

Father Bapst Dies In Buffalo

Ordained to the Holy Priesthood at the age of 71 after graduation from St. Bernard's Seminary, the Rev. Robert T. Bapst, former Buffalo superintendent of schools died Oct. 18, 1952 at his home in Buffalo after a short illness.

Bishop Joseph A. Burke of Buffalo offered the funeral Mass in St. Louis Church, Wednesday.

Father Bapst retired in 1949 from his school post after 17 years in the Buffalo public school system. He entered St. Bernard's Seminary in Rochester and took an accelerated course. He was ordained in 1951.

ACCORDING TO Rt. Rev. Msgr. Wilfred T. Craugh, rector of St. Bernard's, Father Bapst had had a lifelong desire to become a priest, but the necessity of supporting his mother prevented his doing so. "He was a man of deep piety and high religious principle," Monsignor Craugh said.

A special dispensation from Pope Plus XII was necessary because of his age.

He served as Buffalo's city superintendent of schools for 13 years and was at one time considered a possible choice for state commissioner of education.

FATHER BAPST held a doctor of philosophy degree from St. Louis University and honorary degrees from Niagara University and Canisius College.

At the time of his death, Father Bapst was listed as curate at St. Louis Church, Malta and Edwards St., Buffalo.

Slums, Intolerance Grind Immigrants

New York — (NC) — A sociologist has declared that Puerto Rican immigrants to the United States "are not nearly as great a problem for New York, as New York is a problem for them."

"The marvel is not that there has been so much delinquency, but that there has been so little," said Father Joseph P. Fitzpatrick, S.J., in an address at Fordham University.

Father Fitzpatrick is a professor of sociology at the university. The priest cited the history of New York to show that immigrant groups have always experienced difficulty in adjusting to life in the U.S., and have frequently had high crime rates.

However, he added, "the gang was not the product of immigrants. It was the product of life in New York — the by-product of generations lost in the confusion and bewilderment of the uprooting."

(An article by Dan Wakefield in Sunday's New York Times echoes Father Fitzpatrick's statement. Wakefield says New York's first street gangs were made up of Irish immigrants in the early 1800's, a pattern followed by subsequent immigrant groups facing slum living and intolerance. The Times article publishes statistics indicating the majority of Puerto Rican newcomers, like the majority of earlier immigrants, are law-abiding, hard-working but seriously under-paid people.)

Referring to the problems of recent Puerto Rican immigrants, Father Fitzpatrick declared that "delinquency is not something that Puerto Ricans bring with them. It is something that happens to them when they get here."

"Uprooted from a way of life they took for granted," he said, "they find themselves strangers in a way of life they do not understand. Things that were right in Puerto Rico, they find wrong here. Things that were wrong in Puerto Rico, they find right here."
