## Share-a-Church Plan In Germany

**Rottenburg** — (RNS) — Although 200 new Catholic worship centers have been built since 1949 in the Rottenburg diocese in West Germany, parishes still have to rely on the hospitality of 200 Evangelical churches and chapels in the area.

**CATHOLIC BISHOP** Carl Joseph Leisegang of Rottenburg cited the continued shortage of worship space, told his See's Finance committee that the construction of churches must remain one of the diocese's main concerns.

Both Protestant and Catholic communities are suffering from a lack of worship facilities. The shortage, brought on by the destruction and damage during World War II, has been intensified by the large-scale demolition for Catholic services.

## German Mining Hit By Layoffs

**Essen** — (NO) — Two prelates have pleaded for special consideration for workers and their families in the German coal-mining industry.

Archbishop Lorenz Jaeger of Paderborn and Bishop Franz Hengsbach of Xanten issued a statement asking mine owners and others responsible persons to apply Christian principles in the solution of industrial economic problems.

Because of increasing competition from oil companies, owners of coal mines have cut down on the number of workers or reduced their working hours.

The mine owners declared they intend to close down from 12 to 15 mines during the next year, thus reducing the number of their employees from 300,000 to 260,000. The statement by the mine owners, however, did not specify which mines will be shut down.

As a result German miners all over the mining district on the Ruhr river are afraid of losing their jobs.

Archbishop Jaeger and Bishop Hengsbach said in their statement that the Church cannot give directions on how to handle what is a severe economic problem, but called "existing church circles that it can call attention to un-meetings."


