His name was Paul, his homeland, Korea. When the Communists came into his country, he went to every Catholic home saying: "Say the Rosary! Die for your faith, if need be." The Communists saw him visiting these homes and sentenced him to death. A young Communist soldier assigned to kill him said: "You look like a holy man. I will fire a shot in the air. You go into the woods and I will say that you were killed."

Paul was uneasy in the woods for he knew how much his faithful were suffering under the Reds. He came out of hiding after one day, was arrested again by a Communist captain who said: "I will shoot you myself!" Taking him behind the jail the Communist raised his revolver. At that moment an American Mustang fighter flew over, machine-gunned the Communist positions, and the captain fell dead.

Paul has two sons studying for the priesthood and one son who is already a priest. It is from such families that vocations are born.

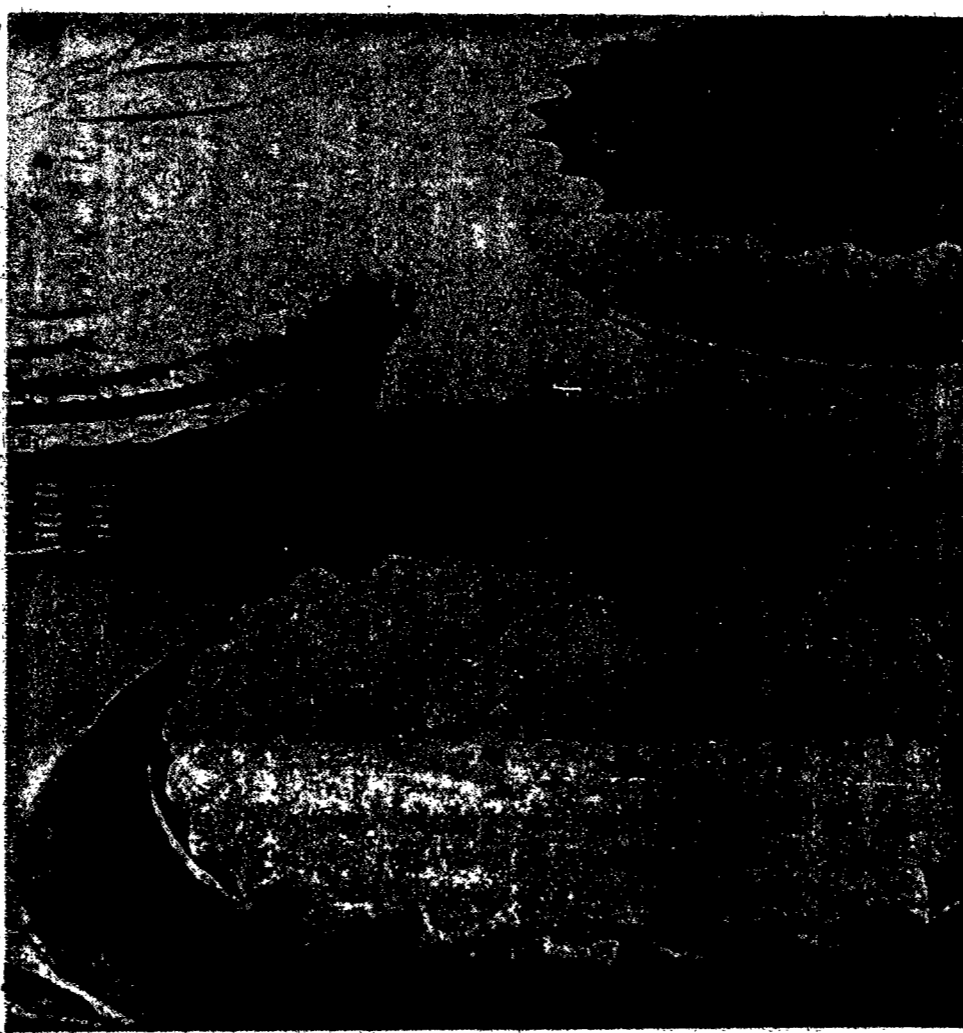

## Thanksgiving Time

It's good to be home again after a wonderful two week vacation in New York and Philadelphia. Suddenly I am aware that Thanksgiving is almost here.

All over the country and, in fact, all over the world, the 150th anniversary of the birth of Abraham Lincoln, 18th President of the United States, is being observed during this Bicentennial Year. As the Thanksgiving season approaches, it seemed to me that perhaps you might be interested in the fact that it was President Lincoln who issued the FIRST ANNUAL NATIONAL THANKSGIVING PROCLAMATION.

THE NATIONAL observance of Thanksgiving during the past three quarters of a century has brought good cheer into our homes, quickened our patriotic impulses, and given the nation an unusual opportunity to reaffirm its loyalty to the "beneficent Creator and Ruler of the Universe."

This week and next, I want to devote my column to some suggestions for Thanksgiving dinner and if your family is like mine, they will vote for pie for dessert. So here for you to try are three wonderful pumpkin pies. Each recipe is so good your family will undoubtedly insist on saving them over and over again.

There's the delectable old fashioned pie which comes out of the oven a beautiful, luscious orange; a fluffy chiffon containing unflavored gelatin for a firm, light filling; and a frozen pie with a crunchy cookie crust. The chiffon pie can be made a day ahead to save time on busy schedules.

**PUMPKIN PIE**  
2 eggs  
3/4 c. sugar  
2 1/2 t. cinnamon  
3/4 t. each, ginger, allspice, cloves, nutmeg and salt.  
1 can (1 pound) pumpkin  
3/4 c. molasses  
1 tall can (1 1/2 c.) evaporated milk  
1 - 9 inch unbaked pastry shell
