Puerto Ricans Defended In Crime Wave

New York — (AP) — A champion of Puerto Ricans residing in New York has declared that "danger lies in the possibility of interpreting statistics about their involvement in juvenile crime."

Joseph Monserrat, chairman of the Puerto Rican Community Settlement Program, came up with some figures of his own to dispute statistics furnished by the U.S. Senate subcommittee investigating the mounting juvenile crime in New York City.

The JURIST gave the subcommittee statistics prepared by various court and law enforcement officials which indicated that while Puerto Ricans make up seven per cent of the city's population, they are involved in 22.3 per cent of the city's juvenile delinquency cases.

Mr. Monserrat countered with statistics concerning Manhattan borough, a section with a large Puerto Rican population. He said these statistics showed that Puerto Ricans comprise 32 per cent of Manhattan's school population, but that they were involved in less than 20 per cent of Manhattan's delinquency cases.

Self Criticism Needed For Educational Growth

Notre Dame, Ind. — (NC) — If Catholic education is to remain alive and healthy, it must be ready to engage in self-criticism, Father Chester A. Soleta, C.S.C., vice president for academic affairs at the University of Notre Dame, declared.

"Speaking at a Solemn Mass in Sacred Heart church marking the formal opening of the university's 12th academic year, Father Soleta said that Catholic educators have been inclined to turn from all criticism as if it were subversive."

"AS A RESULT," he said, "we have seldom really listened to others outside the Church and outside Christianity who spoke of contemporary problems or of educational problems in a contemporary setting. Consequently, we have lost many opportunities for intellectual growth and relevance."

"Some of our learning may be considered largely neutral to Christianity, but it too must be sought with unremitting vigor since it forms an integral part of the vision we seek," he declared. "But our particular character as a Catholic university calls for continuous re-examination of our position, getting rid of what is merely incidental to the past, making our Faith and its development relevant to our times and making it bear forcefully on our problems. This will inevitably result in a continuing exercise of self-criticism."
