## Persecution Told

# Polish Reds Oust Belgian Diplomat

Warsaw — (RNS) — The Polish Communist government ordered out of the country a Belgian diplomat it charged with having tipped off the free world to the Warsaw regime's drive to have a Catholic bishop ousted from his See.

The diplomat was Mme. Marie E. Greindl-Czetwertynska, who married a Pole while serving as an attache at the Belgian Embassy in Warsaw. The priest is Bishop Czeslaw Kaczmarek of Kielce, who has been accused of preaching "anti-Communist sermons and engaging in other anti-state activities."

In an official statement, the government charged that the woman diplomat had used the diplomatic mail pouch to smuggle out confidential correspondence detailing the state's demand on the Polish hierarchy that Bishop Kaczmarek be removed from his See, and the Church's refusal.

Vatican City — (NC) — Christmas will be the theme of a new series of postage stamps to be issued on December 14 by the Vatican City post office. Another series, issued on the same day, will commemorate the 500th anniversary of the birth of St. Casimir, patron of Poland and Lithuania.

## Catholics Least Where Population Explodes

Cincinnati — (RNS) — Roman Catholics throughout the world totaled 527,653,000 as of last June 30, or 18.3 per cent of the population — an increase of one-tenth of one per cent.

According to this year's World Mission Map of the Catholic Students' Mission Crusade here, the gain in the total number of Catholics from mid-1958 to mid-1959 amounted to over 17 million. The increase in the total world population was 88,976,000, making the new total 2,886,691,000. This raised the Catholic percentage from 18.2 to 18.3.

No new trends in Catholic population were shown on the map, but the regions of most rapid Catholic growth — chiefly West, Central, and East Africa, the African Islands, and North America — continued to show gains.

In the two regions of heaviest total population — Eastern and South-Central Asia — the Church continued to hold its own percentage-wise, at 5 and 1.3 per cent, respectively. These two areas count slightly less than 47 per cent of the total world population.

## Catholic Press

### Gains Cited

Paderborn — (RNS) — Post-war rehabilitation of the Roman Catholic press in this country was hailed here by speakers at the annual assembly of the Working Committee of Catholic Press Work in Germany.

Dr. Bernhard Hagemeier of Paderborn, director of the committee, pointed out that today there are 66 Catholic publishing houses in the country, and more than 100 newspapers and publications with a total circulation of over 12 million copies. These impressive figures show, he said, that "the Catholic press today no longer stands in the shadow."

## Cocteau Paints Church Murals

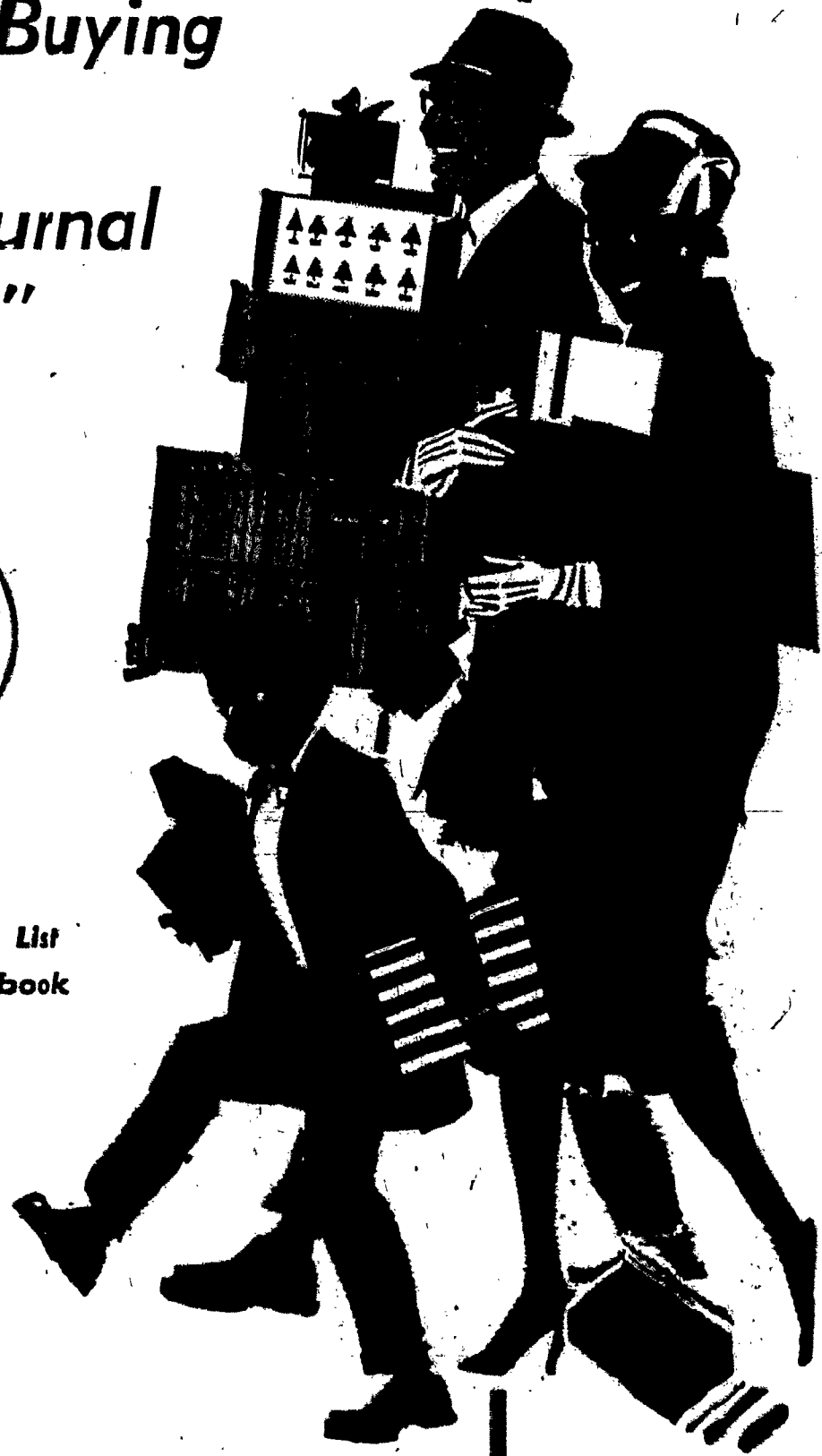

One of the murals, behind the altar, depicts Mary at the foot of the Cross. Two others, on the right and left walls, respectively, portray the Annunciation and the Assumption.

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
