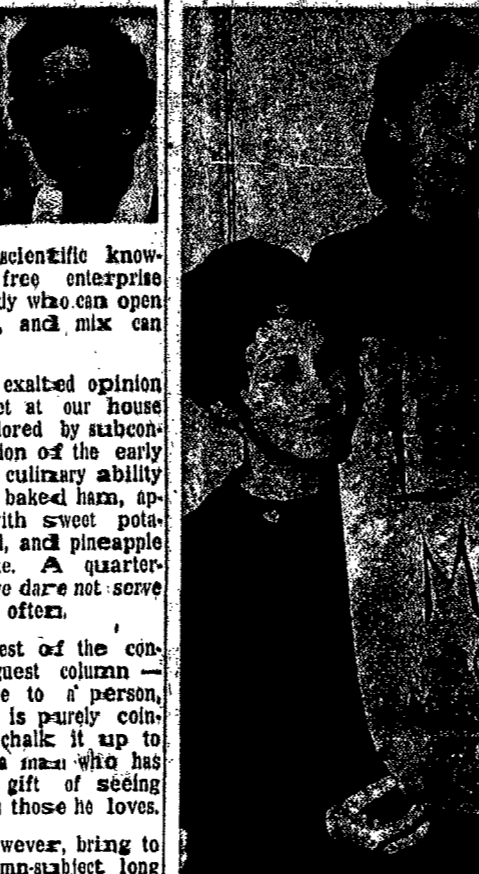
Bugarian King Visits Pope

Listen

"People never listen when we parture in our helping the child talk," complains Emily, one of the characters in Thornton Wilder's problem through intelligent discussion and unbiased observation. The participants were a group of third year high school students in an English class in another community when I was visiting the school.
"This group is known in educational parlance as a 'terminal' group, i.e. a group of boys and girls whose schooling would end upon their leaving high school. Frequently such groups tend not to be responsive to ideas presented by their reading. However, the quotation apparently hit a tender spot, and there was 100% participation in the discussion.
ON THURSDAY previous to my visit the club had read and observed the line. They led on to a skillful teacher, they decided to experiment for twenty-four hours to observe if growing really do learn to the young.
The results and conclusions drawn therefrom was that their parents and of their growing did not listen to them. This led to an acute observation by one girl that perhaps parents do not listen because they are not used to having their high school sons and daughters converse with them. A girl commented that parental criticism of communication have broken down.
OF COURSE, there is the other type of parent who, to paraphrase Emily, "just listens, but he won't listen, and so he never with an astonishing credibility the child's version of every happening. In hearing one side of any controversy I recall Tennessee's line: 'The truth is this to me and that to thee.'"
Although we readily see that the fundamental truths, universal and constant, are unchanging, yet the truth of a controversy may seem contradictory to the protagonists, otherwise if all saw the same in its truth, high no argument or debate would arise.
So, as parents we might be said to be all too often not only to listen, but to listen critically, as well as sympathetically, not to make the listening an end in itself, but rather a point of departure.
