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Dead Pig Haunts Guinea No More

By FATHER R. M. WILTGEN, S.V.D. Womane, New Guinea — (NC) — A generation of fear and suspicion here has come to an end for Kukuanes...

The priest was Father Karl Morscheuser, S.V.D., 30, from Germany, member of an expedition that went into the newly opened Chimbu Valley to pick out mission sites in an uncontrolled area.

Father Morscheuser was killed with arrows while trying to escape down a precipitous mountain pass and across a wide gully.

A meeting with the Kukuanes was called for this August by Father Cornelius van Baar, S.V.D., of Holland, a member of the Alexishofen vicariate apostolic.

HE EXPLAINED that this 1950 meeting was necessary to clear the air and to wipe out the last traces of fear from the natives' hearts for the 1934 killing.

This was Father van Baar's first visit to the Chimbu Valley since the killing.

He came for the dedication of the new church at Toromambuno, which seats 1,000 people, and for the simultaneous celebration of the 25th anniversary of the Chimbu mission, which now has 9,000 Catholics.

The meeting place chosen by Father van Baar was in this village alongside a bush church which marks the spot where natives burned down one of his mission schools in 1934.

Describing the 1934 incident to nearly 200 Kukuanes assembled here, Father van Baar told how he had tried to use native psychology and threatened to shoot a Kukuanes pig if the bush school were not rebuilt by the time he returned from his reconnaissance of the Chimbu Valley.

When he returned 17 days later, the school had not been rebuilt so he carried out his threat. The Kukuanes immediately became wild with anger and let fly a volley of arrows, putting to flight the 102

St. Bona Awards Richard Mancuso

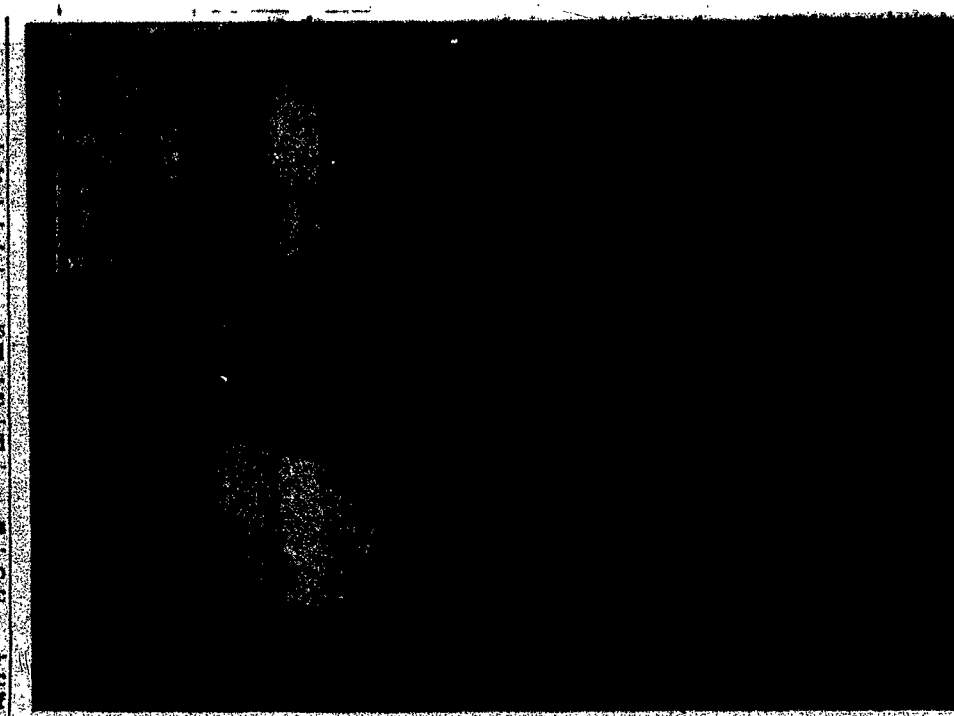

Mancuso has made the dean's list throughout his college career and stands near the top of his class with an academic index of 2.5.

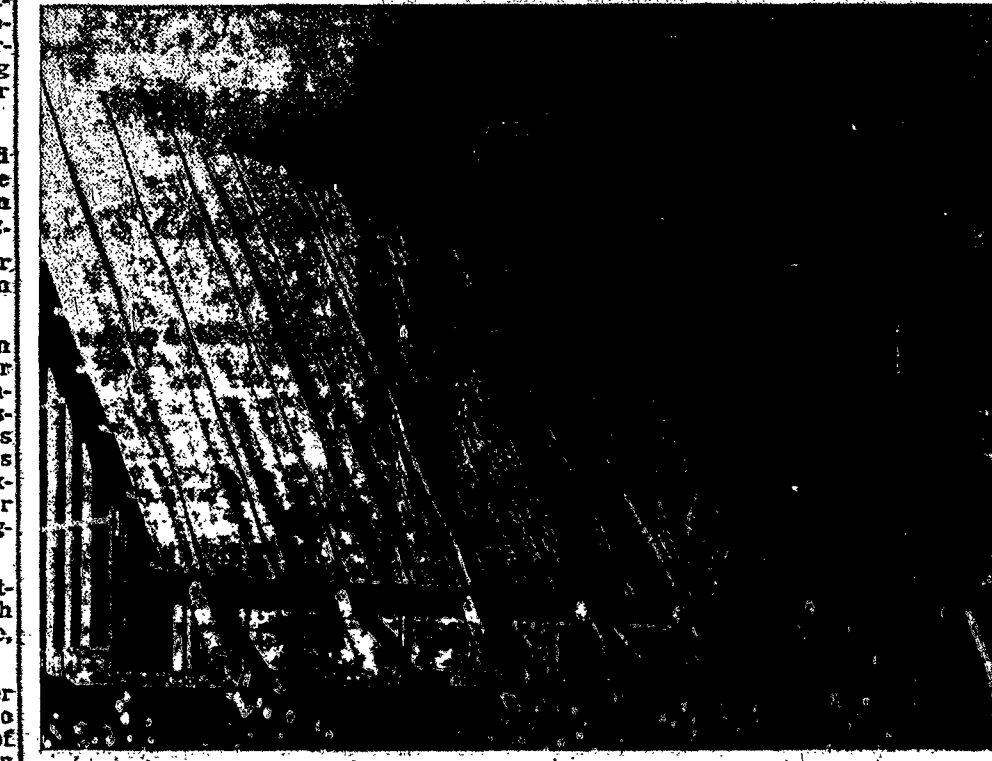

Polish Reds OK Church Aid To Poor

MILWAUKEE — (RNS) — Negotiations are taking place between the U.S. Catholic hierarchy and Polish Communist authorities for permission to distribute welfare aid in Poland directly and through the Polish bishops, it was disclosed here.

Mgr. Edward E. Swannstrom, executive director of Catholic Relief Services, National Catholic Welfare Conference, noted that at present no outside Catholic agencies are permitted to provide direct welfare assistance in Poland or any other Communist-dominated country in Eastern Europe.

THE MONSIGNOR, whose headquarters are in New York, was in Milwaukee for the 45th annual meeting of the National Conference of Catholic Charities. He recently returned from a tour of Europe and North Africa to study relief and refugee problems.

Mgr. Swannstrom said that all Catholic Relief Services can do now is send parcels of clothing and medicine to specific families behind the iron curtain. At the moment, he stated, there is little hope of increased American Catholic aid to any Communist country except Poland.

In an address to the Catholic Charities conference, Mgr. Swannstrom estimated that there are now 18,000,000 refugees in the world as compared with 40,000,000 at the close of World War II.

The lot of the refugees in Europe is better than that of refugees in Asia, he said, because the former "at least have a roof over their heads. Untold numbers of refugees in Asia have no more shelter than a tent, a tarp-paper shack, a hole in the ground, or a space on a city sidewalk."

Kidnap Plot

Berlin — (NC) — Father Hieronim Godziewicz, secretary to His Eminence Stefan Cardinal Wyszyński, Primate of Poland, safely escaped a street attack by men who tried to pull him into a waiting car, a report from Warsaw said.

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
