

### Deamery Meets In Canandaigua



The Very Rev. Waldimir B. Dowovich, pastor of St. Nicholas Ukrainian Catholic Church in Elmira Heights will retire from active duty effective on Sunday. He has been a priest 62 years.

Father Dowovich will be succeeded by the Rev. Miroslav J. Myschyszyn, who now is pastor of St. Vladimir Church in Stamford, Conn.

A testimonial dinner and tributes have been arranged for Sunday afternoon at 4:30 in the church hall.



## Parishioners To Commemorate Church Tragedy

Special devotions by parishioners of St. Boniface Church on Friday, Nov. 6, will mark the second anniversary of the destruction by fire of the former historic Gregory Street church edifice.

Prayers will be offered for the success of the fund appeal to be made Nov. 8 and 15 for pledges toward costs of the new church now being constructed on the site of the razed towered Gothic structure.

It will be exactly two years ago at twilight on Nov. 6 that spectacular, wind-swept flames ruined the 70-year-old landmark, leaving it a blistered, water-soaked hulk. The new church is planned for occupancy early next year.

**THE REV. Francis J. Taylor**, pastor, said the school children will participate in the special devotions at 7:45 p.m. Nov. 6, which will consist of a procession, Rosary and Benediction. Services have been held in the renovated school auditorium on Whalin Street since the fire.

Nearly 200 men who will serve as committee lieutenants for the current fund campaign will meet at 8 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 5, in the school basement.

Three-year pledges, with a minimum goal of \$200,000, will be sought in the drive. Advanced gifts solicitation is scheduled Sunday, Nov. 8, and the general parishwide canvass is slated Sunday, Nov. 15.

The first St. Boniface parish building, a combination church, school and rectory, was dedicated in the early days of the

Civil War. It is the centennial of this dedication which the parish will mark in June, 1961. The fire-ravaged church was dedicated by Bishop McQuaid on Dec. 18, 1887. Through the years the other existing parish buildings, rectory, school and convent, were erected.



