**Welcome --- Catholic Editors!**

Catholic press conventions of the past come to mind as more than 100 editors and newsmen of Eastern United States publications are in session here in Rochester.

The Catholic Press Association of the United States which was organized in 1890, according to our records, is conducting this regional gathering.

My first experience at a convention when members were less than 100 and an annual meeting was held in 1931 in Baltimore, I was with the Rochester Echo at the time and was invited to attend the proceedings with Father Leo C. Mooney and the late William A. Heindl. My connection with the Courier-Journal at that time was far from our thoughts.

As I look back now, even in those days, the teamwork of clergy and laity in the Catholic press field was inspiring. While the sessions brought strong voicing of personal opinions by editors such as Fathers Wilfred Parson, Francis LeBuffe, James Gillis and laymen including Benedict Elder, Patrick Scanlan, Richard Reid and Claude Becker, all were intensely interested in producing Catholic publications that would be read and acted upon for spiritual welfare.

One of the interesting editors was Father Howard Bishop who later became founder of the Glenmary Home Mission Society. He later attended a Catholic Rural Life convention here in Rochester.

Still another was Father Thomas K. Gorman, then with the Tidings of Los Angeles and now Bishop of Dallas-Fort Worth. Bishop Gorman attended the 1930 convention in Rochester and I remember seeing him in conference with Pat Scanlan and Dick Reid in Monsignor Patrick J. Flynn's discussing current, at that time, events with Monsignor Flynn.

During the Baltimore Convention the newsmen travelled down the Chesapeake to Annapolis, met Governor Ritchie and inspected the Naval Academy.

In that period of the Catholic Press the ground for sowing the seeds was hardly touched. Tilling was difficult. I remember having Dr. Thomas Hart of Cincinnati pointed out to me and being told that here was a medical man so deeply interested in the need for the Catholic paper that he even went up and down the streets of his city seeking subscribers.

Prior to our time on the paper it was a custom of editors, it was noted in the files, to take issue with each other and some vitriolic panings while exciting did not tend to bring the editors together.

Later it became the practice to quote editorial opinion. We thought we were made when an editorial we had written appeared with a credit tag in other publications.

After joining the Courier-Journal I remember a convention was held about 1933 in Buffalo and it was there that I met Monsignor Ferger now pastor at Snyder. He was an energetic editor of the Catholic Union and Times and a crusader for what he thought was right.

The convention was brought here to Rochester in May of 1937. A press exhibit and sessions were held in the Sheraton Hotel. The banquet was at Powers Hotel. Among remembered speakers were Bishop Edwin O'Hara of Kansas City and John B. Kennedy, noted broadcaster and editor. William A. Lang was toastmaster.

The next convention to come here was in 1950. Monsignor John S. Randall, managing editor was coming to the forefront in Catholic Press Association circles and directed a successful meeting. Banquet was at the Seneca where the late Senator Joseph McCarthy was the speaker. A press exhibit at Columbus Civic Center attracted many visitors. Monsignor Randall later became national CPA president and is now on the national board of directors.

Actual tangible results from these gatherings of Bishops, priests, sisters and lay persons giving their all for a press to support and stand behind the Church, to safeguard the spiritual lives of the young and to give Catholic publications they can look forward to receiving are hard to put on paper.

Frankly I believe that they have helped and the fact that not only the national convention is held but many sectional gatherings take place indicate that persons, after all, are taking home ideas and help in the production of their papers.

A salute, then, from an old timer, to the younger editors, newsmen, advertising men and circulation workers here in Rochester. The Catholic press is on the march and the readers and advertisers, more and more, are falling in line.
