

## U. S. Friar Made Bishop In Bolivia

Coronel (NC) — A U. S. Franciscan missionary has been installed as the first Ordinary of the new independent prelate of Bolivia.

Bishop Thomas Manning, O.F.M., who was consecrated in New York in July, was presented to the people by Archbishop Abel Antezana y Rojas of La Paz, Bolivia's capital.

The Bishop, 37, is a native of Baltimore. After education in parochial and high schools there, he entered the Franciscan Order in 1911. He was ordained on June 5, 1948, in Washington, D.C.

He was one of a group of Franciscans who came to Bolivia in 1956 from the Order's New York province to help found a mission here in Coronel, a town in the Andes Mountains about 35 miles from La Paz.

## Doughnuts To Dunk

Doughnuts so light they float in the air. These are the best potato variety airy, light and luscious. Fry to a golden brown and top with your favorite glaze, sugar or chocolate coating — they're welcome by young and old alike.

And here's the recipe for you "Twentieth Century Style." You'll certainly want to make these for Halloween, but why make the family wait until then. Surprise them with some of these delicious doughnuts tonight. They are so easy to make, too. No peeling of potatoes for this recipe... just use the new instant potatoes now on the market.

THE NEW MIX comes with complete directions for making mashed potatoes just by the addition of milk, water and but-

ter. Is it a doughnut or a fried cake? Doughnuts in Pennsylvania (where I was born) are known by their leavening. Those made with yeast dough are doughnuts, and the ones from a quick dough containing baking powder are fried cakes, but whatever you call them, you'll like them.

**POTATO DOUGHNUTS**  
1 c. mashed unseasoned potatoes  
3 eggs  
3/4 c. sugar  
3 T. soft shortening  
2 1/2 c. sifted flour  
1 t. baking powder  
1 t. salt  
1/4 t. nutmeg  
1 t. mace  
Fat for frying

\*Prepare potatoes as directed on package. Instant Mashed Potato Mix. For 2 servings (1 cup) — except omit salt. Beat eggs well. Beat in sugar and shortening. Sift dry ingredients together and stir in. Stir in potatoes. Chill dough 2 hours. Turn onto generously floured surface. Roll 1/2" thick. Let rest 20 minutes. Cut with doughnut cutter. Fry in hot fat (370 to 380 degrees), until brown. Drain on absorbent paper. Serve plain, sugared or glazed. Makes 3 dozen 2 1/2" doughnuts.

THERE ARE always ways to do it up doughnuts. Left over doughnuts star in an elegant dessert Peach "Shortcake." Just spoon sweetened whipped cream over each doughnut. Add a perfect peach half, then more whipped cream. Perch a maraschino cherry tip. Glazed doughnuts are always popular. Combine 1 c. sifted confectioners sugar with 2 T. light cream or milk. Dip one side of warm doughnuts in glaze. For heavier glaze dip twice. For glazing left over doughnuts just heat doughnuts in moderate oven 375 degrees for 5 minutes or till very hot. Use tongs for dipping. Place doughnuts glaze up on rack to drip and set. Taste just like they had been freshly fried.

Remember that:

# Mission Sunday October 18th

## The Society for the Propagation of the Faith

Established in 1822

### WHAT IS MISSION SUNDAY?

A Sunday set aside by the Holy Father as a day for Catholics throughout the world to become interested in the Society for the Propagation of the Faith and the missions of the Catholic Church. Mission Sunday is always the second last in October, preceding the feast of Christ the King.

### HOW CAN WE HELP THE MISSIONS?

We can help the Missions by enrolling in the Society for the Propagation of the Faith, by prayer and by encouraging vocations to a missionary life.

### WHAT IS THE SOCIETY FOR PROPAGATION OF THE FAITH?

"AN INTERNATIONAL ORGANIZATION AUTHORIZED BY THE CHURCH, to help support the Catholic Missions." The first contributions gathered by this Society in 1822 were sent to Missions in Louisiana and Kentucky. The Propagation of the Faith is established in every diocese in the world.

### WHAT DO YOU MEAN BY A MISSIONARY?

One who is sent by the Church to preach the Gospel to those who have not yet heard the message of Christ.

### WHERE ARE THE MISSIONARIES WORKING?

Some work in their own countries and may be called Home Missionaries; others labor in foreign countries, mostly in pagan lands; they are the Foreign Missionaries.

### WHAT IS A MISSIONARY?

In a general way "Mission" means the united efforts of the Catholic Church (both of the Clergy and the Laity) to convert all men to true Christianity. In particular, "Catholic Missions" are the places where these efforts are being carried out. More particularly, "Catholic Missions" refer to those efforts as they are carried out among pagan and non-Catholic peoples.

### ARE ALL THESE PLACES IN FOREIGN COUNTRIES?

No. Those in one's own country are called "Home Missions," and those in other countries are called "Foreign Missions."

### WHAT HELP DOES THE SOCIETY GIVE TO MISSIONS?

Prayers and alms. The more important is prayer.

### HOW ARE THE ALMS DISTRIBUTED TO MISSIONS?

By an International Committee chosen by the Pope himself. This guarantees the impartiality of the distribution and makes certain that help is given to the missionary who needs it most. All missionaries are poor, but some are poorer than others. It helps missionaries of all nationalities, without exception.

### WHERE DOES THE SOCIETY GET ALMS FOR THE MISSION?

Alms come from many sources: gifts, legacies, etc., but the chief income of the Society is the annual offering of the members.

### WHAT ARE THESE OFFERINGS?

Ordinary Membership \$1 annually. Special Membership \$6 per year (may include nine other members, living or deceased). Perpetual Membership \$40 for an individual. Family Perpetual Membership \$100 (limited to members, father, and their sons and daughters—whether living or deceased). Perpetual memberships may be paid in installments within one year.

### WHAT HAVE YOUR SACRIFICES DONE SO FAR?

The Society for the Propagation of the Faith with its 100,000 missionaries aids 65 million people throughout the world and maintains:

- 1200 Hospitals
- 350 Leprosaria
- 45,000 Elementary Schools
- 5,000 High and Superior Schools
- 1,100 Professional and Normal Schools
- 200 Orphanages
- 200 Homes for the Aged
- 3,400 Dispensaries

### DO BOTH THE HOME AND FOREIGN

### MISSIONS RECEIVE ALMS FROM THE SOCIETY?

Yes. The Superiors of the Society at Rome, representing the Holy Father, order a division of funds, accruing from membership dues between Home and Foreign Missions.

### HOW DOES THE SOCIETY HELP MISSIONS BY PRAYER?

It obliges its members to say daily one "Our Father," and "Hail Mary," and also the ejaculation "Saint Francis Xavier, pray for us."

### WHY DOES THE SOCIETY ADOPT THIS PARTICULAR EJACULATION?

Because Saint Francis Xavier is the great missionary of the modern period. On November 10, 1900, Pope Pius X designated him as Patron of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith. Saint Teresa, the Little Flower of Jesus, was made the Patroness of Catholic Missions by Pope Pius XI.

### TO BE A GOOD MEMBER OF THE SOCIETY, IS IT NECESSARY

### NOT TO PRAY DAILY FOR THE MISSIONS AND TO GIVE ALMS?

Yes. In no case is the payment of dues alone sufficient to make a good member. The daily prayer is part of the membership obligation.

### DO MEMBERS GAIN ANY PERSONAL BENEFITS?

Besides the satisfaction and honor of having a hand in the greatest thing that is going on in the world, the Christianization of mankind, members gain very many precious indulgences, and they share in the 15,000 Masses offered annually for living and deceased benefactors; also they share in the prayers and good works of all the missionary priests, brothers and sisters whom they aid.

### HOW DID THE SOCIETY DECIDE UPON

### PRAYERS AND ALMS FOR THE MISSIONS?

At a meeting of fervent French Catholics in the City of Lyons, France, on May 3, 1822, it was decided to adopt a plan for the support of all the Missions in the world, which a pious French girl, Pauline Jaricot by name, had inaugurated among her friends for the support of some foreign missions. This plan was a prayer a day; an alms-a-month for the Missions.

### MAY DECEASED PERSONS BE ENROLLED?

They may be enrolled by their friends as Ordinary, Special or Perpetual Members and partake of the spiritual benefits.

### DOUGHNUTS THAT FLOAT ON AIR

Delicious for pies, baked apples and apple dumplings.

Look for apples that are firm and well-shaped — to avoid overripeness and to increase eye appeal. — Well-colored for the variety — to insure ripeness and good flavor. The color may vary from green to yellow to red depending on the variety. Free from blemishes or soft spots — to avoid waste and insure good cooking flavor. You can cut apples into attractive wedges and rings for a fall fruit tray.

BUT HERE'S a word to the wise, unless you are using Corliss or Twenty Ounce dip the cup apple in lemon, orange or pineapple juice to prevent browning. The combination is first rate as dessert. I discovered a fine idea in apple pan-cakes in the cook book written by June Platt. This famous cook says, mix a good pancake batter first. Then pare, core and slice 3 or 4 McIntosh or Rome Beauty apples and cook them in a little butter in a skillet. Sprinkle apples with sugar just as they begin to reach the soft stage.

And here's what's so unusual about June Platt's recipe. Now, pour the pancake batter right into the skillet over the apples. Be sure the pancake batter runs evenly over the apples. Cook over moderate heat for about 3 minutes, turning the skillet so the apple, pancake

cooks evenly all over. Sprinkle the top of this giant pancake with sugar and a little cinnamon. Then set the skillet in a preheated oven for about 5 to 7 minutes to glaze the top a little. Have ready a large, round serving platter. Use a spatula and transfer the apple pancake to the platter.

Sprinkle again with sugar and cinnamon and a little lemon juice and the apple juice from the skillet. Dot the top with 2 T. butter, roll the cake up. Pour hot blueberry sauce over the whole thing. Cut diagonally into 2 or more servings. Serve at once.

## Catholic Negro Seeks Office

London — (RNS) — First Negro ever to enter a British parliamentary election is a Catholic West Indian physician, Dr. David Pitt. He is running as a Labor Party candidate in the Hampstead constituency here against Minister of Housing, Henry Brooke, a Conservative, who chalked up a 12,000 majority in 1955.

A total of 88 known Catholics are among the candidates of the major parties in the general election. This is 13 more than in the 1955 election.

Oldest candidate in the coming election is a Catholic — 84-year-old David G. Logan, who has represented the Scottish division of Liverpool for the past 30 years. He was the "Father" of the last House.

## Soldier Says First Mass

Madrid — (RNS) — A 53-year-old former lieutenant colonel in the Spanish Army who entered the seminary seven years ago offered his First Mass here in the chapel of the Daughters of Charity.

Father Luis Cuevas Vicente said the Mass in the presence of Archbishop Luis Alonso Munuera, Chaplain General to the armed forces.

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
