Rededication Rite Slated In Syracuse

Syracuse — The end of major renovation project of the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception will be marked on October 11 when Bishop Walter A. Foery of Syracuse presides at rededication ceremonies. More than 500,000 was spent in renovating the 84-year-old Gothic structure.

Pontifical Mass of the Maternity of the Blessed Mother will be celebrated by Bishop Foery at 11 a.m. Bishop Foery will preach the sermon. The marking of the 63rd anniversary of the Blessed Virgin Mary's apparitions there. An estimated 700,000 are expected to be at the famed shrine at that time.

A visit will also be made to the Carmelite convent at Colburn where Sister Lucy, sole survivor of the three who saw our Lady at Fatima, in 1917, is a cloistered nun.

This 1950 pilgrimage will be Father Cirrincione's sixth trip to Fatima and Rome.

Peace Pilgrimage To Visit Fatima

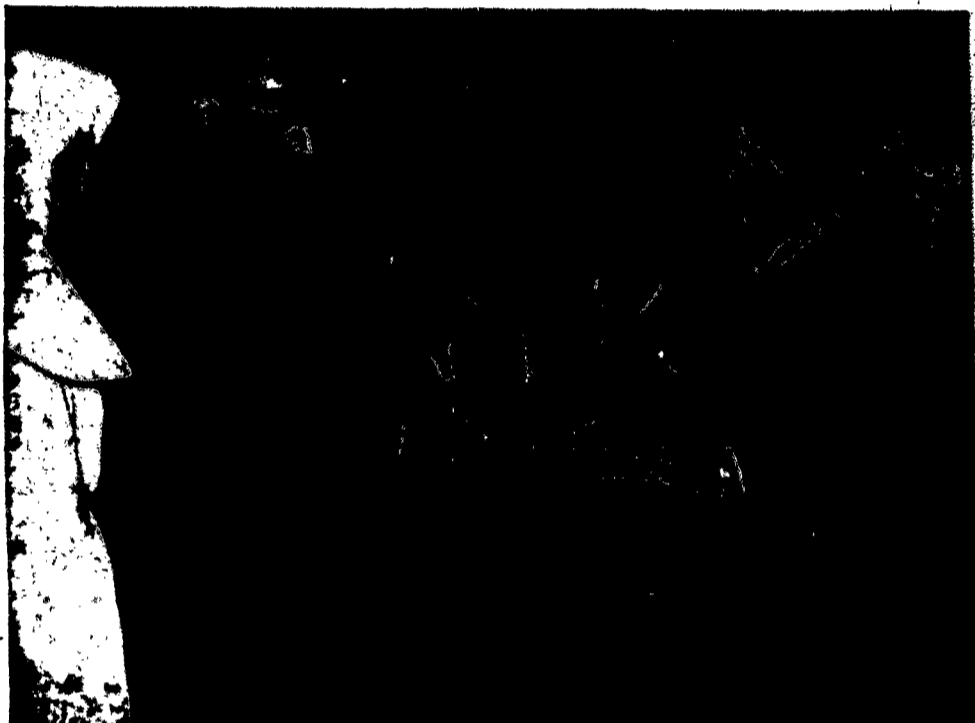
