

Dead At 53

John D. Stewart, 53, formerly of the news staff of the old Rochester Journal - American and later editor of the Florida Catholic, St. Augustine diocesan newspaper died in Battle Creek, Mich. of a heart attack, Nov. 7, 1959.

AFTER LEAVING the Florida Catholic, he worked on newspapers and magazines in Washington, D.C. For the last four years he was director of press and information at the Civil and Defense Mobilization Headquarters in Battle Creek.

He was an alumnus of the University of Noire Dame and Columbia University's graduate journalism school. He is survived by his wife, two sons, a daughter and six grandchildren.
