

New Nuns' College Dedication Sunday

The newest educational facility of the diocese, a college for nuns conducted by the Sisters of Mercy, will be dedicated Sunday, Nov. 8, at 4 p.m. by Bishop Kearney.

The Bishop, chancellor of the college, will deliver the keynote address. Other speakers slated for the dedication ceremony are: Mother Mary Magdalene, Mother General of the Sisters of Mercy, and Kenneth T. Duran, Associate in Higher Education, New York State Department of Education.

Catherine McAuley Junior College constitutes the first three years of a typical college program, granting its graduates over 100 of the minimum 124 credits required for the baccalaureate degree which all the Sisters subsequently pursue.

THE NEW COLLEGE building, a west wing of Our Lady of Mercy Motherhouse, has been built in modernized Gothic style, designed to preserve the continuity of the character of the main building.

The steel-frame structure is 225 feet long. Two floors are devoted to the college proper and two are designed for multiple residence.

A special services wing houses the college's offerings to these neighboring communities: the Reading Laboratory, Testing and Guidance Center, and Speech Clinic. Over 4,000 students of all faiths, have enrolled for these services during the eight years they have been functioning.

The library has two floors connected by an inside staircase. It is highly individualized in style, designed to isolate the individual in the solitude conducive to scholarship. There are 8 private carrels and working places for 84 students in all. The library is appropriately located in the center of the building, since it is the hub of the college, all courses being conducted by policy on the bibliography, rather than the single textbook approach.

BESIDES REGULAR classrooms, the college includes a science laboratory, language laboratory, library, listening room, audio-visual room, music room, art studio, business-machine room, alumnae room, as well as recreation rooms, administration offices, faculty lounge and faculty office.

The reading Laboratory includes two reading rooms, two speech laboratories, three testing offices, a special micro-panels observation room, an audio-visual room, the young people's library, and the administration offices.

Priest-professors who serve each term on the college faculty include: Rt. Rev. Mgr. Louis Edelman, European Culture; Rev. Elmer McNamara, Sacred Scripture; Rev. Stanislaus Krolak, philosophy; Rev. Albert Shamon, theology; Rev. Joseph Donovan, education.

Mother Mary Magdalene is president of the college, Sister Mary de Pazi is Dean of Instruction.

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Walter M. Nugent is architect. John Luther is general contractor.

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PARTICIPANTS in the planning of the Congress have been Rev. Joseph J. Abend, C.S.B., of Aquinas Institute, Rev. Francis J. Stachel, S.J., of McQuaid Jesuit High School, Sister M. Przemisl, S.S., of Nazareth Academy, Sister Elaine Theresa, S.S., of St. Agnes High School and Sister M. Maureen, R.S.M., of Our Lady of Mercy High School.

KEYNOTE ADDRESS to open the Congress at 10 a.m. will explore the theme, "The Pope Speaks to Young Catholics." The Rev. Richard Torrey, director of the Diocesan High School Sodality Union, will welcome the sodalists and deliver the opening talk.

Sodalists will assist at Mass in the Mercy Auditorium at 12 noon, celebrated by the Rev. Francis K. Drolet, S.J., of New York City, regional director of the Sodality of Our Lady. Bishop Kearney will close the Congress with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament at 4 p.m.

Ten Thousand Miles From Home:

Filipino Doctor Interns At St. Joseph's Hospital

The will to serve humanity is at all times a potent factor in the determination of many self-sacrificing people and may be found everywhere that civilized man inhabits the earth.

Such has a desire taken a petite, scholarly and personable young lady from the comforts and pleasures of her home ten thousand miles distant and brought her to Elmir's St. Joseph's Hospital to further her studies in medicine so that she may one day bring help to her fellow citizens in far off Bacolod City, 250 miles south of Manila in the Philippine Islands.

Serving a Rotating Internship at St. Joseph's as an exchange student—Dr. Esther Pura may be found walking the seemingly endless corridors of the hospital accompanying the doctors on their patient calls, followed by consultations and discussions as to the conditions found with each patient.

HER WORK AS an intern also includes concentrated study in surgery, medicine, pediatrics and obstetrics under the close supervision of members of the hospital medical and surgical staffs.

She will spend much time in special classes on radiology and pathology under these department heads—staff physicians. In addition to these time-consuming duties, Dr. Pura is on daily call at the hospital in all emergencies for five days each week and is on 24 hour call every other week and one day in five is subject to 24 hour call.

Despite these many duties and the urgency for long hours of study, Dr. Pura has not let the mark of her early training both at home and the Catholic school she attended in her native Philippines for she can be found at some time every day quietly reciting the rosary in the hospital chapel and also in attendance at week day Masses in this chapel when they are held and if time permits.

A GRADUATE OF St. Cecilia College of Bacolod City in 1950 where she was taught by the Augustinian Sisters, she then completed her pre-medical and medical studies at Santa Tomas University in Manila where in 1957 she received her degree in medicine.

Her first year at Internship was spent at Weir's Ophthalmic Provincial Hospital in Bacolod City followed by a second year at St. Francis Hospital in Poughkeepsie, N.Y.

The daughter of Gregorio and Julia Pura, she is one of three children, all girls. One sister is a graduate of Santa Tomas University where she received a degree in Home Economics and the other sister is at present completing her studies in music for her degree at St. Scholastica's College in Manila.

Dr. Pura is determined to avail herself of all possible sources of medical knowledge for she now plans on taking a residency in Internal Medicine—a three year study following her present year at St. Joseph's.

SHE PLANS at the conclusion of these studies to return to the Philippines where she will then choose between private practice or affiliation with a hospital.

"I like my work here at St. Joseph's Hospital very much. Everyone has been friendly, helpful and extremely kind to me, but I do get lonely for my parents and sisters and look forward to the day when we can all be together again," was the final statement made to this reporter.

From this statement it can be readily concluded that Dr. Pura willingly makes this great sacrifice of absence from her loved ones prompted by an equally strong love for her chosen profession—service to God's needy, for in her care to them she also ministers unto Him.

JUDGE MINTON

Judge LEO T. MINTON was appointed to the City Court bench in January 1954 for a term expiring December 31, 1954. He ran for this office in November 1954 and was elected to a five year term.

Judge Minton was born in Port Leyden, Lewis County, New York, the eldest son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Minton. He was graduated from St. Bonaventure University in 1918 as Valedictorian of his class with a degree of Bachelor of Arts, Magna Cum Laude. He remained at "Bonns" as an instructor and to do graduate work. He received his M.A. in 1920 and a B.S. in 1921.

After teaching and being principal of the High School at Cornsleville, N.Y., for one year he entered Yale University and was graduated a Bachelor of Laws from that school in 1925. While studying law at Yale Judge Minton taught English, General Science and Mathematics at the Derby Connecticut High School.

Judge Minton started his law practice in Rochester with the old firm of Sutherland & Dwyer. He also served as the first Voluntary Public Defender in Rochester from 1928 to 1933.

He was elected Third Ward Supervisor five times, resigning in January 1954 to become Judge.

He is a member of the Third and Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus, Holy Name Society, Rochester Bar Association, Elks, Past Present and Chairman of the Board of Directors of the St. Bonaventure University Alumni Association, Co-Chairman of the Interfaith Committee of the Allied Forces Inc., a Trustee of the Immaculate Conception Church where he has been parishioner since coming to Rochester in 1925.

He will also be remembered as an active member of the St. Boniface Football Club and the Rochester Community Players.

Judge Minton is married to the former Helen Kavanaugh; they have one daughter Anne who is a sophomore at the College of New Rochelle.

Judge Minton has proved himself to be a very able Judge during the five and one half years he has served the people of Rochester, and deserves reelection. Anything you can do to insure his reelection on November 3, 1959 will be very much appreciated.
