell asked organized labor's help here in behalf of "the most depressed area of American labor" — the nation's farm workers.

He spoke before the third in a series of observations of the American Federation of Labor, Congress of Industrial Organizations. His plea came less than 48 hours after he had ordered closed — because of poor living conditions — a camp for Mexican field hands (braceros) near San Jose, 50 miles south of here.

"I DO NOT believe that American agriculture has to depend on poverty to satisfy its labor needs," he said. "I can't for the life of me understand the complacency among farm growers about the conditions they depend on to provide them with labor."

Secretary Mitchell first made the remarks off the record at a "gang dinner" held at the San Francisco Press and Union League Club. He later made them publicly before 800 delegates.

At the AFL-CIO convention, he said, he had a transcript of a tape recording of his press club comments.

The battle to improve farm labor conditions, the Secretary said, is a struggle for democracy in which every American has a share. "I am speaking for the people of America."

In labor-management relations there can be no double standard for government intervention," he said.

"And yet there is a field in which such double standards are demanded by some Americans," he continued. "I am speaking about farm labor. Agricultural interests have traditionally begged the government to act on their behalf whenever agricultural problems became too difficult for the industry itself to solve."

**Congress To Hear School Aid Plea**

Washington — (NC) — The Senate Majority Leader's comment that he looks for "meaningful action" on Federal aid to education next session is widely seen here as a signal that the postponed struggle on Federal aid will begin in January.

Sen. Lyndon Johnson of Texas said adjournment period will give Congress time to study aid proposals before the legislators come back to pick up where they left off early in the morning of September 16.

The Texas announced that he is drafting a bill himself. It would provide, he said, that the Federal government guarantee loans made by colleges and universities to needy students. It would authorize about \$100 million of such guarantees annually.

Mr. Johnson's planned bill, like the two leading education measures pending in Congress, is a departure from the education support plans announced when Congress convened last January.

At that time, the various leading proposals concentrated on permanent support of public school construction and on teachers' salaries both to be financed by substantial Federal grants.

A CATHOLIC stand on such proposals was presented to Congressional committees in a statement by Archbishop Albert G. Meyer of Chicago in the name of the Department of Education of the National Catholic Welfare Conference.

The Archbishop said that if Federal money is to be spent to help education, it should be temporary and distributed only for specific purposes in areas of private need.

Permanent support, he said, might well carry in its wake Federal control.

The NCWC department, said the Chicago prelate, opposes aid for teachers' salaries on the ground that such a program, by its very nature, would be permanent.

"Furthermore," he added, "it would give to school maintenance and curricular employees, to firemen, policemen and other civil servants an equal claim on the Federal Government."

As for treatment of private, nonpublic schools, Archbishop Meyer said that "Congress cannot in justice be indifferent to parents of nonpublic school children" who are said to carry heavy financial burdens for education.

The Archbishop proposed that if Federal aid legislation is deemed necessary, it include government loans to aid construction of private, nonpublic schools, arguing that this is not a new program, nor outside the framework of existing laws as interpreted by the courts.

**Tibet Monks Seek U.S. Home**

New York — (RNS) — Reporting on a personal interview he had with the Dalai Lama in India, a Catholic Relief Service-National Catholic Welfare Conference official said here that the Tibetan godking is "most anxious" to have 3,000 of his younger followers resettled in the United States.

Armando E. Sonzagger of Fairview, N.J., CRS program director in India, said he told the Dalai Lama that this would only be possible if Congress passed special legislation. The exiled spiritual leader expressed the hope that such action would be taken, Mr. Sonzagger said.

THE WELFARE official reported the Dalai Lama was greatly concerned should any of his young resistance fighters, aged 16 to 27, return to Tibet where the Chinese Communists are now in power.

Of the estimated 11,000 Tibetan refugees in India, the Dalai Lama said he was not sure what would be done with them. However, he said he hoped to be able to resettle some 1,500 Tibetans at Sura Camp, India, where a seminary for young monks is being planned.

He also said he would like to see 500 of his older Lamas resettled in Dabhoi. Some of these are learned scholars, the Dalai Lama noted, and could be used to teach Buddhist philosophy and Sanskrit or to give lectures in some of the Indian colleges.

Mr. Sonzagger, who returned to the U.S. after spending two years in India, said he asked the Dalai Lama if he thought the Tibetans could be resettled and completely unsatisfactory as individuals or family groups to his people as they were accustomed to living in a close-knit religious society.

**Pope Sees Peace Hope In Nikita's U.S. Visit**

Catagnum, Md. — (RNS) — Pope John XXIII, in an obvious reference to Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's visit to the United States, welcomed "the meetings of representative personalities taking place these days."

Addressing a general audience at the papal summer residence here, the Pontiff said "we must look to these meetings with interest," and "pray to Our Lord that they may tend to reach something really useful for the human, earthly and social order."

"All who call themselves Christians," the Pope added, "ought to multiply prayers so that all human harmonies may agree with the superior harmonies of the Spirit, evoked by the angels before the grotto of Bethlehem when they proclaimed 'Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace to men of goodwill.'"

**Use Leisure To Enrich Faith, Pope Advises**

"MY FIRST WORDS are a prayer. May Almighty God in His infinite wisdom and mercy bless the sacred mission which has been entrusted to me by Her Majesty the Queen, and help me fulfill it in all humility. In exchange for His strength I offer Him my weakness.

"May He give peace to this beloved land of ours, and to those who live in it the grace of mutual understanding, respect and love."

Gen. Vanier is the first Catholic and French Canadian to become representative of Queen Elizabeth II in Canada. He is the second son of Canada to hold the post of Governor General, succeeding Vincent Massey.

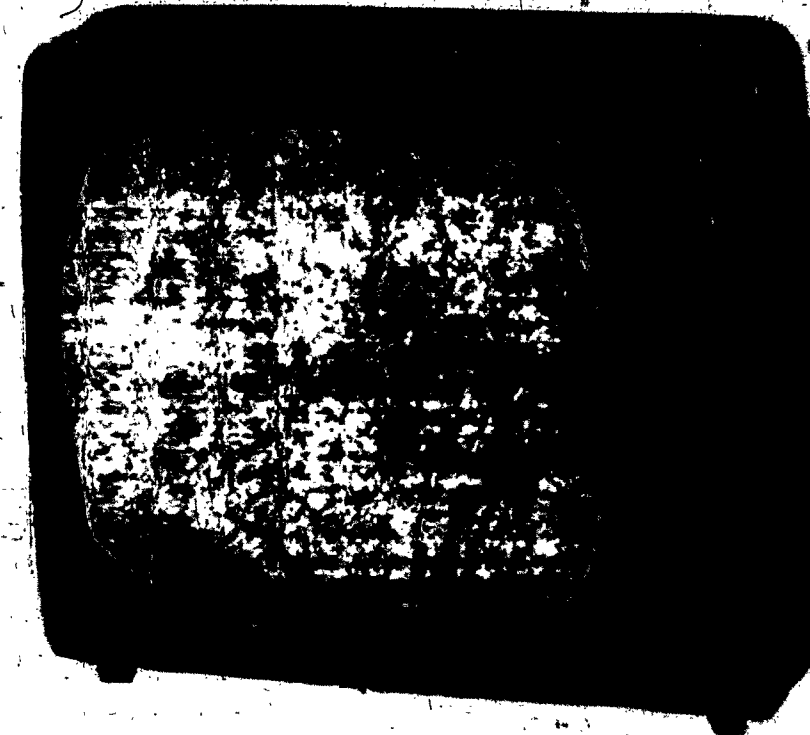
