Filipino Doctor Interns



HER WORK AS an intern also includes concentrated strady in surgery, medicine, pediatrics and obstetrics under the close supervision of members of the hospital medical and surgical




Judge Minton was born in Port Leyden, Lewis County, New York, the eldest son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Minton. He was graduated from St. Bonaventure University in 1918 as Valedictorian of his Class with a degrae of Bachelor of Aris, Magna Cum Laude. He remained at "Bonas" as an instructor and to do gradu-abe work. He received arz M.A. in 1920 and a B.S. in 1921.

After teaching and being principal of the High School at Constableville, N.Y., for one year he entered Yale University and received a Bachelor of Laws from that school in 1925. While studying law at Yale Judge Minton taught Eriglish, General Science and Mathematics at the Derby Connecticut High School. - Judge Minton started his Law practice

in Rochester with the old firms of Sutherland & Dwyer. He also served as the first Voluntary Public Defender in Rochester from 1928 to 1933.
