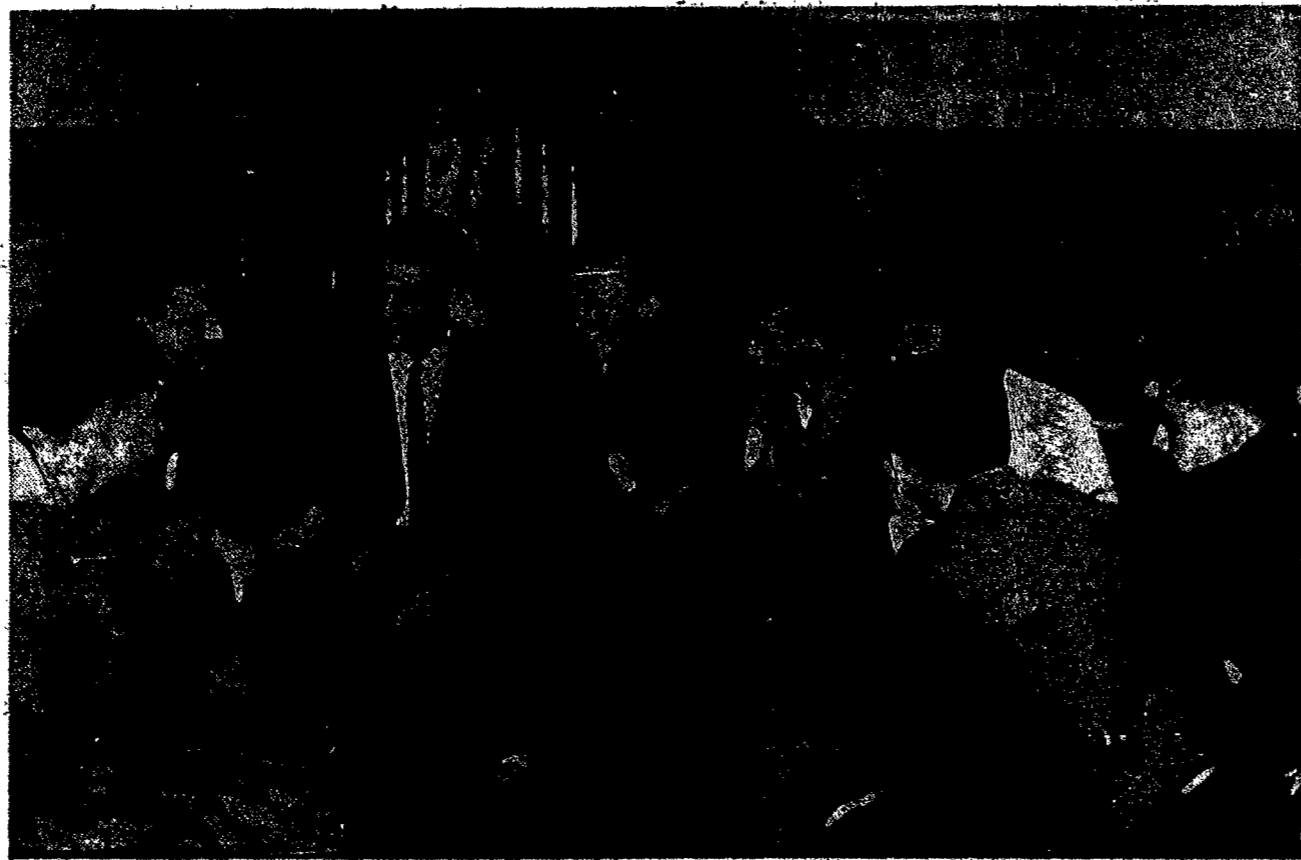

### Judge Orders Ban Lifted

Indianapolis, Ind. — (NC) — Catholics have won their fight to locate a new parish in suburban Meridian Hills. Superior Court Judge Walter Bell has ordered the town's Board of Zoning Appeals to revoke its ban on the construction of an \$850,000 parish plant on a tract owned by the Archdiocese of Indianapolis since 1948. The Board was given 30 days to approve the building plans or file for a new trial. The case was taken to Superior Court by Archbishop Paul C. Schulte of Indianapolis after the zoning board of the exclusive residential suburb refused last February to allow construction of buildings for the parish, which is to be called St. Luke's. In his decision Judge Bell cited the fact that zoning permission had been granted earlier for the construction of a Hebrew temple and two Protestant churches within the town's corporate limits. (Permission for the Hebrew temple was at first denied, but the ban was later revoked upon a court order.) DENIAL OF the request of St. Luke's parish, Judge Bell said, was a "discriminatory application" of the town's zoning ordinance and, in effect, a violation of the Federal and Indiana State Constitutions. In his decision Judge Bell repeated a statement made in connection with the 1938 Hebrew Temple case that "the presence of a church anywhere in Meridian Hills will ordinarily serve the public convenience and welfare." This is so, he added, "because a church serves every acknowledged fact of the power of government to preserve its safety and well-being — i. e., the public health, safety, morals and the general welfare. The construction of all civilized society dictates that wherever the souls of men are found, the houses of God belong."

### Missionaries Urged To Stress Farming

Washington, D.C. — (RNS) — An appeal to Catholic missionaries around the world to observe 1961 as "Better Seeds Year" was voiced here by Msgr. Luigi G. Ligutti, executive director of the National Catholic Rural Life Conference. Addressing more than 700 priests, religious, and lay people attending the 10th annual meeting of the Mission Secretariate here, Msgr. Ligutti urged Catholic missionaries to emphasize movement of agriculture in their mission areas. He particularly called on them to cooperate with representatives of the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) whom they will be meeting in even the most remote areas of the world. POINTING TO the role of which Catholic missionaries can play in the FAO-sponsored "Better Seeds Year," he said, "Did you not bring wheat to South America, the grapes to California, the mango to Africa, and bananas to Panama?" He also asked the mission groups to cooperate with the National Catholic Rural Life Conference in its project of preparing a series of historical articles on the contributions of the

### Congo Catholics Want Church, State Freedom

Leopoldville, Belgian Congo — (NC) — The new Auxiliary Vicar Apostolic of Leopoldville, Bishop Joseph Malula, told 35,000 persons at his episcopal consecration that the Catholics of the Congo now look forward to "a Congolese Church in a (free) Congolese state."

Bishop Joseph Malula, 41-year-old native of Leopoldville, spoke in four languages — French, Flemish and the Congo dialects — to the throng gathered in Baudouin Stadium for his consecration.

He said the Church has pacified the hearts and minds of the Congolese people, and that the colonial government has aided the Church and helped develop civilization here.

"TRUTH IS THE only way the Congo has grown up," he said, "and now we hope for its final ascent."

This final elevation will be the establishment of a hierarchy for the Church and self-government for the nation, he explained.

Bishop Malula, who was the first African to become a pastor in Leopoldville, was named titular Bishop of Attanasus by His Holiness Pope John XXIII last July. He was consecrated by Belgian-born Bishop Felix Solala, C.I.M., Vicar Apostolic of Leopoldville. Co-consecrators were two other African bishops: Bishop Joseph Nkongolo, Vicar Apostolic of Luebo, and Bishop Pierre Kimbondo, Auxiliary Vicar Apostolic of Kisumu.

### Mary Gagliano Seeks Master's

Miss Mary Gagliano, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph P. Gagliano, 10 Maybrook Road, left Wednesday for Fordham University Graduate School of Social Work where she will complete her studies for a master's degree.

Miss Gagliano was graduated from Nazareth College in June 1957 with a major in Sociology and a minor in Psychology.

Her graduate work will be cosponsored by the Wayne County Department of Social Welfare and the New York State Department of Social Welfare in Albany. While in New York City, Miss Gagliano will live in the International House on Riverside Drive.

### 10,000 Alcoholic Cases Annually

San Antonio — (RNS) — Alcoholics committed to America's mental hospitals and psychiatric wards are increasing at the rate of nearly 10,000 a year, leaders of the National Women's Christian Temperance Union were told here.

According to the latest tabulation of the National Institute of Mental Health, "more than 56,000 alcoholics were committed to 432 state, county, private and psychiatric hospitals or wards through the psychiatric wards of 410 general hospitals in 1956, comparing with 46,000 this year before," said Mrs. L. G. Freney of Watertown, Mich., National WCTU vice-president-at-large.

### Confusion Twice Confounded

Saddle River, N.J. — (NC) — Residents of Saddle River are confused about Sunday closing laws, it's no wonder.

In the November election they'll be faced with two separate referendums, one to ban the sale of certain items on Sunday, the other to repeal a local Sunday closing law.

THE REFERENDUM on the sale of certain items will be held throughout Bergen County under New Jersey's county-option law on Sunday merchandising. The law must be approved throughout the county to become effective.

If approved, it will not make store closings mandatory. But mandatory closings, except for works of necessity and charity, are currently in effect in Saddle River. Residents several years ago voted for a municipal measure to accomplish that purpose.

NOW THEY are being asked whether or not they still want the law. To make matters more confusing the referendum will not be binding. It was placed on the ballot by the town council to ascertain public opinion after the town body had received several requests to do so.

### Crime Rate At New High

Washington — (RNS) — The U.S. crime rate was the highest in history in 1958, the Federal Bureau of Investigation reported here.

A total of 1,552,000 offenses were known to police, an increase of 131,000, or 9.1 per cent over the previous record set in 1957.

The FBI said there were 8,122 murders, committed in the United States in 1958, white rapes numbered 14,563, and other assaults 119,569.
