

### Prelate Raps Underpay Practices

Cape Town, South Africa — (NC) — Underpaying non-white workers in South Africa has been criticized by Archbishop Owen McCann of Cape Town.

"The moment South Africa began employing non-whites, the country took on obligations — moral obligations that cannot be shrugged off," the Archbishop stated. "They (nonwhites) have contributed to the welfare of South Africa, and the consequences must be accepted — in the light of the dignity of the human person, and the sanctification of the family."

Pointing out that in South Africa the ratio of the unskilled wage to the skilled wage is about one to four, while in other countries it is about three to four, the Archbishop continued. "It is not for me to say here what the exact wage should be, but I would point out that an increase of wage will increase the purchasing power, and to benefit the economy of the country that way. This has been recognized in the United States and should be here too."

In regard to migratory labor, the prelate criticized the system that separates husband and wife for long periods, and fathers from their children.

### Botany Professor Set At Nazareth

Dr. John N. Couch, professor of botany at the University of North Carolina, will be guest lecturer at Nazareth College on Tuesday and Wednesday, Nov. 10 and 11.

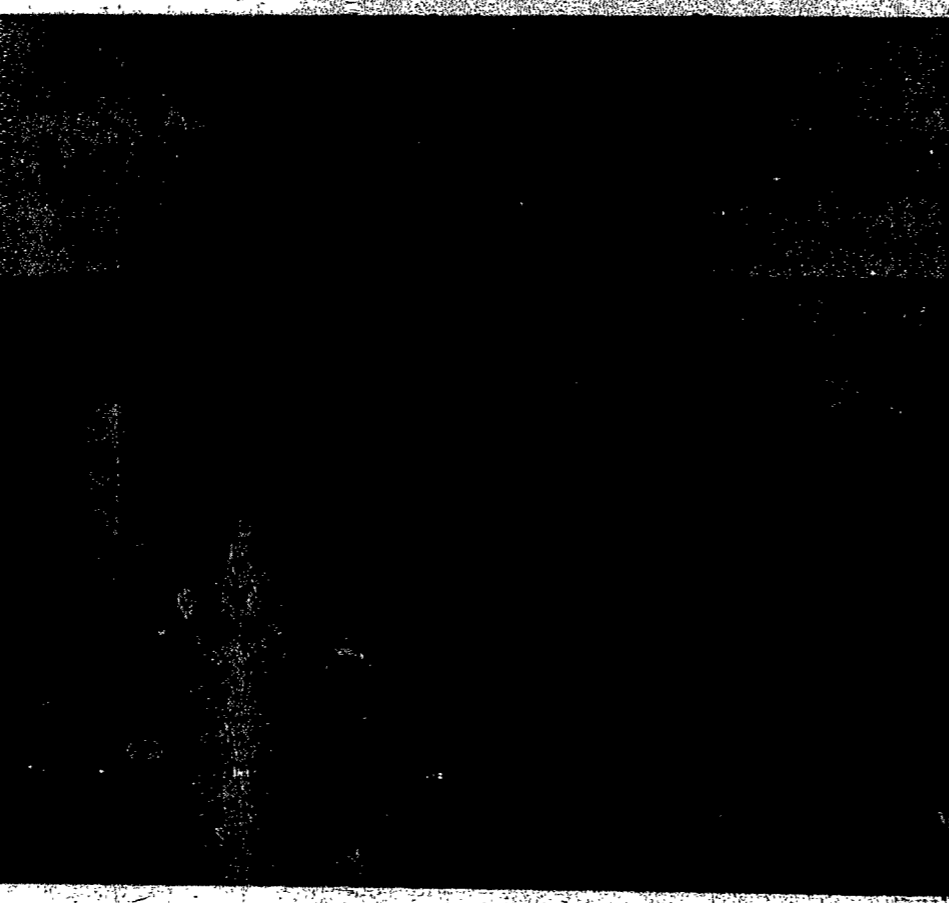

### Congress Eyes Smut Control

Washington — (NC) — A Congressional committee has outlined a sweeping six-point program for dealing with the problem of obscene literature at the Federal, state and local levels.

"The youth of our land are being bombarded from all sides with a loose portrayal of sex that serves to weaken the moral fiber of the future leaders of our nation," the House Postal Operations Subcommittee declared in making its recommendation.

In its "interim report" issued after a series of hearings earlier this year, the subcommittee said it believes that there is a direct connection between recent increases in juvenile misbehavior and the reading of sordid literature.

**THE SUBCOMMITTEE'S** six-point program for action recommended:

- 1) That community leaders set up public information and legislative programs in their communities to alert citizens to the problem and to encourage law enforcement officials to the action against obscenity.
- 2) That national organizations urge their local chapters to take action against objectionable literature.
- 3) That state governments consider adopting more uniform anti-obscenity laws, and set up state legislative commissions to study the problem.
- 4) That local governments adopt "more effective ordinances" against obscenity.
- 5) That the "various branches of the publications and movie industries" set up self-censoring in order to eliminate smut from the mass media.
- 6) That the Post Office Department continue to advise Congress on legislative action needed to render its anti-obscenity campaign more effective.

Chairman of the House of Postal Operations Subcommittee is Rep. Kathryn E. Granahan of Pennsylvania. Rep. Granahan sponsored legislation in the last session of Congress. The subcommittee and state Post Office administrative procedures in dealing with obscene literature.

Her bill was passed by the House, but the Senate failed to act on it before Congress adjourned.

Besides the general six-point program, the subcommittee also recommended a more detailed eight-point program for "community action in a crusade against obscenity." The program included the following suggestions:

- 1) Interested citizens should form a "top policy committee," made up of representatives of church and civic organizations, to direct the program. The support of newspapers and radio and television stations should be enlisted.
- 2) A program should be developed which "seeks to point up this serious problem" and a "suggested plan of action" should be provided.
- 3) A speakers' bureau should be set up to provide organization.

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
