

Prelate Says Don't Be Phony Nurse

Pittsburgh —(RNS)— Bishop John J. Wright of Pittsburgh said here that "nursing is one of the professions on which the American community must rely not only for the healing of broken bodies, but also for the healing of badly battered moral values of the American community."

Speaking before the Pennsylvania Nurses' Association convention, the prelate declared that "recent disclosures of the TV rackets reveal further symptoms of how sick the collective moral personality of our nation has become."

"Nursing is closely allied to one of the traditional learned professions, that of medicine," he said. "It is itself a learned profession nowadays. As such, it has a powerful corrective influence to play in offsetting phony erudition, the cult of degrees and academic status for their own sake, and the false identification of information and mere 'answers' with knowledge and wisdom."

"All of us have a moral obligation not to be phonies in our display of knowledge as in anything else. With nurses, that obligation is double barreled, since the lives of people depend on their actually knowing rather than pretending to know the secrets of their specialization."

Maryknollers At Titicaca

Yunguyo, Peru — With the opening of a mission in this town, the Maryknoll Fathers now have a string of missions running along one entire side of huge Lake Titicaca in the Andes Mountains.

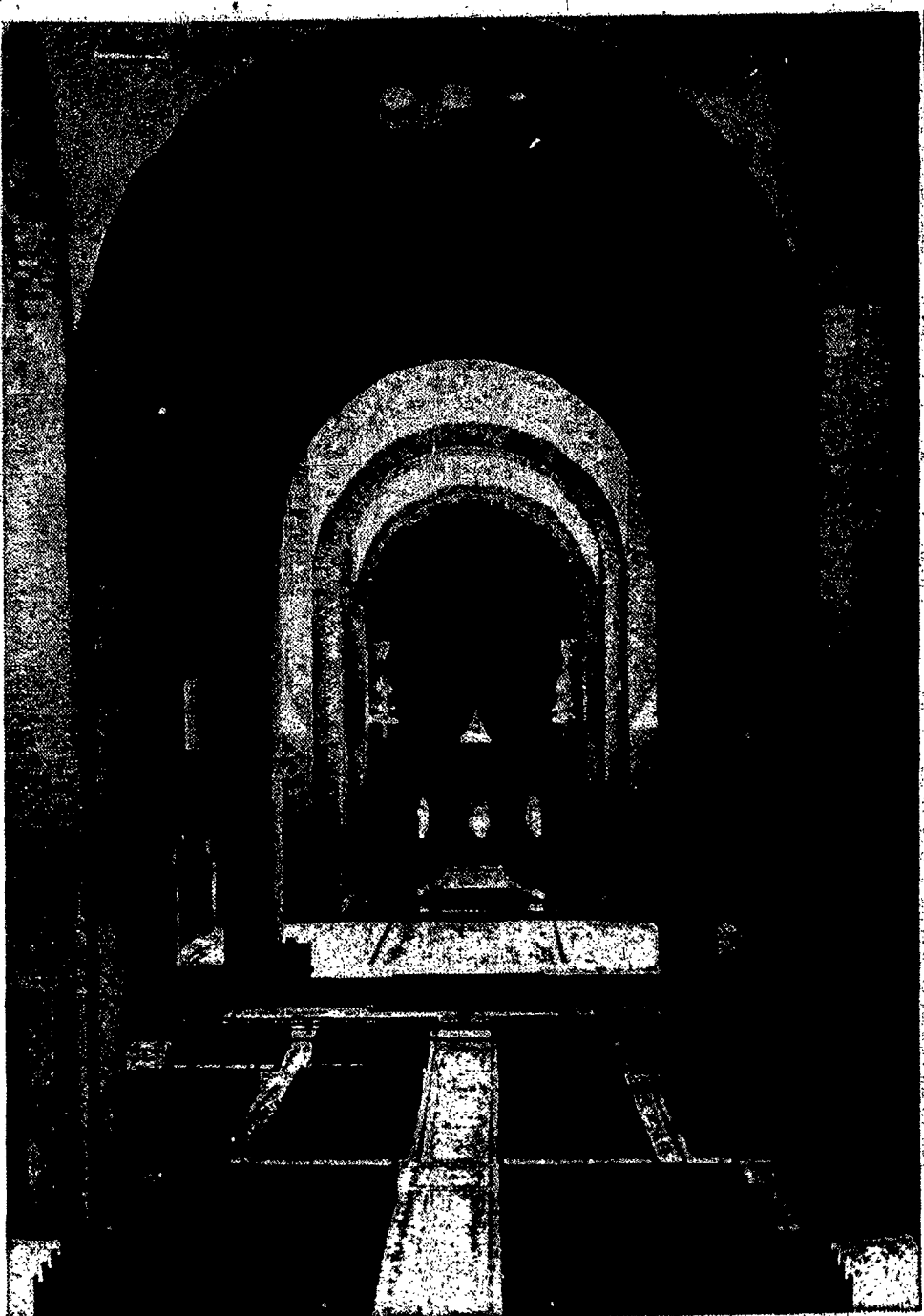
From Puno, Peru to La Paz, Bolivia, the Maryknollers have established missions caring for hundreds of thousands of souls in the remote mountain villages.

"Only the small town of Pomata, in the hands of a native priest, remains outside Maryknoll's responsibility," says Father Joseph F. Murray, M.M., of New York, N.Y. "The next area we want to tackle is the other side of the 138-mile long lake."

American Quadragesimo Anno

Goals of 1919 Attained

Chicago — (NC) — The 1919 U.S. Bishops' program for social reconstruction, which generated years of heated controversy over its "liberal" character, will be quietly commemorated here by a group which sees most of the program today reflected in U.S. life.

The observance, a dinner, will mark the 40th anniversary of the document. The event is being sponsored by the Catholic Council on Working Life on November 22.

Issued in the trying period after World War I, the statement received many favorable comments, but it was also widely assailed, especially by industrialists, as being too liberal.

THE STATEMENT had 11 principal recommendations, and by 1939, its 20th anniversary.

The late Cardinal Edward Mooney, Archbishop of Detroit, was able to write that all but the statement's 10th proposal had been either wholly or partially translated into action.

The 11 recommendations were:

1. Minimum wage legislation.
2. Insurance against unemployment, sickness, invalidism and old age.
3. A provision against employment of children under 16.

4. Legal enforcement of the right of labor to organize.

5. Continuation of the National War Labor Board for purposes affecting the relation of employers and employees.

6. A national employment service.

7. Public housing for the working classes.

8. No general reduction of wartime wages and a long range program of increasing them, not only for the benefit of labor, but also to bring about that general prosperity which cannot be maintained without a wide distribution of purchasing power.

9. Prevention of excessive profits and incomes through a regulation of rates which allows owners of public utilities only a fair rate of return on their actual investment, and through progressive taxes on inheritance, income and excess profits.

10. Participation of labor in management and a wider distribution of ownership through cooperative enterprises and worker ownership in the stock of corporations.

11. Effective control of monopolies.

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Homes For Ragpickers

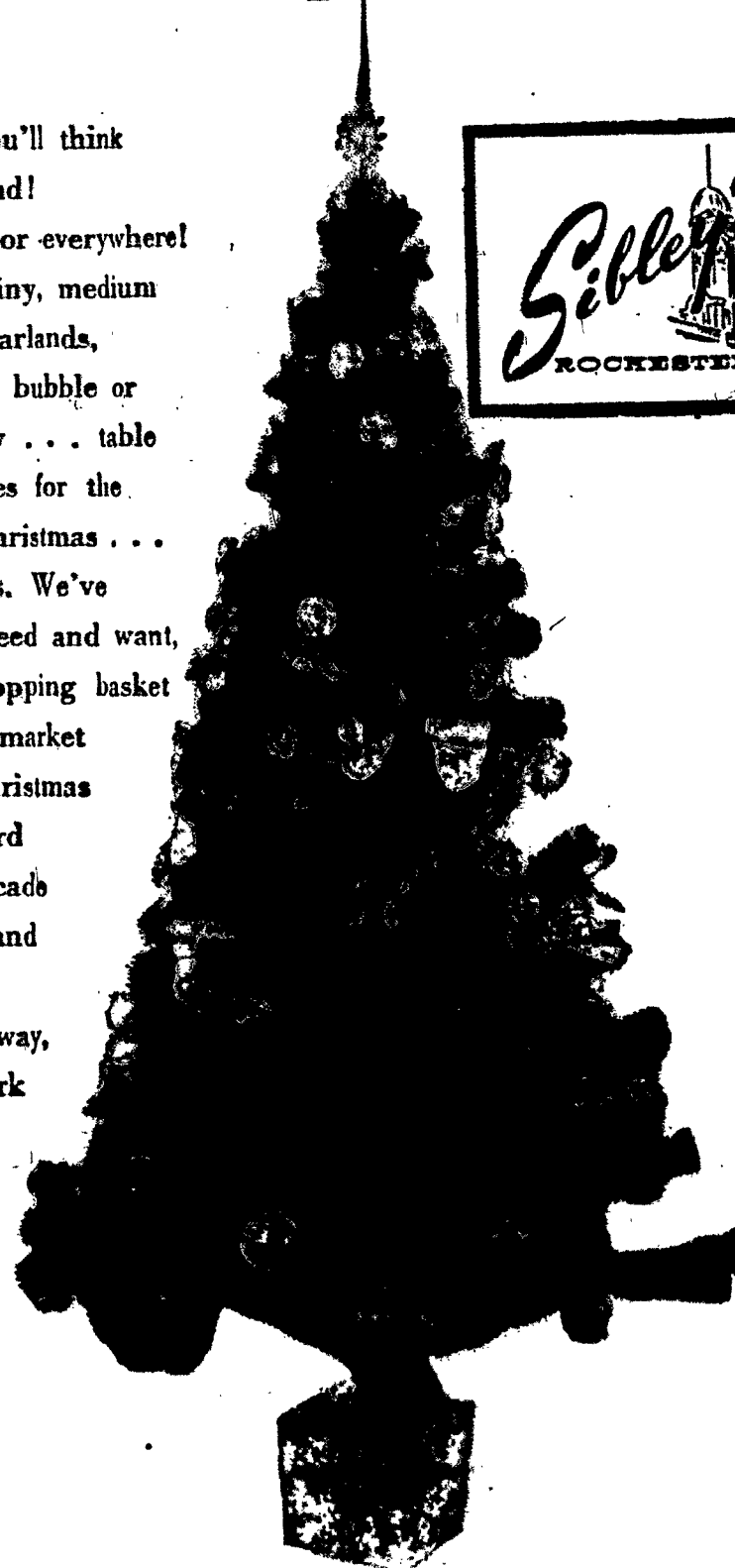
