

Bishop Casey Slated For Kickoff Dinner

Archbishop Lawrence Casey will address more than 2000 members of the St. Boniface parish at 8 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 14, at the kickoff dinner for the new church. The dinner will be held in the school hall.

Three-year pledges with a minimum gift of \$2000 will be solicited. The parishwide campaign will run from 8 to 4 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 14, for funds toward the new Gregory Street church to be constructed on the site of the former fire-ravaged edifice.

The Rev. Francis J. Taylor, pastor, announced that completion of the church is expected early next year. Since the disastrous fire just two years ago, parishioners have attended services in the remodeled school auditorium.

JOINING OUT That there is an estimated projected cost of \$3,100,000 still to be met on completion of the new church. Father Taylor said the parishioners that this would be a prohibitive debt burden, and that it necessitates an immediate campaign to reach the amount to be borrowed and the interest payments thereon.

The new church, which will seat 700 persons, is of modern Gothic architecture. It will be attached to the rectory, and will be air-conditioned. Above the main entrance will be a stained-glass window, and above the main altar a large mural of St. Boniface.

The sanctuary and altar will be in marble. On one side of the vestibule will be the baptistry, and on the other the stairway to the choir loft. In the basement will be a large all-purpose room to be used primarily as a nursery, where socially girls will take care of small children during services.

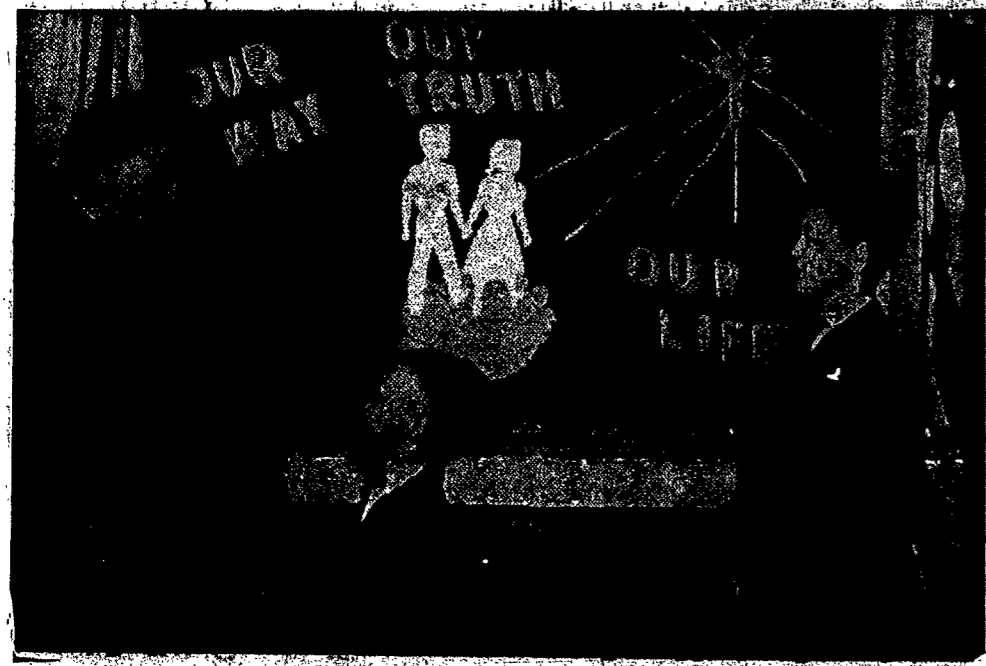
Property to the east of the church, at the corner of Gregory and Whiting Streets, is being expanded for siting of a new parking area. The church will have two entrances on each side.

THE FIRST St. Boniface church, a combination church school and rectory, was dedicated in the early days of the city when it was the center of the parish.

Mercy Memorial Rite Changed

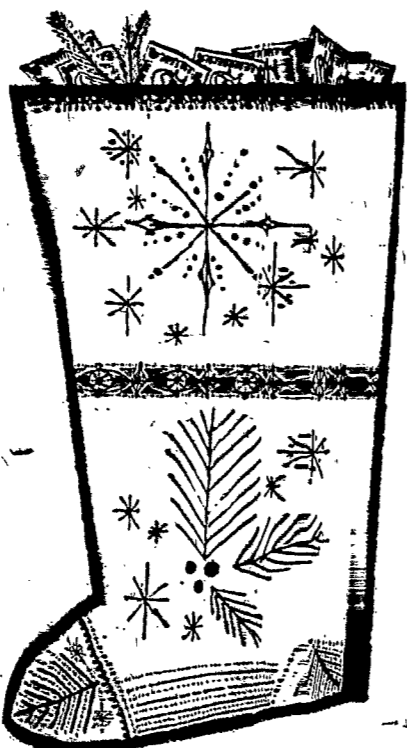
