Sister M. Genevieve of St. Maria, Notchcliff, Md., is receiving congratulations and visitors from Rochester on the occasion of her Diamond Jubilee as a Sister of Notre Dame.

At the time she entered the Order she was a member of St. Joseph's Church, Rochester. She was professed in Baltimore on August 1, 1889.

Her first appointment took her to the Most Holy Redeemer Convent, East 4th Street, New York City, and her last appointment, prior to her retirement, was at St. Mary's Convent, Bryn Mawr, Md. Her various placements in the interim are not accurately recalled, except for her most cherished years spent in Puerto Rico.

IT IS BELIEVED that she was with the first group of nuns who left the country to work with the Redemptorist Fathers at their Mission in Puerto de Tierra. She remained there for some 20 years.

Born Antoinette Dittman, daughter of John and Anna Dittman, in Hildesheim, Germany, on January 17, 1875, Sister came to this country in her early teens. Because of language handicap, an attempt at furthering her education had to be relinquished, and her work throughout her active years was confined to domestic duties.
