

Women's College Plans Europe Tour In April

Announcement was made this week of a Nazareth College Spring Tour of Europe under the leadership of Mrs. Virginia Otto, Ph.D., Assistant Professor of Foreign Languages at the college.

Mrs. Otto, who has conducted other student tours of Europe, has planned a special one-month itinerary, from April 6 to May 4, to include Spain, Italy, France, and England. The party will fly TWA, leaving New York on Wednesday, April 6 and arriving in Madrid the following day.

The opportunity to participate in this tour is open to Nazareth students, alumnae, and their friends.

Highlight of the tour will be Holy Week in Rome. Leaving Madrid at noon on Holy Thursday, the party will arrive in Rome in time for solemn services in St. Peter's Basilica on Good Friday, Holy Saturday and Easter Sunday will be spent in the Eternal City with an opportunity to participate in the solemn liturgy of Holy Week at St. Peter's, St. Mary Major, John Lateran and St. Paul's Outside the Walls, culminating in Easter Sunday Mass in St. Peter's.

Madrid, Seville, Toledo, Avila and Granada in Spain; optional extension to Naples, Sorrento and Capri in Italy; Paris, Versailles, Chartres, the Channel Country, in France; London, Oxford and Stratford in England are among the places of interest included in the tour.

Included in the cost of the tour, in addition to air transportation, are first-class hotel accommodations, meals, sight-seeing by private motorcoach, theatre and opera tickets, tips and taxes.
